Last autumn they added to the floral display by planting


bulbs purchased by the 'community coffee morning' and other bulbs they donated themselves. I think everyone will agree they look amazing.

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

Memories we make in childhood stay with us forever and shape who we are, recalling precious time spent time together across the generations, and gifts from childhood.

The Youth Service bus is back at the Walks of Life



Museum on Wednesday evening. Reflections from the young people were prompted by the purple poppies we are making for animals lost in wars. They were thinking about how much joy pets bring to them and the effects of loss. V.E day is a time for people to come together especially with the unsettled times in the world.

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

Jo Franklin is one of those ladies who make

you feel slightly inadequate. By profession she is a gardener; another hat she wears is that of Jo Franklin - Art, where she is a talented artist. The hat she was wearing on Wednesday 12th March was Jo Franklin - Woodthorpe Willow. She runs workshops and demonstrations with her characteristic flair.

In a well balanced and massively informative evening she made us aware of not only the skills of willow weaving but its enormously important part in rural development.

Until woodworking skills and fine tools

became common, the norm was to carry and transport goods in wicker carriers. Saddles were made of woven willow, hurdles for folding in the sheep were made of willow or its cousin hazel. Medieval England ran on willow – it was a necessity and staple part of life.

Industrialisation of life meant the importance passed. Now, with the



increased awareness of environmental issues, this vastly versatile product is coming back into its own. Willow can regenerate itself after pollarding for up to 60 years, while conserving and storing carbon to clean the air. It is also very beautiful.

To watch a skilful crafter work is a pleasure. While explaining the tools and preparation of the bases and basic designs she was doing, Jo showed clearly how her hands were holding and moving the willow. The willow had been soaked and left to dry naturally and then either stripped or left with the bark on.

Working terms like butt, whip, upsetting, waley and bradawl were woven into work and the narrative building up a new vocabulary for this intricate work. Tools were displayed and explained and Jo showed how everyday tools could be used as an alternative to the specialist items.

The results were beautiful, practical and very satisfying. Jo described the peace and feeling of contentment that she found in working with willow.

Jo runs a workshop which sounds very enjoyable and very tempting.

Next month is our AGM. After the business meeting there will be a quiz and faith supper. All are welcome.

Laxton History Group



Our regular members were joined by a good number of visitors for our special meeting in February. We discovered that the son of Bill Millin, the piper famed for piping on Sword Beach on D-Day, lived fairly locally and had invited him to speak to us.

So it was that we gathered in the Village Hall to hear John Millin speak about his father and his D-Day role. John arrived with his wife, Dorrie, resplendent in his father's kilt and carrying his bagpipes.

John began by showing some photos which set the scene for the talk to come, which he gave uninterrupted by further slides.

Lord Lovat, the 24th Chief of the Clan Fraser of Lovat was the Brigadier for whom Bill was the personal piper and whose decisions and actions had a great influence on the events on Sword Beach and beyond on D-Day. He was a powerful individual who was key to the Commandos' formation and much involved in their training, which is how the two met after Bill volunteered for the Commandos.

Lord Lovat called Bill into his office and was 'having a word with him' for poaching. He said he needed a piper for D-Day and that the honour was to fall to Bill.

Lovat declared that as he and Millin were Scots, the War Office rule forbidding unarmed pipers on the front line didn't apply. Soon afterwards Millin was sent south to join the men waiting to board the landing craft. On the night of 5th / 6th June, Bill Millin was in the leading

craft with Lord Lovat. He changed from his trews into his kilt as they embarked and Lovat told him to pipe as they set off.

The sea was very rough and we heard a graphic description of the effect of this on the troops. There was one toilet for 100 men. Lovat insisted that the French Commandos should be the first to set foot on French soil.

There were two ramps for the men to walk down, but when Bill Millin saw the man beside him killed, he decided he was too big a target and jumped into the water. Once he could begin to walk forward, he began to play.

Lovat gathered up his men and ordered Bill to play on the beach. Somewhat sarcastically Bill asked if he should also walk up and down, which Lovat approved of and instructed him to do so. He remained on the beach, piping and walking up and down until he was virtually alone, seeing horrific sights throughout.

He and his comrades moved across country to Pegasus Bridge, which they crossed under sniper fire, wearing their green berets. Seeing that most of those killed had taken head shots, they changed to steel helmets.

Some German snipers were captured and were later asked why they did not shoot such a very clear target. Their reply was that it was unlucky to shoot an unarmed madman.

On 15th April 1945, Bill and comrades were involved in the liberation of Belsen, when the Germans surrendered to the British and Canadians. Initially Bill piped as they entered, but the sights he saw were so horrific he could not continue.

John admitted he had never learned to play the pipes in his youth. French pipers commissioned a statue of Bill Millin to stand in France near the site of his exploits. His father who was very frail at that stage wanted there to be a Millin piper there and John set about learning so that there would be a Millin piper at the unveiling. The French consider Bill a national hero and, on the day, over 500 pipers came to play to commemorate his bravery. On a site nearby is a statue of Lord Lovat.

When John finished, Dorrie spoke about the 'The Longest Yarn', which many had seen in Southwell last year. The project consists of 80 woollen tableaux commemorating D-Day and will soon complete its final date in the UK. It will travel around different countries, eventually returning to France to be displayed in a dedicated building.

When the project was in hand and they wanted to include the piper in three scenes, John and Dorrie gave his father's favourite jumper to be unpicked for the figures. Dorrie passed round a duplicate of the model in the display.

