## Mothers Union

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At the June meeting we welcomed Helen Catchpole speaking on holidays provided by the Mother's Union - referred to as 'Away form it All', 'AFIA'.

Families who haven't had a holiday for two to three years are referred to Helen and her committee by various organisations e.g. Social Services, clergy, Food Banks and schools. The families are visited by two committee members to see if they qualify. Occasionally single or elderly people are given cottage or coach holidays.

The holidays are at the Haven site in Mablethorpe at the end of May. People have to make their own way there, but are given a  $\pounds 50$  Co-op voucher towards their food bill. The holiday is followed up by further visits from the same two committee members on their return.

Food hampers are provided for Christmas and children are sent birthday cards. For some families this may be the only holiday they have ever had - and Helen showed us some of the many thank you letters she has received.

The normal cost of this service is around £12,000 - Money raised by Mother's Union branches, collections from special services at the Minster, Count Your Blessings donations and Trust Funds.

The next meeting will be on 31st July, followed by an evening out for our August meeting on 21st August.

Sir John Starkey has also written to The Crown on behalf of the Visitor Centre Trust to express their concerns as well.

#### Dear Ms Milward

Thank you for your letter of 8th May setting out the concerns of the Parish Council with regards to The Crown Estate's ownership of the Laxton Estate. Please accept my sincere apologies for the delay in getting back to you however we have recently undergone an office move which has meant I have not been able to respond in as timely a fashion as I would have liked.

As you are no doubt aware in 2008 we carried out a major review of The Crown Estate's ownership of the Laxton Estate led by Norman Coward. This included interviews with all the farm tenants including Ken Shepherd, then Chair of the Laxton Parish Council, and a further 15 other stakeholders including Michael Manning, now Chair and then Vice Chair of Laxton Parish Council. As was hopefully made clear at the time, this review was carried out to ensure that the future of the open field system and the fabric and infrastructure of the Estate could be properly supported and funded.

The Crown Estate has a quite specific mandate under the terms of The Crown Estate Act which requires us to maximise the financial return that we provide to the UK Treasury, and effectively manage our assets as would any modern real estate company. As a result, the management of Laxton and its quite specific requirements can be challenging for us but we have always sought to ensure that we manage the Estate to the best of our abilities, and in accordance with both our Act and the Parliamentary Undertaking that was given regarding the ongoing management of the Estate. Our recent funding towards the new Village signs can be taken as an example of a project we can assist with which we would not do on our other Estates.

The issues of split lettings, separating land and homes, associated concerns over rural housing generally and the demographic pressures you highlight are ones that are at play almost throughout the entire UK farming industry. However in relation to Laxton specifically these issues and others, not least the uncertainly over the future of agricultural subsidies, which was highlighted back in 2008 as playing a disproportionate part in farm incomes at Laxton, have created a situation where it is difficult for both landlord and tenants to efficiently manage their respective businesses for the long term.



Notwithstanding this I can reassure you that The Crown Estate is committed to the Undertaking it gave to Parliament and our management decisions are being taken to support the current system and certainly not in any way to undermine it. There is an ongoing review, which is still being informed by the findings of the Coward Review the recommendations of which we believe are still relevant, into what is the most appropriate future management and ownership structure of the Estate. Any changes we make will have to be not only for the benefit of ourselves as Estate owner, but also for the tenants who are of course primarily responsible for the operation of the historic open field system.

We are hopeful that we will be able to come up with a proposal that will protect for the long term the agricultural social history, diverse ecological habitat, and traditional village street scene of Laxton. When we do I think we will consider ourselves obliged to discuss this with our tenants first, which may of course include members of the Council, and thereafter we would be happy to meet with the Council. At that point hopefully we would be able to share not only what will inevitably be our still quite preliminary proposals, but also the initial views of the tenants.

Please rest assured that our current management strategy has not changed, and will not do so whilst the Undertaking is in place.

As a final comment it is perhaps worth mentioning that in relation to Moorgate Farm: in our letting particulars we noted that "Any prospective tenant of the land would have to become a member and actively participate in the Court Leet. These duties include but are not limited to attending the annual Court and Jury Day"; in our adverts in both Farmers Weekly and Farmers Guardian we also confirmed "Laxton Estate was never fully enclosed. The Estate's Three Field System operates at Moorgate Farm. Applicants must engage with this Estate structure"; and these commitments formed part of our assessment of prospective applicants.

