

Editorial Message

It has been very difficult to finalise the magazine this month as advice and activity details have been changing daily. Printing has been delayed by a couple of days to try to bring you an accurate picture.

The magazine was finalised for printing on 16th March. As coronavirus advice and instructions continue to be issued, we cannot guarantee the accuracy of any information regarding events thought to be continuing or on which we have no information.

You should assume that group events are cancelled until further notice and check for yourself if you want confirmation.

At the time of writing:

- ◆ All church services are cancelled on the instruction of the Archbishop of Canterbury.
- ◆ The church remains open in Laxton for private prayer. Please maintain the advised distance from others.
- ◆ Coffee Mornings, Laxton History Group, Mothers' Union and WI are all suspended until further notice.
- ◆ The next Parish Council meeting is cancelled
- ◆ We have no information yet about church Garden Fêtes. hopefully a decision will be taken about holding Moorhouse Fête by next month.

Finally, Rev. Zoe wrote her letter in February before going on sabbatical leave and this appears overleaf. Things looked normal then, so she makes no mention of the troubles coronavirus has brought us all. It is hard to believe what has happened in one short month.

Stay safe and see inside details of a help link service co-ordinated by Mike Jackson and 'Take Aways' from The Dovecote Inn, including the option to purchase food and household goods through them.

Letter From Revd. Zoe

Easter is on its way! I have had the privilege of attending school Easter services which spoke of Easter hope, new life, forgiveness and new beginnings. In our churches we are about to journey through Palm Sunday, Holy Week and then onto the joyous celebrations of Easter Day. Each year churches around the world remember Jesus' passion and all the events that unfold to enable God and humanity's relationship to be restored and reconciled for all and for all time.

Holy Week, in one sense, shows itself to be a fearful, bewildering and emotionally charged week – Jesus journeys to and weeps over Jerusalem, he sweats blood in a garden in prayer to the Father as the conflict escalates and what follows shows itself in denial, betrayal, disciples fleeing and abandonment as Jesus dies on a cross. For the disciples, this was not how it was meant to be: they do not understand although Jesus had told them this would all happen and they would not get it until after God the Father had raised Jesus from the dead and then Jesus' glorious ascension and the giving of the Holy Spirit and they were able to look back with hindsight and see the significance of all the events that were part of God's rescue plan.

Holy Week is an important week to journey through, to encounter afresh the depths of Jesus' love and suffering for humanity and the spiritual formation which happens as a result. The Christian journey is a daily pilgrimage of discovering more and more about the life Jesus offers - Kingdom life: eternal life, life to the full, life with potential. Our journey is a daily dying to old ways of living, ignorance and all that is contra to the way and life of the Kingdom and an opening up and enlarging our hearts, minds and souls as our awareness grows to what could be and become if we are truly willing to embrace Kingdom life as individuals and community.

Easter Day will mark a new beginning for all of us, a letting go of old ways of being together, a letting go of what might have been, of dreams unrealised and our failure to perceive God's promptings and leadings in the knowledge that God offers his forgiveness and a new start and holds out his hand in encouragement and love to journey onwards together out of our darkness and the world's darkness into God's marvellous light. I give thanks for all that has been so good, for how we have shaped and formed each other over the last 4 years here in the villages and for all we have become and will go on becoming. Thank you for teaching me so much about rural ministry and village life. It has been a privilege to walk alongside many in our

communities through significant life changing events. It has been an honour to serve as Wellow House School Chaplain, School Governor at Walesby C of E school and what limited time I have been able to share with Kneesall C of E school. It has been good to join you for coffee mornings, garden fayres, the Egmonton pilgrimages, produce shows, the Maypole event at Wellow and all the festival services. There is so much that I am grateful for and thankful to you all. Wishing you a hope-filled, peace-filled and joyous Easter. Go well as you move forward and I pray that as church and community your partnership work would be strengthened and grow so that the churches will be well resourced to go on being a blessing to their communities for many generations to come.

When he was a child, he talked like a child, reasoned like a child. When he became a man he put away childish things.

He met me when I joined the choir many years later. We both had interests in many subjects including football and cricket and followed by roses. From 1965 to 1984 we took a big interest in horticulture, being committee members of the Nottinghamshire Rose Society.

Many hours were spent dead heading, disbudding and selecting roses to take to the big shows. These were held as far away north as Teesside, across the Midlands and at Alexandra Palace in London.

We achieved many top prizes, winning with 'Best New Seedling Rose' twice and Best in Show a number of times. The top award was in 1976 - 'Midlands Rose Champion'.




Get Well Soon

The compere was very knowledgeable. Until the model stepped on the floor she had no idea what she was going to be wearing but instantly knew the make and price of everything.


Rails and rails of clothes stood at the back of hall for guests to look at and choose from and lots of clothes were sold to eager buyers after the parade.