Dorrie also spoke about the role of pigeons with the Army, and in particular pigeon, Gustav. He was in the care of a person attached to Reuters news agency on a ship on D-Day. He was released and reached his loft carrying a message saying that the troops had landed, after flying against a 35mph headwind and covering the 150 miles in 5 hours and 16 minutes.

Local Government Reorganisation

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The Minister of State for Local Government and English Devolution has contacted NSDC asking for comment on 'our' vision for the proposed reorganisation of local government. The same correspondence has also been sent to the other borough and district councils as well as Nottingham City Council and Nottingham County Council.

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While local authorities are expected to work together and arrive at a consensus, individual Councils can submit their own proposal jointly with any of the Councils invited to respond.

All proposals submitted must take account of the criteria and timeline for this process, including 'sensible' geographical and economic areas, size (a minimum 5000,000 population); and ensuring 'crucial' services such as social care, Children's services and homelessness. They must demonstrate plans to ensure communities are engaged.

Interim plans must be submitted in March 2025 with a full and final proposal submitted on or before 28th November 2025.

Once a unitary proposal has been agreed, the Government will put in place elections to new 'shadow' unitary councils as soon as possible.

Newark Castle Gatehouse Project

NSDC successfully applied for a Heritage Lottery Fund grant in 2017 to carry out a feasibility study to enhance the Castle Gatehouse project. The Gatehouse is, in the opinion of Historic England, 'the most complete example of a Romanesque gatehouse in England'.


Work on the construction part of the project is due to start late March early April for approx. 12 months. A roof will be put on the gatehouse. The gardens will remain open to the public during works, limited by safety considerations. A lift will be installed making the first floor more accessible. A welcome area and larger room will be available for functions. An extensive education programme will be on offer for school groups. 16 trees have had to be felled and a replanting scheme included in plans.

Threads Through the Bible Exhibition at Southwell Minster 7 March - 5 May 2025

Southwell Minster will be just the second place in the world to host this exhibition by extraordinary textile artist Jacqui Parkinson.

'Threads through the Bible' is made up of three huge sequences, 'Threads through Creation', 'Threads through the Cross' and 'Threads through Revelation' to create one incredible display of textile art. 'Threads through Creation' and



'Threads through Revelation' have been displayed in many cathedrals in Britain: this is the first time they will come together with 'Threads through the Cross'. It's a rare opportunity not to be missed. This year only three places in the country are hosting the exhibition – Southwell Minster, plus Liverpool Cathedral and Ely Cathedral.

It consists of 44 huge panels with a textile depiction from the first pages of the Bible in Threads through Creation, through key moments in Jesus' life, death and resurrection in Threads through the Cross, to the extraordinary visions of the last book in the Bible, in Threads through Revelation.

The work took ten years to create. There are more than 25 million stitches and if presented side by side, the 44 panels would stretch more than 80 metres.

This will probably be not only the largest textile project by a single artist ever, but also the largest textile project for over 600 years. It will be astonishing in its scale and variety and the Minster organisers are very excited to be hosting such a wonderful installation at Southwell Minster.

The Minster suggests a donation of $\pounds 5$ per person or $\pounds 10$ for families, since it costs over $\pounds 3,000$ per day to keep the Minster open.

There are certain dates when other events or services are taking place in the Minster and you are advised to check the web site before planning your visit.

Citizens Advice gives advice Central Nottinghamshire

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Lots of people are entitled to a benefit called Attendance Allowance but don't know enough about it to claim. Attendance Allowance isn't means tested so it doesn't matter what other money you get. It doesn't matter how much you have in savings either - there's no limit. It won't affect your state pension and you can claim it if you're still working and earning money.

You could get £72.65 or £108.55 a week - the amount you get will depend on how much help you need. You can spend the money however you like - it could help you stay independent in your own home for longer. You'll need to complete a long claim form when you apply for Attendance Allowance. It might seem daunting at first but help is available from your nearest Citizens Advice office so don't let the form put you off applying.

Attendance Allowance is a tax-free benefit. You'll be exempt from the Benefit Cap so you won't have money taken away from any other benefits. Claiming Attendance Allowance might also mean you're entitled to extra help - for example, you might qualify for a council tax reduction (this depends on your personal circumstances).

You won't be able to get Attendance Allowance if you already get:

- Personal Independence Payment (PIP)
- Disability Living Allowance (DLA) to pay for your care (the 'care component' of DLA)
- Adult Disability Payment

Check if you're entitled to Attendance Allowance

You need to be State Pension age to claim Attendance Allowance. You also need to have a disability or illness that makes it hard for you to look after yourself.

You should apply for Attendance Allowance if you have a disability or illness and need help or supervision throughout the day or at times during the night (even if you don't currently get that help):

• with your personal care - for example getting dressed, eating or drinking, getting in and out of bed, bathing or

showering and going to the toilet

• to stay safe

You should also apply if you have difficulties with personal tasks, for example if they take you a long time, you experience pain or you need physical help, like a chair to lean on. It might help if you compare how you do the personal tasks now to how you used to do them.

Attendance Allowance isn't just for people with a physical disability or illness. You should also claim if you need help or supervision throughout the day or night and have:

- a mental health condition
- learning difficulties
- a sensory condition for example if you're deaf or blind

Special rules apply if you're terminally ill. Give us a call to find out more around claiming attendance allowance when terminally ill.

You must have had care or supervision needs because of your disability or illness for at least 6 months before you can get Attendance Allowance.

You don't need to have had a diagnosis for your condition to apply for Attendance Allowance. For example, you might still be having tests or appointments to find out what's wrong with you. As long as you've needed help or supervision, or you've had difficulties, for 6 months because of your condition you can claim Attendance Allowance.

You can save time with your claim by applying before the end of the 6 months but you won't get any money until then.