Last month we had one of our

We encountered some diversions as we came into the town through pretty villages constructed from the same stone as appears in the

Cotswolds. It was a lovely day and we were able to park in the grounds of the castle. Able on two counts firstly there is a small car park beside it and secondly due to the skill of our driver and everyone on the bus breathing in hard as we squeezed through the narrowest of arches. There was a surprise in store as it is a very different building from a typical castle. It looks more like a hall, but we were told that the early fortifications around it qualify it as a castle. These have been ceremonially presented by visiting royalty on their first visit for hundreds of years. The earliest one is a large, iron shoe. Others are of similar size, but over the years as it became clear that the wall space would soon be exhausted, smaller shoes have been made and fitted inside the

larger ones. A local farrier is commissioned to undertake the making so to can be guaranteed to fit the space allocated to it.

We enjoyed a short talk on arrival and were then free to explore. There was a craft event taking place in a further room and it was nice to be able to see the varied and

attractive works on sale.

After the tour we were free to do as we pleased until we met up again to go home.

For some it was an opportunity to look around the historic buildings, museum and church and for others a chance to shop.

Our speaker in July was Penny Forsythe who spoke about Bee Keeping. Things got off to a bad start when her projector refused to talk to her computer. Fortunately help was soon at hand after Joy pressed her car into service as a white charger and fetched Penny's knight in shining armour in the familiar form of Dik. After a stern talking to all was well.

Penny gave a fascinating insight into the lives of bees, the different types of bee and what is involved in responsible bee keeping before offering us the chance to sample some of her delicious local honey.

A 'retirement birthday' gift had started Penny on the road to bee keeping. She now has 23 hives and sells honey from a stall in Retford.

We learned that the Romans had kept bees. They kept them in terracotta pots and would throw them onto their enemies if they were under attack.

The honey is made by the bees as a store of food for the winter. They don't hibernate, but reduce their numbers and cluster on the combs until spring. The honey in the comb will keep indefinitely. A half pound jar is equivalent to a half million bee lifetimes.



Individual bees are short lived but the colony can live as long as they have room to move and create new, clean combs. When everything is in



balance the wax moth follows behind the bees eating the abandoned combs and creating fresh space which they can later return to.

Penny spent some time discussing the threats which face bees today and the consequences for us as a species if we lose our pollinators. It was not an attractive prospect and she urged us to plant for bees in our gardens.

At the end of the evening Penny was thanked for her talk and invited to judge our competition for a home made bee. The winner was Bridget with her pretty bee themed card, followed by Jeanette and Mavis.

Saturday 15th July saw the Notts County Federation's celebration of its centenary at North Muskham. There were around 40 stalls, crafts, WI food and games - some of which were really different and may appear here at future events!



All the county WIs were asked for a proposal for a stall or game earlier in the year. 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### The Hewerdines of Laxton: Hewerdine / Merrills Sons

In this episode Jenni Dobson looks at the story of John Hewerdine who was born in 1833 at Westborough. He married Sarah Strong in 1863 and his death on 19th January 1910 is presumed to have occurred at Kneesall.

Sarah Strong was born in 1841 at Coleby, Lincs., the daughter of John and Frances Strong. She died in 1929.



John was the only brother of Jane, Charlotte and Mary Hewerdine to remain in England, the others having emigrated to America.

Though Westborough is east of the Great North Road, John possibly travelled north along it to attend Newark hiring fairs, held annually, where both men and women would seek work. In both 1851 and 1861 he worked in villages on this route, at Carlton-on-Trent and South Muskham respectively.

At Muskham, he met a fellow servant, Sarah Strong, whom he married in 1863. They had George H, born in 1865; Charlotte, born 1866; William, born 1868; John, born 1870 and Sarah A (Annie ) born 1875.

In 1867 the new Representation of the People Act brought the benefit of the vote to almost twice as many people by introducing changed qualifying criteria. Those occupying a property which qualified by means of a minimum rateable value became eligible to vote, and John Hewerdine was an early beneficiary, appearing in a list of voters for the Doddington area which ancestry.co.uk have added to their collection.

The 1871 census showed John living at Doddington, Lincs, with his widowed father, William, who died in 1873. John was an agricultural labourer but by 1881, he is a foreman, living at Westborough. His eldest

son, George, aged 16, was also an 'ag.lab.'.

At some time during the next decade, John moved to Laxton. In the meantime his sister, Jane, died but his two elder nephews, William and Joseph Merrills, still lived in Laxton.

The 1891 census shows a 'Thomas' Hewerdine living at Park Farm, but I believe this is an error by the enumerator. The age is right at 57 for it to be John, the wife is 'Sarah' born at Coleby, Lincs., and the children, George H, now 25 and Sarah A, now 16, also match. Other papers examined during the recent Lottery-funded Laxton History Group project also include mention of a J Hewerdine.

