Laxton History Group



Finally, after two and a half years' effort, the History Group were able to reveal the results of all the members' hard work. Throughout the Heritage

Lottery Funded project we have kept villagers informed of progress via the magazine, but now the reality was there for all to see.

To say it was a relief would be an understatement. We planned to package up the sets of booklets at our June meeting, but come the day we had only half of them. The second pair were delayed by the printer's binding machine breaking down and as a result they were only available

for collection from Nottingham a couple of days before our launch.

We were pleased to welcome Yvonne Woodhead, Chairman of Nottinghamshire County Council and her escort; Tony Roberts, Chairman of Newark & Sherwood Council and our County and District councillors Bruce Laughton and Sylvia Michael.

We were pleased that Mark Dorrington, Keeper of Manuscripts & Special Collections at the University of Nottingham was able to attend. The



correspondence files in the Manvers Collection there were the source of a vast amount of information on the day to day life of the village. These papers came from the Thoresby Estate and it was flattering to be joined by the whole of the present day team of archivists from the Estate. Our Honorary President and mentor Prof. John Beckett joined our Project Leader Roger Cottee in presenting the project to our guests.





Roger described the we had undertaken to gather the information, bring it back to Laxton and make it available to the authors of the booklets. Each had taken a topic area and addressed the challenges of summarising substantially more information than we anticipated we would find to paint a picture of aspects of Laxton at the turn of the last century. In Roger's case this involved discovering more about those who had gone to fight in World War I, and in particular those who had died and are remembered on the war memorials at the church.

We were grateful to Mr Hugh Matheson, a direct descendent of the Lords Manvers, for his speech in support of the work we have done in uncovering this period of the grass

roots history of Laxton.

Two teachers, representing Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 (infant and junior), had worked with us and enabled us to produce a complementary Teaching and Learning pack. It was great that both were able to join us. The materials they helped develop will be available to all schools via our web site and printed copies were on display.



Over the two days our exhibition was open we were delighted to see over 200 people and to present them with copies of the booklets. The response was universally favourable, with most commenting on how



professional they looked.

We offer a big 'Thank you' to Andy Columbine, a Laxton resident and graphic designer, for his work in designing our smart new logo and turning our manuscripts into an attractive set of booklets.

We were impressed by the number of villagers who have



attended.

lived in Laxton for a relatively short time who came to find out more about the heritage of the village.

We followed up the public event by distributing copies to each household in

Laxton and Moorhouse. Additional copies have been produced for local schools, Nottinghamshire libraries, friends, supporters and people who helped with our research.

Luckily we had plenty of extras copies because since then we have been amazed at the demand once people saw the professional presentation. with many people asking for more for relatives and



friends with an interest in Laxton. Some are going to the USA and Canada. We still have some and we would like them to go to people with a genuine interest in Laxton, so if you would like another set but

The History Group is greatly indebted to the WI for serving refreshments throughout the event. Centenary of the Fall of Laxton's Mill



In 'Highways and Byways in Nottinghamshire' by J B Firth, published in 1916 Laxton Mill merits a mention:

"The windmill, which is a conspicuous feature in the Mill Field, grinds all the wheat that is grown in Laxton, and Laxton prides itself on growing as good wheat as any in the county. In

the old days it used to command a special price". The date is rather ironical as on 16th July 1916, as reported on a post card owned by Janet Cooke, that the mill collapsed.

This was a post mill, where the entire milling apparatus was contained in a wooden structure and supported on a massive post. The whole structure turned to enable the sails to catch the wind.

A 1935 black and white film of Laxton mentions the 'recent collapse of the mill' and refers to 'a dark patch in the golden wheat in the Mill Field', which has since grown into the small copse we see today.

On the reverse of this image of the ruins Janet's post card, dated 'Sunday afternoon July 23th 1916' says:

"The photo on the op. side is one of the old mill situated on the Top Field which fell peacefully to rest at 5.30 Sun. afternoon July 16th 1916. I think Mr Clark seems to be about the only



person who heard it fall and he said it went down with a terrible crash. In spite of being St Swithins and a lovely fine day Sunday turned wet and miserable. Mon - rained all day greatly to the disappointment of the hay-makers, but the remainder of the week was perfection.

After church on Sun. Eve a party consisting of Mr & Mrs Clark, Mr & Mrs Dewick, Aunt C and myself had a pleasant walk over the top fields and found quite a number of people looking at the old relic and we walked slowly home again had a little gossip outside came indoors and enjoyed our supper."

event is strongly supported by drivers from Laxton, Moorhouse and Egmanton. They were well represented with at least fifteen vehicles from the three communities, including well filled trailers.

The tractors followed the direct route up from Egmanton and along Main Street, along Town End and into West Field. Spectators at the



entrance to the field near Acre Edge had a wonderful view of the wide variety of vehicles making their way into the field, winding round the tracks past the open field strips and out towards the road.



Despite having set off less than an hour earlier, the vehicles had become widely spaced by the time they reached Laxton, so the off road section in West Field allowed them to stop and wait for the back markers to catch up. It gave a good chance for

the drivers to get off and stretch their legs as well as to have a chat to their friends. The convoy included families in groups all driving tractors as well as trailers comfortably fitted out for the family to come along







while one driver did the work. Some took the opportunity of such stops to change drivers.



