The Village Idiot Comes to Laxton & Moorhouse

Andy, AKA 'The Village Idiot' has an ambition to visit every civil parish in England, of which there are about 11,000. Having recently completed his coverage of all the parishes in Bassetlaw he has embarked on Newark and Sherwood working his way down from the north of the district.

As reported last month, he was recently in Egmanton, Kirton, Ompton and Wellow.

With immaculate timing, just as the printed magazines were received ready for distribution, he came to Laxton. This has turned out to be one of his longer videos because he spent quite some time in Laxton village before driving up onto Acre Edge to look at Mill Field and talk a little about Mill Field before going to Moorhouse to finish.

It is not clear what research he does before embarking on each visit, but in this case he has done better than some. He noticed the Thoresby logo on the farm name plates and was wondering aloud if some connection remained. He must have looked that up because he then spoke about the passing of the Estate from Thoresby to the nation, the Crown Estate and back to Thoresby. Unfortunately he then said that the field system was being maintained according to the Parliamentary undertaking given by the Crown Estate. This has, of course, been replaced by the undertaking given by Thoresby, which formed a significant part of their tender to purchase the Estate back.

It is not clear whether either the farmers or Thoresby would welcome the status of 'owners' he bestowed on them, but generally he got most things near enough right. The church, the Visitor Centre, the Village Hall and the Dovecote all got a mention.

It was nice to see him visit Moorhouse and speak a little about what he saw there, although he did not venture through the farm yard up to the church.

You can see the results of his efforts on YouTube - just search for 'The Village Idiot'. You can then search for Laxton, but unless you say Laxton and Moorhouse, you will need to say Laxton Nottinghamshire because there was already a video of Laxton, Humberside.

It is free to view, but he does ask you to 'buy him a coffee', i.e. make a small donation. That, of course, is entirely up to you.

Mike Manning sent round an email mentioning the video, which

In his travels, Andy had shown some of the village interpretation boards. They all look in various states of disrepair and some are dirty almost to the point of being unreadable. The comment Mike received pointed out that this does not reflect well on Laxton.

The existing boards were updated and placed in position in 2006. Since them not only has much of the wood holding them in place rotted and the ownership of the Estate changed, but so have some of the facts.

Mike knew that the Visitor Centre Trust was working with Thoresby on having the old boards replaced before this debate began and contacted them to see how far things had got. He has sent us the following update:

Laxton Visitor Centre Trust

We are pleased to say we are making good progress with Thoresby regarding both the replacement of the information/interpretation boards and the refurbishment of the toilets at the Visitor Centre.

The following information has been received from Thoresby during the last month

"Professor John Beckett and his colleagues at the University of Nottingham are currently helping to update and correct the information on the existing signboards. Once the information is up to date and free of errors, each board will have to be professionally redesigned. Once this has been done we can get our usual sign maker to produce the boards ready for installation

Regarding the toilets, Pinebrook Contractors have the works order and have the job programmed in. Unfortunately, with the repairs requiring the use of lime mortar/plaster we are not able to carry this out until mid-April at the earliest due to the risk of frost and low temperature. I would anticipate that, as long as the weather is with us, we should be completed with plenty of time in hand.

Prof John Beckett has since confirmed that the text has been checked and updated by himself and expert colleagues and once any changes to the farming practices mentioned have been included, the display content of the new boards will be ready for Thoresby to commission the design and manufacture. Members were welcomed to our meeting by our president on 9th March.

The list of invitations to events in the County were read out.

Jennie will attend the Spring Council Meeting, which was to be held at Nottingham Playhouse, but has now had to be moved to Oxton Village Hall because refurbishment works at the Playhouse will not be finished on time. Jennie will go as a delegate and also receive a certificate for our WI's 60th anniversary.

Three members had put their names forward to go to a workshop for 'Crochet for Beginners', also the County Quiz, and congratulations were given to the WI team for coming first in the Village Hall quiz.

There will be a Willow Workshop for members to have a go at making a sphere.

County are at present trying to organise a clay pigeon shoot, a night at the dogs in Nottingham and a visit to see Notts play in a T-20 cricket match and the Notts Open Tennis. Hopefully these will be able to take place and we can get back to normal.

Our speaker for the evening was Wendy Wigan who spoke to us and gave us a presentation about the Team4Us project, which we support and which most WIs in the county do also.