The Families Who Left 3 - The Hills

William Hills 1879- 1959 Alice 1903-1962:
Barbados, West Indies, 1879 - an
amazing 60 year journey - **to Moorhouse**
1938 and then ...



William was born into a world of change. His grandmother either was or had been a slave. The slave trade was abolished in 1807 but the freedom of those already slaves came much later. The chances of him making his way here, to Moorhouse were remote to say the least. But make that journey, he did.

His career included:

- ◆ Member of the Three Dusky Princes song and dance group in the USA in the days when Soft Shoe Shuffle, a kind of tap dance, was all the rage;
 - ◆ Stoker - possibly working his passage;
 - ◆ Soldier - 2nd Boer War and The Great War;
 - ◆ Entertainment provider, boxer, organiser of boxing booth fights,
 - ◆ Coal miner,
 - ◆ Small holder market greengrocer, and lastly
 - ◆ Night watchman on Ossington Aerodrome during World War Two.
- He served this country well.

Between the two World Wars, William had married and had a family. His son, Cyril, known as 'Darkie Ellis', started his professional career as a boxer at 14 years old and by 1940 is said to have fought in 91 professional fights.

World War 2 brought an end to his career when he enlisted in the RAF. His wife and children lived in Moorhouse for a while to escape the bombings in Manchester. His sister, Grace, sang in the chorus for a Paul Robeson production amongst others, and was well known in her day, in the field of lawn green bowls in Lancashire, winning many cups and trophies.

In 1938 William, having married again, to Alice Pegg from Caunton, brought his family to live in a tied cottage in Moorhouse. They soon settled in. He kept pigs and hens and certainly 'Dug for Victory', supplying others, as well as his own family, with vegetables. Every night he cycled to Ossington to carry out his duties as night watchman.

His elder daughter, Sylvia, won an entry to Newark Technical College and also had lessons in singing, dancing and piano playing. She then did various jobs whilst trying to make her life in the entertainment world. She later married and emigrated to New York with her family.

Leaphia, his younger daughter, passed the 11+ and went to Newark High School. She then trained as a nurse at St Mary's Hospital, London and went on to qualify as a midwife. She married a doctor and for some time they lived in Ghana, where she set-up and ran her own Nursery School for several years.

Leaphia says *“Dad had a great sense of humour. He especially liked his nickname, 'Snowball'. Dad's favourite song was 'Trees' sung by Paul Robeson and he loved listening to opera. I remember one in particular called 'Aida' set in ancient Egypt.”*

Leaphia now lives in London with her daughter, Janet, an accountant, who in her spare time creates beautiful and amazing icing decorations.

Janet has twin daughters, Alice and Leaphia. Alice is musical and reached Grade 8 on three different instruments, piano, trombone and flute. She won a special award for the flute, having gained the highest mark in the country. She studied art at The Slade School of Fine Arts.

Leaphia, studied acting at RADA and now works in the theatre world, having just finished a 13 months engagement playing roles in Shakespeare plays at the Globe Theatre, London.

After 80 years I am still in contact with Leaphia. She visits when she can and she often recalls the Chapel Sunday School trips to the seaside and the anniversary demonstrations, where the children had to perform their songs and recitations under the guidance of Violet Saxelby, who ran the Chapel and Sunday School for more than 40 years.

A note accompanying this account commented: Now thinking back, this was extraordinary. No one in this area had ever seen anyone whose skin colour was different from their own or heard of Barbados in the 1930s. Hardly anyone had a daily newspaper or wireless; no 'Pictures' or TV. Yet William and his family came to live in such a small hamlet as Moorhouse, thousands of miles away.



Road Works at Egmanton

Via EM, now part of NCC, have announced that they will be relaying the section of road between the 30mph sign on the Tuxford Road just beyond the church to the post box, which is just past the turning into Weston Road.

Laxton History Group



In February we were pleased to welcome back John Whitfield, this time to talk about 'The 1970s - were they really so bad?' Members volunteered recollections of the decade in which several were marrying and having children. John has concluded that historical books almost universally portray the '70s badly. Personal experiences may be completely different and he asked if we felt that it was such a bad decade.

Inflation reached its highest for several centuries. Initially wages were low. An average income was in the region of £1000 a year. An average house cost about £3500, and a very nice one might only be £5000. A weekly shop might cost £7. John recalled buying a new Hillman Avenger for £872.

The 70s were a good time for television – all three channels of it. As colour became available people watched TV rather than going to the cinema. They were still single screen in the 70s and struggled to make ends meet. Many closed and became bingo halls.

'Til Death Us Do Part' was a popular TV series and those who remember it readily agreed that it would never get close to being aired today. Big names included Morecambe and Wise, the two Ronnies and Val Doonican. Some films were successful including Star Wars, Jaws, Clockwork Orange, and Get Carter.

The music of the decade began very much as the 60s had ended, with glam rock, longer hair and make up (for the men) gaining in popularity. By the end of the decade punk had come in and glamour had gone out.