From Laxton they travelled down to Boughton, on to Bothamsall then finally to Thoresby for a tour of the roads and tracks not normally open to the public before stopping in Perlethorpe for lunch. Paula Doyle was presented with the prize for the best turned out tractor and trailer during the break, though father George was driving it.

The afternoon proved somewhat more exciting when the gap in the line became large enough for the following driver to lose sight of who was in front of him and to take a wrong turn across the A1. Some thirty drivers set off on an uncharted course with some even ending up on the A1, presenting the

marshals with a headache when they realised what had happened and had to set about rounding everyone back up on to the planned route.



It was a late, but safe and dry, return to Tuxford and at the time of writing the event had raised over £3,000 for the cancer ward at Sheffield Hospital.

The fraudsters will glean all your personal and financial details which will then be used to contact the genuine phone provider and order a new mobile phone handset. The fraudsters will either intercept the delivery before it reaches the victim's address or order the handset to a different address.

Protect yourself

- Never provide your personal information to a third party from an unsolicited communication.
- Obtain the genuine number of the organisation being represented and verify the legitimacy of the communication.
- If the offer is too good to be true it probably is.
- If you have provided personal information and you are concerned that your identity may be compromised consider Cifas Protection Registration.

Holiday Booking Fraud

With summer holidays fast approaching, individuals are often more exposed to travel booking frauds when looking for last minute package deals / cheap flights. Whether paying upfront for a family holiday or simply booking a flight, payments are transferred only to discover that the holiday / airline ticket does not exist and was sold to you by a bogus travel company. Fraudsters will often lure in potential customers with low prices and 'one time only' offers that are simply too good to pass up, requesting payment by the preferred method of direct bank transfer.

Avoid

Paying for a holiday / airline tickets / accommodation via direct bank transfer. No reputable company will ever request payment via this method. Responding to unsolicited calls, texts or emails offering holidays at incredibly low prices.

Protect Yourself

Whenever possible, pay for your holiday by credit card as it offers increased protection.

The agreement signed by the tenant allows the Parish/Church to return the land (given reasonable notice) for burial ground. The current rent is agreed at £60.00 per annum (which was set in April 2013) at the time this sum was similar to other grazing land rented by The Crown Estate in Laxton, and agreed by the Parish Council who at that time consisted of mainly Tenant Farmers. The Glebe Field occupies 1.7 acres, and can only be used for grazing, however there are considerable constraints which reduce the grazing area of the land:

- Access is restricted

- No water

- Trees

- Fencing etc.

The new rent payable from April 2016 was agreed at an annual sum of $\pounds 68.00 (13.2\% \text{ increase})$ to be reviewed prior to April 2019. All agreed.

Inheritance Fraud Warning



Action Fraud is not an emergency service dial 999 if you are in immediate danger.

Action fraud have sent this alert:

Inheritance fraud usually occurs when you are told that someone very rich has died and you are in line to receive a huge inheritance. A fraudster claiming an official position contacts you stating that a person sharing your family name has died and left behind a vast amount of money. They suggest that you can be the beneficiary of the estate and rather than handing any 'Inheritance Tax' over to the government you can split the inheritance with the fraudster. They will stress the need for secrecy. To hurry you into making a hasty decision, they will also stress the need to act quickly.

If you respond the fraudster will ask you to pay various fees – taxes, legal, banking etc. – so they can release your non-existent inheritance. Each time you make a payment, the fraudsters will invent a reason why you cannot be paid without another payment. If you ask, you will be told why the fees cannot be taken from your inheritance and have to be paid up front.

If you become reluctant to pay the fraudsters will put pressure on you by reminding you how close you are to receiving a sum of money much greater than the fees you've already handed over. They may also ask for your bank details so they can pay the inheritance directly into your bank account. **If you hand over your bank details, the fraudsters can use them to empty your account.**

You could be a victim of inheritance fraud if:

- You've heard that someone you may be related to has died without leaving a will and you may be in line to inherit.
- You've paid fees to 'research specialists' for an estate report that includes information on the inheritance and how you can claim it.

What should you do if you're a victim of inheritance fraud?

- End all contact with the fraudsters. Don't send any more money. Don't give them your bank details.
- If you have already given the fraudsters your bank account details, alert your bank immediately.
- If you receive any threats from the fraudsters once you have stopped co-operating with them, alert the police immediately.

 Be aware that you're now likely to be a target for other frauds. Fraudsters often share details about people they have successfully targeted, using different identities to commit further frauds. People who have fallen victim to fraudsters are particularly vulnerable to the 'fraud recovery fraud'. This is when fraudsters contact people who've already lost money through fraud and claim to be law enforcement officers or lawyers. They'll advise the victim that they can help them recover their lost money – but request a fee.

Protect yourself against inheritance fraud

- Although there are legitimate companies who make a living by tracking down heirs, they do not do it in this way. If you are asked for a fee for a report, it is very likely to be bogus.
- Letters/documents provided by the fraudsters are generally badly written. Look out for spelling mistakes and poor grammar.
- Beware if you are asked to contact a webmail address such as @Yahoo or @Hotmail. As a rule, legitimate law firms do not use them.
- As in most cases of fraud, if the promise seems too good to be true, it most probably is.