We knit hats, scarves, gloves, mitts, and hand puppets. They are then forwarded to County Office about October before being collected by the charity. They are then sorted into different children's ages 3–5, 6–



11, and 12+. Then they go into shoe boxes which are filled up with pencils, crayons, books, balls, and toiletries – anything a child could need. The boxes are labelled and packed into larger containers before going onto the lorries. This work is all done voluntarily by up to 58 volunteers who work at the Nottingham depot.

The lorries must be packed correctly to the proper weight and the logistics and paperwork must all be correct. They then set off on their journey to the poor countries, such as Romania, making probably two or three drops. The people there in the areas where they deliver live in very poor conditions with probably three generations living in one shack. The children love receiving these boxes. It is as if Santa has come. It is lovely to see the smiles on their faces.

Wendy has been over to the countries which receive the boxes and found it very difficult to see how they were living.

Wendy judged the competition for a knitted article for us. She gave first prize to a beautiful doll knitted by Anna. Jackie was second with a lovely heather coloured jumper. Sandra's entry, which was a poncho, she had made 50 years ago.



Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 13th April which will be our AGM. This will be followed by supper.

Group Oil Order

Just prior to the last order the price had plateaued. We secured a price of 58.75p/litre (61.68p inc VAT @5%) on 20th February. The last minute addition of two orders following initial discussions with the suppliers resulted in a reduction for everyone of almost 0.5p/litre, which adds up when you are buying in bulk. It was a good demonstration of the value of having all the orders to hand before getting the quotes.



Soon afterwards the price went up rapidly, reaching 68.5p on 8th February. By 11th March, in the wake of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the price peaked at £1.65/litre, which was over £1 a litre more than we had paid, before falling slightly to £1.44 on 14th March and £1.24 at the time of writing on 17th March.

For this reason, no additional late spring order has been proposed. It seems the price is coming down, though how far and for how long who knows? It seems advisable to hang on and make stocks last with the warmer weather approaching and see what happens in a month or two.

If you don't want to miss the chance to get a discount by ordering with a substantial number of others, please notify your current contact details and delivery instructions such as lock, need advance notice of delivery etc. I pass your land line, mobile(s) and email address to the chosen supplier.

Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council Draft Minutes of the Meeting 25/1/22

Present: Councillors:

M. Manning (chair), S. Hill, M. Hennell, J.Hill, S,Rose, J. Godson R. Hennell

In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Wilson (Clerk), S, Michael (District councillor) B Perry (Thoresby Estate representative)

- 1. **Apologies for absence:** There were no absences. Apologies from Mr Pringle were noted.
- Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 10 (Property matters – including sports field and Glebe Field maintenance and approval of licence).
- **3.** There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 4. Dispensations: None required.
- 5. 10 Minutes public speaking: No public present.
- 6. **Thoresby Estate report (if any):** Councillors welcomed Mr Perry to the meeting. He reported that planning permission had been granted for School Farm.
- Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 23 November 2021: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 23 November 2021 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair
- 8. **Matters arising:** No other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.
- 9. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Mrs Michael reported on the following:
 - a. The Covid vaccination uptake in all age groups in the district
 - b. The Newark test site had closed
 - c. The conservation officer is leading on Bar Farmhouse. A draft schedule of works has been sent to the owner with a March 2022 deadline for commencement. If the works are not commenced, NSDC will then take enforcement action. All agreed that the property was in a very poor condition and had been deteriorating for years.
- 9. **Reports from councillors:** The chair reported on the success of the Christmas lights event on 5 December 2021. There had been very positive feedback from village organisations and individuals. Councillors were pleased that they now had Christmas lights which could be used in future years, although disappointment was

expressed at the limitations on the parish council's ability to expend the precept on the event. Councillors agreed that the 2022 event should be an agenda item for the September 2022 meeting to allow plenty of time for planning.

Formal thanks were expressed to Mr Rose for all his efforts and to the Thoresby Estate for the donation of the trees and funding. These contributions had been central to the success of the event. Mr S Hill reported that the SNG meeting on 13 January 2022 had identified two priorities:

- a. The importance of reporting all rural crime incidents using 101 or 999 as appropriate to their severity and of residents taking responsibility for their own security
- b. Speeding traffic in villages. A new police camera car is in use.

Mr J Hill referred to hare coursing in Laxton which he had reported. Councillors noted that there had also been incidents at Maplebeck.