Football hooliganism erupted but Nottingham Forest had their time in the spotlight with Brian Clough. In cricket Australia, the West Indies and England were the leading teams, but it was losing popularity, remaining firmly rooted in the 3-day county games and 5-day test games, with none of the popular shorter format games which had still to be introduced..

English tennis hit the headlines when Virginia Wade won the women's singles at Wimbledon in 1977, the year of the Queen's Silver Jubilee.

Edward Heath was Prime Minister until Harold Wilson took over between 1974 and 76 to be succeeded by James Callaghan. Rumours abounded about Wilson's sudden resignation which was later revealed to be due to developing Alzheimer's disease. Some very fanciful alternatives were voiced in the press at the time. Callaghan left Margaret Thatcher just seven months before the start of the 1980s, and that is a different talk!

The decade was marked by the struggle between the unions and the government. Pressure for higher wages collided with a government determined to oppose them. Borrowing from the International Monetary Fund came with conditions that excessive wage rises should be resisted, which proved impossible to implement. There were numerous strikes, the miners showed the effectiveness of flying pickets, and the government struggled to maintain control. This occurred against the backdrop of the troubles in Northern Ireland. The 'Winter of Discontent' 'saw clashes between unions and government at their worst. Members recalled experiencing the 3-day week, scheduled power cuts and price rises.

John turned to the better aspects of the '70s. Despite everything, we were healthier, better paid and better fed than ever. We enjoyed central heating, foreign holidays and a boom in consumerism which saw fridges, freezers, TVs and music centres appearing in homes. People were beginning to drink wine, albeit not great wine, and growth was in the region of 3% per annum.

Michael Wood Award 2020

On 24th February Joan and Roger Cottee visited Tuxford Primary School to start them off the Award, encouraging the children to research an historical topic of their own choosing. History Group members had been invited to the school to see and hear about their work., but this has undoubtedly fallen foul of the coronavirus closures and restrictions.

AGM & Supper - Friday 17th April, 1970s

We are disappointed to have had to cancel our popular Historic Supper, which takes place with our AGM. We will have to see how long activities are impossible and decide if it we can hold the supper this year. We will need to carry out the business of the AGM at a meeting soon after we restart activities and will publish information on this in due course.

Our March meeting was to have been a rather special one with our guest speaker, James Wright coming to tell us more about our castle. We had invited our friends from Norwell Parish History Group and were looking forward to a fascinating evening. As activities are suspended, James is being rebooked for next year as will be the case with other speakers we are forced to put off this year.

Great Nottinghamshire Local History Fair

This popular, and free, public event aimed at the family was scheduled for May 3rd. We had planned to take part again, but in the present circumstances are not expecting the event to take place now.

Coronavirus Scams: Exploiting Those Trying To Protect Themselves

During this period of uncertainty regarding Covid-19, it appears that there are some people who are taking advantage of the situation and are targeting the most vulnerable. Although we appreciate the concern that is being caused by the outbreak, please continue to be cautious when dealing with callers at the door, unwanted phone calls and emails.

If everyone can tell 2 people about the following recent developments in their next phone conversation with a friend or neighbour, the message will soon reach all corners of the community.

This is a worldwide pandemic and no legitimate organisation will contact you out of the blue and ask for payment for information or access to treatment which doesn't exist. We are hearing reports of emails and phone calls asking for donations to help those in need during this time, or offering miracle cures, and door to door campaigns offering testing. Also, please be aware that the Red Cross are NOT doing door to door testing as has been suggested in some areas.

Unfortunately, some fraudsters are offering to do shopping for residents, taking the money and then not returning with the goods. Others have offered to take a shopping list along with a bank card. This would be considered as theft and should be reported to the police.

We don't want to discourage anyone from helping their neighbours or family members, and we don't want to breed distrust in those genuine members of the community trying to support others. We simply ask that you remain vigilant and:

- ⇒ Try to only liaise with people you know.
- ⇒ Only buy the essentials in this manner, therefore the amount of money required is minimal, do not hand over a bank card - use cash only.
- ⇒ If the person says they are from a community organisation, ask for some ID or to verify their identity by calling the organisation directly, not the number on the card.

Scammers are also sending out coronavirus-themed phishing emails which attempt to trick people into opening malicious attachments or revealing sensitive information about themselves such as personal and financial details. In the same way that we have seen TV licensing and HMRC emails, we are now seeing phishing emails claiming to be from organisations affiliated with the Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the World Health Organisation (WHO). There have also been some variations on current scams with fake emails appearing to be from HMRC offering a tax rebate due to the Coronavirus.

Please be aware of any suspicious emails and do not click on the links or attachments, and do not respond to any unsolicited messages or calls asking for your personal or financial details.

If you have been a victim of fraud or cybercrime, report it to Action Fraud via their website <https://www.actionfraud.police.uk/>, or by calling them on 0300 123 2040.