It's worth considering why John made this move. Perhaps his sister and brother-in-law told him of a farm becoming available but another factor may have been the decline in agricultural work taking place nationally. A simple survey comparing the occupations of the inhabitants of Long Bennington, Lincs, (where John's sister Mary lived), between the 1881 and 1891 censuses, shows that about 20% fewer people were engaged in agricultural labour, though the population of the village had diminished by only 10%.

However, it had taken John some time to rise to foreman and maybe the appeal of Laxton was to farm for himself, not for an employer.

In 1901, John and Sarah lived at East Park Farm, which may be the same farm that he took in 1891, as it is the next entry to Breck Wong in both censuses.

By 1902, rising 70, John was considering retirement. A letter from Mr Wordsworth the Thoresby Estate Land Agent, dated 24th Sep, referred to John's notice to quit what is now known as Brecks Farm at Moorhouse. In 1905 an Estate letter was addressed to Mr J Hewerdine of Park Farm, Kneesall and this is the address in the National Probate Calendar for John following his death, probate being granted at Nottingham to his son, George. Neither John nor Sarah was buried at Laxton. Kneesall records at Notts Archives currently end at 1901 so burials have not yet been traced there.

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# Dinosaurs of China

If you have been into Nottingham recently, you could not fail to know that there is an exhibition taking place between 1st July and 29th October featuring the 'Dinosaurs of China', subtitled 'Ground Shakers to Feathered Flyers.' The main site of the exhibition is at Wollaton Hall, with a subsidiary exhibition at Nottingham University's Lakeside Museum. It aims to show how modern birds are descended from dinosaurs and includes some finds from the last 20 years which show some to have been feathered.

The exhibition was five years in preparation. Students in Beijing first produced ideas for a hypothetical exhibition as part of their course work then, as the idea took root, students in Nottingham were given a similar brief. The public were consulted on their ideas and strongly supported the idea.

Wollaton Hall was identified as a suitable venue because of its situation in a park where wild animals and birds abound and also because the Natural History Museum there is one of the largest outside London and has exhibits which could be incorporated into the whole idea.

With support from the Chinese, the City and County Councils and the University the project got under way and the majority of the planning and execution took place in the last year. Suitable dinosaur fossils for display were identified and plans made for them to be brought here. Some are the actual bones and others are casts made from the finds.

All had to be dismantled, packed for transit and shipped here. The sea and land journey from Beijing took 50 days. The assembly of the largest specimen, Mamenchiasaurus, had to be completed first. It has been presented rearing up to get it into the building at all and is the height of 3 double decker buses. The scaffolding used to erect it had to be removed before the remainder of the exhibits could be set up.

The space was meticulously measured and everything was checked and double checked. A special ramp construction was needed to raise the crates to the level of the door, and to everyone's relief it all went in. The designers have cleverly incorporated the packing crates into the display as they will be needed for the return journey and would be a headache to store.

7,000 people went to see the exhibition on its first weekend. Booked entry times and parking are available from <u>www.dinosaursofchina.co.uk</u> and there is an accompanying series of free talks at Lakeside. The programme is on the web site.

# Citizens Advice Sherwood and Newark takes a stand against scams

Citizens Advice **Sherwood and Newark** is spreading the word about scams to help stop more people across Newark and Sherwood from being conned. The charity is took part in Scams Awareness Month, a campaign which encouraged people to report and talk about scams, which ran during July. The drive to get more people reporting scams came as national Citizens Advice revealed a 17% increase in people being scammed after purchasing 'phantom goods'. The scam works by conning shoppers into buying high value items, mainly online, which turn out not to exist. The average loss was £1,100. People were most likely to be scammed when buying cars, flights and furniture. Other 'phantom goods' included jewellery and cameras. The Citizens Advice consumer service received 555 reports of 'phantom goods' scams during January and March 2017, compared with 495 over the same period the year before. Scams operating in the local area reported to Citizens Advice Sherwood and Newark over the past year include computer virus scams where a scammer calls someone up and says their computer has a virus which they can fix remotely.

Being scammed can ruin people's finances. People can lose significant amounts from phantom good scams, so it's important they don't rush into online purchases until they're sure seller is genuine. People are urged to report and talk about scams so that more fraudsters can be stopped. People can also visit or call the Citizens Advice consumer service if they want advice on whether something is a genuine deal or a scam, or for advice if they have been scammed.

All reputable traders will happily provide a quote free of charge.

If a caller is trying to sell you goods you should always say 'No'. The potential for a bargain is simply not worth the risk and worry of falling for a con - and victims can be any age, not just elderly!
