50 Years Ago...



Jayne and I arrived in Laxton 50 years ago this month having managed to acquire the tenancy of Crosshill Farm. Lady Rozelle Raynes, who owned Thoresby Estate, was persuaded to let the farm for £10 per acre to two young new entrants into farming. The other 20 applicants were mainly large farmers in the area who offered around £20 per acre.

The locals looked at us as if we had come from another planet and I was told some years later that the consensus was: "they won't last long in Laxton."

The only person to call round was Roy Beckett who was after some grass for his cattle. Roy later became a good friend and would do anything he could to help me. He was my cattle rearing adviser.

Tim Ward, who was the tenant at Crosshill before me, was a big help and I couldn't have managed without Roland Parr, who worked on the farm for over 50 years.

We got a fairly rude letter from the Court in December telling Jayne not to ride her horse in the Open Fields.

Jayne wasn't very keen to be whisked away from Cumberland where all her friends resided, to live in a caravan in a village where she knew nobody. I had been managing a beautiful 1500 acre estate near Penrith where 18 men worked and where we had more than a dozen enterprises from dairy cows to battery hens and including potatoes, turnips and mangels.

In the end it all worked out well and we were more or less accepted into the village.

Sadly Jayne died in 2005 after a 10 year battle with breast cancer. Happily Di took up the challenge of living with an old farmer.

Our March speaker, Steve Wright talked about the churches in Nottinghamshire. The Domesday Book recorded 250, 182 of which were in the Trent valley.

Steve first discussed the many church tower designs. North Muskham's tower has been extended and has a very old base. Buttresses were added to support the extra weight when towers were raised. Worksop Priory and Southwell Minster are the only two churches to retain their two towers on the western end. Doorways varied considerably depending on the period of their construction and include a Roman one at Teversal.

Early spires had no means of directing rain away from the length of the tower, leading to erosion of the stone below. Builders began to develop spouts, gargoyles and gutters. The spire of Newark's St Mary's Church is the highest in the county at 237 ft.

Steve was able to show only a few interesting features inside the



churches. He said that statues and effigies give clues to the costumes of the day, mentioning the



carvings in Ossington church (above), which he said was rebuilt in 1782 and has interesting carvings. The



effigies of the de Everinghams in Laxton church featured in this section, although he admitted to struggling to get a good photo of the wooden effigy.

Steve ended with a photo of Norwell church (left), showing how it was modified at different periods.

 $\ensuremath{\text{HISTORY}}$ - A snippet of history for those of you who haven't yet visited the Mausoleum –

The building was commissioned by the 4th Duke of Newcastle in memory of his wife, Georgiana. It was designed by Sir Robert Smirke and completed in 1833.

Most of the building served as a family mausoleum, with the nave as a parish church. It was consecrated by the Archbishop of York on 27 December 1833. It closed as a parish church in the 1950s and was vested in the Churches Conservation Trust. It is the only surviving mausoleum in Nottinghamshire.

There is a great amount of history in this building and you are welcome to visit at no cost from 2pm & 4pm, every Sunday from May to September, when our volunteers can offer you a wealth of information.

Advice on fixing your energy tariff.

Energy prices are on their way down, but when is the right time to fix your tariff? Here is a list of key points to show you the different tariff options to better understand your own situation.

An energy tariff is a plan for how much you'll pay for gas or electricity (energy) and includes the rate you'll pay for the energy you use and a daily fee ('standing charge'), payable regardless of the energy used.

There are 2 main types of tariffs:

- **standard variable tariff** your rate goes up and down with the price of energy
- **fixed tariff** your rate stays the same for the length of your contract

There are different kinds of energy tariffs to choose from. To fnd the best one for you, consider your budget, type of meter and any specific needs you have, e.g. do you need more energy at night. If you're not sure what tariff you're on now, check with your supplier or online account.

Fixed tariff

<u>A fixed tariff charges you the same rate for your energy and your standing charge, until your contract ends</u>.

If the wholesale price of energy changes, you'll still pay the rate you agreed on your contract. This means if the price of energy goes down, you could end up paying more than you need to. A fixed tariff usually lasts 12 months. You can switch tariff before it ends. With 49 days or less left on a fixed tariff, switching is free. With 50 days or more left on your fixed tariff you might have to pay an 'exit fee' if you want to switch.

Standard variable tariff

<u>A standard variable tariff is sometimes called a 'default tariff'.</u> On a standard variable tariff, the price of energy usually changes every 3 months. The price is reviewed in January, April, July and October. If the price of energy goes up, so will the rate you pay for the energy you use. This makes budgeting and planning harder.

Your supplier will contact you if your rate changes. Suppliers can charge different rates for their standard variable tariff, so it's worth comparing suppliers.

School Choir

If you want to reduce your standing charge

You might get a cheaper standing charge from a different supplier, but it won't change much because your standing charge depends on your postcode and who your network operator is. Your network operator is the company who looks after the pipes and cables in your area.
