#### Dear Friends

As we prepare for Christmas, I wonder what's on your wish list – what do you long for most for this Christmas? One of my longings is that everyone gets the opportunity to hear, know and experience in their own lives, the difference that Christmas story makes to all of us - this is a gift that money can't buy!

Over 2000 years ago, God did something that was unexpected and was the answer to our deepest longing. Congratulations are in order for Sophie Turner after winning the twin titles of Scottish and Great Britain Apprentice of the year 2016, for her work at St Magnus Cathedral on Main Island, Orkney.

Sophie left Egmanton a number of years ago with her parents to live in Orkney where she finished her schooling, attended university at Edinburgh and obtained a degree in Fine Arts and Photography. She then, instead of continuing her university education and not liking the rush and bustle of a modern city was glad to return to Orkney for some peace and serenity.

Sophie excels at anything she takes on and her apprenticeship as a stone mason exceeded

everyone's expectation. It is almost unheard of for a female to have a career in a male dominated craft, but Sophie saw this as a challenge which she took 'head on'. Whilst her work was mainly at St Magnus she also spent time at Elgin college where she took her final exams

Sophie completed her apprenticeship earlier this year and received the awards at a ceremony on London run by the Construction Industry Training Board (C.I.T.B.) from Adrian Belton who presented the awards.

Sophie knew she was in the running for the Scottish award but she was pleasantly surprised when it was announced she had won the one for the whole of Great Britain as well. She is now the resident mason at St.Magnus, following the retirement of her predecessor who guided her through her apprenticeship and passed on many of his skills who says that the building is in safe hands.

## Laxton History Group



We have continued to work on our three new booklets and they now have titles. The set is called 'Laxton Stories'. Volume 1 is 'Village Folk', Volume 2

is 'Village Buildings' and Volume 3 is 'The Variety of Village Life'. They tell the stories of some of the individuals in the village during the period we studied from 1900 - 1920, look at some of the key buildings in the village and what was happening to them at the time and finally bring to light some of the less well known aspects of everyday life which influenced life here.

Residents may be interested to know that they will be able to look up who lived in their house in 1911, which is something many people have expressed interest in.

At our October meeting we had a record attendance and welcomed several visitors to hear from Nick Brown, Resident Agent at Thoresby, which is now known as part of the Pierrepont Estates.

The name 'Pierrepont Estate' encompasses all the lands it owns. The Pierrepont family came over with the Normans, were granted lands in Sussex and in 1314 Henry de Pierrepont married Annora de Manvers. Through the marriage he acquired the lands in Nottinghamshire which include what today is called Holme Pierrepont. They retained these lands until 1941 when they were sold. Nick brought the red leather bound sale particulars which bore the dates 1279 - 1941 which was displayed for us to see.

The lands around Thoresby were acquired in the early 17th century. The family have built three houses there. The first was designed by Talman, who also designed Chatsworth and burned down in 1745. The second house was designed by Carr of York and cost £17,000 in 1771. It was pulled down and replaced by the present house after around 100 years. The house we know today as Thoresby Hall was designed by Anthony Salvin and completed in 1874 at a cost of £171,000. The family's Bath Estate was sold to finance the new build. As we saw later, this did not prove to be a good move financially.

The family held a sequence of titles and the Estate has changed hands via several indirect routes over time. A Charles Meadows inherited and he took the name Pierrepont. He became Baron Pierrepont, then quite quickly Viscount Newark and finally Earl Kingston. The Earldom was inherited by title holders who were politically astute, managing to be on the right side at different periods around the time of the Civil War. The title of Duke of Kingston was conferred but short lived, dying out after the second Duke. He had inherited aged 15.

The last title was that of Earl Manvers, which also died out for lack of a male heir, this time after the 6th Earl. The 6th Earl negotiated the sale of Laxton to the Ministry of Agriculture before his death in 1955, realising that by this means its heritage could be preserved and his death duties could be offset. His daughter, Lady Rozelle was the only one of the Earl's children to survive to adulthood and she inherited the Estate on his death.

In 1980 the Coal Board bought the Hall in a compulsory purchase. Only £400,000 was paid, which was a very small increase on the cost of building over 100 years. The value of the Bath Estate, which had financed the build would surely have been vastly more. Having bought it, the Coal Board never extended mining operations under the Hall and after Countess Manvers died in 1987 they sold it for £1.5million. Over a period of 12 years the building passed through various hands with disastrous effect, becoming semi derelict and being placed on the 'At Risk' Register. Eventually it was sold to Warner who undertook an excellent restoration and created the very successful country house hotel which remains today.

Nick gave a summary of the land and property in the ownership of the Pierrepont Estates today. He remarked that until last year when a new farm tenant was granted a lease, Mike Jackson was the Estate's newest tenant – having arrived in 1974.

The Stonebridge Trust looks after Thoresby Courtyard, the former stables and riding hall. It houses the family archive and arts facilities. Research currently being conducted indicates that the lake in Thoresby Park may be the first such feature created for purely ornamental purposes in parkland in the country.

Nick took questions and answering one he said it was unlikely that the Estates would buy back Laxton, but they did maintain a strong interest and would very likely want to be involved if Laxton were to be the subject to a significant change in the future.

Our next meeting on November 16th will be reported in January's edition along with our Christmas Craft Fayre as they will miss the copy deadline. We are looking forward to a talk from Howard Heeley about Stained Glass Windows in Nottinghamshire which relate to the Air Force. We do not meet in December.