There was also discussion of the theft of telescopic antlers for use in a subsequent cashpoint theft. They also noted the use of drones at night. It was recognised that activity had increased since Covid had eased. Councillors emphasised the importance of reporting any activity of potential significance.

10. Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field and sub tenancy and associated legal services: Councillors noted that there appeared to have been a misunderstanding in relation to the acceptance of the Critchley's quote and payment of the deposit. The clerk had mistakenly been waiting to hear from Mr Rose. The position having been clarified, she would arrange for payment.

Councillors noted that a query had been raised by the licensee in relation to insurance and the clerk was waiting to hear back from Larken & Co.

11. Planning matters:

- a. Applications: None
- b. To note planning decisions by NSDC: None
- c. **Compliance:** No matters raised.
- 12. **Defibrillator inspection report:** Mr Jem Hill reported that he had completed the inspection. There were no issue. Councillors noted that the defibrillator had been used two weeks previously. Mr Hill confirmed that there were spare in date pads. The clerk had ordered new ones.
- 13. Village environment and appearance, including:
- a. **Second defibrillator:** The chair had included an article in the forthcoming Open Field seeking residents' views and reminded everyone where the defibrillator is located. He will share any responses received with councillors in advance of the next meeting on 22 March 2022.

- **b. Use of telephone kiosk:** Councillors agreed that the kiosk would benefit from some maintenance. It was noted that the conservation officer had indicated that the kiosk was a listed structure. The clerk will seek confirmation and establish what that means in terms of use and maintenance.
- c. Dog bin installation Update: Mr J Hill had installed the bins. The clerk had advised NSDC waste collection to update their collection schedule to include the new bins.
- d. Relocation 30 mph speed signs to village entries and NCC Highways (Via) formal notice: Councillors considered Via's advert letter dated 17 January 2022 and unanimously decided that they supported the re-siting of the three signs as proposed, but formally requested that the sign on Acre Edge Road is also re-sited as they had originally been seeking.
- e. Bar Farmhouse: See LMPC/08/22 (Reports from District and County Councillors) above
- **f. Jubilee event and decorations:** Councillors discussed the possibility of holding a village celebration during the four day jubilee period. They noted that the following suggestions had already been made:
 - a. A Songs of Praise on the Sunday 5 June 2022
 - b. A street party, possibly around the Village Hall with the WI potentially providing food with a resident's support and residents more generally bringing their own drinks

c. Planting a tree in Glebe Field.

Councillors went on to discuss how an event might be organised and unanimously **decided** that the parish council should set up a Jubilee Committee made up of three parish councilors and representatives from various village organisations. The event would be held under the parish council's auspices and direct oversight. As a parish council organised event, albeit with the involvement of wider groups, it should be covered under its insurance arrangements. After discussion, Mr S Hill, Mr J Hill and Mr M Hennel were formally **appointed** as the parish council's representatives on the Parish Council Jubilee Committee. It was also **decided** that, in the first instance, the following should be invited to join the committee:

Women's Institute Village Hall Committee Church Visitor Centre Young Farmers History Group Gaits & Commons with proposals to be brought to the parish council's next meeting on 22 March 2022. The chair will assist in compl

- meeting on 22 March 2022. The chair will assist in completing any funding applications and place an article in the Open Field. g. Laxton Conservation Area Character Appraisal – Update:
- Councillors noted that the consultation had begun and would run

until 18 February 2022. The chair reported that his feeling from the event was that most residents were broadly supportive of the proposal. He encouraged residents to complete The NSDC on line consultation form.

14. Finance

- a. Financial position as at 31 December 2021: Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 31 December 2021 (incorporating the 2021-22 budget figures). The chair verified the stated balances against bank statements.
- **b.** Accounts for payment: The council unanimously approved thirteen payments totalling £3113.55.
- c. To consider the financial information provided by the Clerk and NSDC's letter regarding 2022/23 precept estimates and to agree the precept for the year ending 31 March 2023: Councillors considered the financial information provided by the clerk. They noted the level of reserves, recognising that these were at a level which provided scope for investment on the parish environment. Councillors unanimously decided to retain the precept at £4000
- d. **2022-23 insurance arrangements:** Councillors reviewed the renewal documentation. Councillors **decided** to enter into the 2022-23 insurance contract with Zurich.
