
Following interviews, which are scheduled to take place next week, I will be able to update you and the Trustees further.





Laxton History Group



Members were brought up to date with the next stages of the Michael Wood Award at our meeting in February. These will be:

At Kneesall School on **4th April 1.30 – 3.30pm** when the children present their work to parents and members.

5th **June, 9 and 10am** when we will present their gifts and certificates. Members are encouraged to attend on both occasions.

We will be taking examples of the work the children produce to display at the Great Nottinghamshire Local History Fair in Mansfield on Sunday 12th May. Everyone is welcome to attend this free event which includes talks and entertainment as well as a large number of stalls from groups across the county.

We have given our dramatised readings based on the HLF research twice recently. On both occasions it was very well received, though by two quite different groups in Southwell and Lenton.


Our AGM will be slightly different this year with the usual historical supper replaced with historical entertainment. Joan has found the script of the Laxton Mummers play in the Archives in Nottingham. It turned up in correspondence between Revd. Collinson & Mr Willis. It was 'written by a Laxton man who had played in it and who was crippled in the war'. Historically it was played by men, who would have been farm hands, and in the style of a pantomime. Joan is currently recruiting her cast...

Towards the end of the year, on Tuesday October 12th, we will be going to Oxford for the day. The Mark Pierce 1635 map of Laxton will be featured in an exhibition of historical maps. This is a rare opportunity to see this wonderful document on public display and it will be alongside amazing survivals of very early maps.

We are currently deciding if we should hire a coach or go by minibus. It would be helpful if any non members who would like to attend, or simply to take advantage of a bus trip to this lovely city, would let jean know of their interest so we can choose our transport wisely.

Our speaker for the evening was arranged at short notice after the booked speaker was unable to attend. We were very pleased to welcome Adrian Gray to speak about the background to the local men who became the Pilgrim Fathers.

Adrian has written a book which gives great detail on the subject. A short



version is available now with the full text planned to appear for the 400th anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower next year.

The heritage of the Pilgrim Fathers had its roots here long before the Mayflower. Notts born men were instrumental in the development of many world religions of today: Thomas Cranmer; many of the Mayflower Pilgrims - Baptists, Quakers and American Non-Conformists; John Wesley - Methodism, and William Booth - the Salvation Army.

To those not familiar with the story, local names played a great part in the story. Sturton-le-Steeple produced several of the key individuals, while others had strong connections with Grove, Rufford and Gainsborough as well as the better known Babworth and Scrooby. Adrian suggested that non-conformist views were able to flourish here because they were supported by the gentry who supported each other in keeping quiet about the local practices. The distance of these places from London or York where they would have been clamped down on enabled them to take hold and the strong convictions of the men involved ultimately took them to Holland and for some, to America, on the Mayflower. Local man John Brewster was a leader among them.

Our next meeting is the AGM. Everyone is very welcome - see above.






We offered congratulations to our team who achieved a very creditable second place in the Village Hall Quiz and also to our Treasurer, Sally, whose birthday it was.

There were many countywide opportunities for Brenda to read out. It is great that belonging to our federation offers us so many chances to take part in activities which we couldn't put on for ourselves. This time we heard about the County Quiz, triple target shooting, croquet and a literary lunch where the speaker will be Stephen Booth to name but a few. Anna had recently attended a day learning to embroider a landscape which she had thoroughly enjoyed. This was an appropriate introduction to Jan Garside, our speaker who had come to talk about 'Textile Art'

Jan told us she was 'travelling light'. She was right as her beautiful woven items were light as a feather, and we were blessed to see and examine such a wonderful display of talent at close quarters.

Jan gave up midwifery on medical grounds and went to college thinking of doing a multi media course. When it came to it she didn't like the sound of the course and accepted her friends' invitation to join them in the weaving class. She was soon hooked.

The first sample we were passed was of 'monofilament', the synthetic thread Jan works with. It was astonishingly fine and immediately we could imagine the hours which had gone into producing her work.



Jan described the moment she became hooked on weaving. Her tutor showed her a sample with lovely wavy lines in the weave. Jan couldn't quite believe that this happened when you took the work off the loom, where it was stretched tight and the threads were all straight. She admitted to crying out in delight when she cut off her first piece and it did indeed create waves. The next level is elastic thread, which

creates even more dramatic effects when the tension is released.

While she was studying for her BA Jan was asked if she would like to exhibit at the V&A - quite an accolade for someone still studying. The work she made was on show there for a month.

We heard in detail about an installation made to honour the Maidens of Minsterley. There is a tradition to craft a paper crown to hang over the seat used in church by a virtuous young woman who died after





becoming engaged but before marriage. Jan had made a piece to capture the feeling of the crown which was suspended above a chair. This was dressed with

various items including a pair of woven shoes, which we were fortunate enough to see.


Jan described some of her commissions and the ingenious decorations she uses. One had some 5,000 fishing weights individually tied to it. Another piece was inspired by Japanese prayer messages and kimono.

hard to understand the huge difference they can make to women in countries where simply having underwear can protect you from unpleasant incidents and unwanted attention.







Rent-to-own cap a win for people paying over the odds

Sherwood & Newark Citizens Advice was very pleased to learn of the FCA's recent announcement that it will cap the cost of rent-to-own goods from 1 April 2019, which will help local people struggling with repayments.

Jackie Insley, Chief Officer, said: "This cap, which the service has campaigned for, is a win for those struggling with the runaway costs of rent-to-own agreements. We're delighted it will now be introduced as we see the massive harm caused by the crippling interest rates when local people come to us for help. The cap will stop people from paying over the odds compared to similar products on the high street and falling into further debt when costs spiral out of control."

Rent-to-own companies sell household items, such as appliances, furniture and electronics, through 'hire purchase agreements'. These agreements - usually arranged over three years - involve customers paying off the price of the product as well as interest, in weekly payments. The agreements allow people on low incomes to purchase goods that they cannot afford to pay for upfront. But these goods come at a high cost. Interest rates can be as high as 99.9%, and missed payments are subject to fees of £10-12 per occasion. More generally, rent-to-own goods are a bad deal - with high mark-ups on prices, costly delivery charges, and expensive add-ons, such as aftercare and insurance.

Citizens Advice research found that, affordability checks by sellers often do not identify where consumers might face financial difficulties in meeting the cost. In particular other expenditure is overlooked. As a consequence rent-to-own goods often make worse existing financial difficulties - with the consumer likely to be behind on important bills, such as energy or council tax. 50% of rent-to-own customers have borrowed to meet payments. Only half of all rent-to-own agreements are completed - leaving customers paying large sums for goods that they often do not get to keep.

Citizens Advice says hundreds of thousands of people use the high-interest agreements. Nationally, the service helps approximately 5,000 people a year with rent-to-own issues. It has also welcomed the decision by the regulator to place restrictions on other charges, including late payment fees.