## History Group Notice Board

We have been fortunate to be allowed to redirect some of the money we were given by the Heritage Lottery Fund to pay for a noticeboard to be sited in the village.

This will enable us to make public to residents and visitors alike where they can find the text of our booklets and Educational Resources. We will also use it to publicise our meetings and the programme for the year as well as occasional events.

It will be positioned between the bench and telephone box which is a good, central position for people to see it.

We have chosen the green colour we are associated with to differentiate it from the County Council noticeboard outside the Village Hall. Our new logo has been incorporated into the top panel and looks really smart, picked out in gold.

Many thanks to Jean Hennell who has worked with the suppliers on the design of the board and paid several visits with John Chambers, our Chairman, to ensure we got just what we wanted.

## New Village Signs - Update

Just a quick update regarding the new signs. An order for the Laxton signs has now been placed and completion is expected in around 10 weeks.

Regarding the Moorhouse signs, they are still at the consultation stage and as soon as they have agreed, an order can be placed.

The reason Laxton has moved more quickly is that



The Crown, having agreed to fund the Laxton signs, is wanting the Project to be completed as soon as possible.

Those new to the village may not realise that many of the houses and all but one of the farms are owned by the Crown Estate. This came about because the Estate was in the ownership of the Pierrepont family, later the Earls Manvers, at Thoresby Hall. In the early 1950s the Estate was sold to the Ministry of Agriculture to hold for the nation. It then passed to the Crown Estate in the 1980s, and the Estate is the current Landlord.

Moorhouse was never in the ownership of the Pierreponts, with the exception of Church Farm, which was sold into private ownership many years ago. The Denison family of Ossington owned much of the land.

The historical difference accounts for the Crown, as landlords, funding the signs for Laxton but not for Moorhouse. Separate funding will pay for Moorhouse.

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
## It's Panto Time. Oh Yes it Is!

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## Health Matters: Childhood Vaccinations 2

Leading on from last month's look at the vaccination programme for infants during their first four months of life, this month we look at the remaining vaccines that children should receive before they go to school.

#### **One Year Injections**

At one year infants receive four vaccinations. The first is a booster for Haemophilus influenza type b (Hib), which is combined with a vaccine for Meningitis C. The vaccine for Meningitis C



was previously given in the first few months of life, but protection against Meningitis B was considered more important at this stage as younger infants are more vulnerable to this particular strain of the disease. The second vaccination is a booster for Pneumococcus. The third is the combined vaccine for Measles Mumps and Rubella (MMR), and the fourth is a booster against Meningitis B. A booster for Meningitis C is given at age 14 years.

#### Seasonal Influenza Vaccine for ages 2-6 years

Seasonal nasal vaccine is offered to all children between 2 and 6 tears from September each year. For children at school this should be done at school. For those pre-school this can be obtained from your GP surgery.

#### Injections at 40 months (3 years and 4 months)

At this pre-school time there are 2 further vaccinations. The first is a second MMR vaccination which increases the effective cover against these diseases. The second is a booster against Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis (whooping cough) and Polio. A further booster against Tetanus Diphtheria and Polio is given at age 14 years.

## What are the conditions that these vaccines confer protection against (but not previously discussed last month?

**Meningitis C** is the second most common cause of bacterial meningitis in the UK, a serious condition that can be fatal if not treated quickly. In addition it can cause septicaemia, pneumonia, conjunctivitis (eye infections), septic arthritis (joint infections) and myocarditis (inflammation of the heart).

**Measles** is a highly contagious viral infection, which begins like a bad cold with a temperature and a rash. Symptoms last for a week and a child can feel quite miserable and develop a bad cough. The reason that we vaccinate against this disease is because serious complications can result from this illness in as many as one in 15 children affected. It is the most likely of all the childhood illnesses to cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) which can sometimes cause brain damage. It can also cause convulsions (fits), ear infections, and pneumonia which can lead to long term lung problems. Unfortunately even in this country a few children die of measles each year, and measles is becoming more common again due to the increasing number of children not receiving the MMR vaccine.

**Mumps** is a viral infection that causes swelling of the salivary glands and is usually a mild illness, but distressing as the child cannot usually swallow the increased amount of saliva that they produce whilst the glands are swollen. Like measles it can cause serious complications such as inflammation of the pancreas, the organ that produces insulin and digestive enzymes (pancreatitis), inflammation of the testes in boys (orchitis), viral meningitis and encephalitis. Mumps is equally dangerous to both boys and girls and can cause permanent deafness in either ear.

**Rubella or German Measles** is usually a mild viral illness that causes a rash, a sore throat and swollen glands. It is not usually dangerous to the child and the reason for the vaccination is to provide lifelong immunity to this condition. It is very dangerous for the unborn children of pregnant women as it can causes significant damage to the heart, brain, hearing and sight, leading to what is called congenital rubella syndrome. The vaccine was introduced in 1970 and has seen a dramatic reduction in the number of babies with congenital rubella syndrome.

Even if your child has had one or more of these conditions before the age of one, they should still have the MMR vaccination. Large studies have all concluded that there is NO evidence that MMR vaccination is related to either autism or inflammatory bowel disease.

**Citizens Advice Sherwood & Newark** is now urging people who are struggling to keep on top of their debts to seek advice early on, so they have the best chance of repaying their debts and avoiding debt write-offs.
