Remembrance Service

Our annual Harvest Festival was held in church on Friday 14th October and the service was taken by the Rev Alastair Littlewood. Thanks to Graham for playing the organ so that we could sing some



good old harvest hymns and thanks to Simon and Stuart for reading the lessons



Supper of roast pork cobs with stuffing and apple sauce were provided by Anna and Simon. Jean and Lesley provided apple pies and Janet the teas and coffee. I hope everyone enjoyed it. It's so difficult to know how to cater for these occasions especially when you don't know how many are coming as well as trying to keep the costs down.

Church Meeting

I recently attended a meeting at Eakring with representatives of the rest of our Group of churches. The meeting was chaired by the Archdeacon Tors Ramsey, also the Area Dean Rev John Chambers and our Deanery Administrator, Paula.

The meeting was called to discuss what was happening within our group and also the future. Tors had been looking at splitting our group and putting us with other churches or benefice. As Laxton, Moorhouse, Wellow and Kneesall are already a benefice, this would take a long drawn out legal process. Other church groups are in the same situation such as the Norwell, Caunton and Sutton group. They have no Priest in Charge.

Our Archdeacon said she had been in conversation with someone about a 'House for Duty' post, which is in the early stages. That means the priest can live in a church house rent free in exchange for taking services etc.

We don't seem to be getting any further or getting any answers about the future, but we must keep together and work to keep our church open. We don't want our lovely old Grade I listed church to close after all these years.

Laxton Traditions - Court Day

Last month we described the background to Laxton's Jury Day and its part in the farming heritage of the village. Jury Day 2022 is scheduled to take place on Thursday 24th November, which falls after this edition will have gone to print.

The following week is Court Day. Many people think that the strips are what makes Laxton unique, but in fact the truly unique feature is the Court Leet. This is the last surviving manorial court in the country to maintain its powers to determine legal proceedings and levy fines.

The Administration of Justice Act was revised in 1977, and at this point Laxton was listed to lose these powers. Luckily the Steward at the time, a representative of Tallents Solicitors in Newark, stepped in and made it known that the powers are still used here. As a result, Laxton became the only place to retain such powers in relation to a crop rotation system. (The Act also includes the Estray Court of Denbeigh, which has powers relating to rounding up stray sheep.)

The Court Leet has three officers. These are:

- 1. The Steward, who is a solicitor appointed by the Lord of the Manor. Currently this is Alistair Millar, a partner at Tallents in Southwell. He has served in this capacity for approximately 15 years and he ensures that the legal requirements are fulfilled, including undertaking the swearing in of the Jury members.
- The Bailiff, Robert Haigh. Robert is a Laxton farmer and succeeded Edmund Rose in the role 20 years ago
- 3. The Clerk to the Gaits & Commons, Stuart Rose, who succeeded his father Reg in the role. Stuart is another Laxton Farmer and his role combines the duties of Secretary and Treasurer. He manages the funds from various sources made available to the Open Fields and those who farm them.

Each of the three Open Fields has a Foreman who holds a permanent appointment. Currently these are Roy Hennell (Mill Field), Johnny Godson (West Field) and Ivan Rayner (South Field). All are Laxton farmers who are descended from at least one previous generation who farmed here.

Duties of the Court are to appoint the members of the Jury, also referred to as the Homage, who will inspect the wheat field the following November and to deal with the issues arising from the inspection the week before the Court meets. Other matters may arise

from time to time and are also dealt with during the session.

The Bailiff summons the members to attend and asks individuals if they will serve on the new Jury. At one time a person may have done this only every few years, but now that the number of farms is so low, most members serve every year.



The court is a public event and so anyone can choose to attend to observe, but guests have no right to speak. Until last year the venue was The Dovecote, but the small rooms do not lend themselves to either the larger numbers attending in recent years or providing enough space for current health recommendations. Last year the move was made to the Village Hall, which looks like being the venue of choice from now on.

Robert reads a traditional proclamation to open the proceedings of the Court. The new Jury members are then sworn in. The Foreman of the field which is has been sown with wheat is first, taking a longer oath on behalf of his fellows for the coming year. Traditionally the other members were sworn in as groups of four, but since Covid it has been done individually.



The Steward calls the names on the Manor Suit Roll, which is a list of people living within the manor boundaries who are eligible for the Jury. If they fail to attend a 2p essoign, a particular type of penalty payment, is paid for each.

The Court then considers any matters arising from actions

agreed the previous December and goes on to look at the transgressions noted by the inspecting Jury the week before. Suggested fines are read out where appropriate and once agreed are entered in the Court record. Any issues which have arisen since the previous Court are discussed and when all matters have been resolved and actions agreed, Robert reads a further traditional proclamation to bring the proceedings to a close. Following this there is usually an opportunity to discuss any matters of local importance which fall outside the jurisdiction of the Court.

This year Court Day falls on Thursday 1st December at 10.30am.

Our Remembrance Sunday Group Service was held this year at Saint Edmund's Church, Walesby. The service was taken by our Area Dean, the Rev Canon John Chambers. Wreaths were laid by Laxton, Moorhouse, Egmanton, Wellow, Kirton, Walesby, Laxton Parish Council and the Rotary Club.

Jon played the Last Post and Reveille on the bugle and the National Anthem was sung. After the service tea and coffee were served in the church hall.

A Little Church History

We have just acquired a new register of services for our church. Our old one has just lasted 40 years. The new one is a little thicker so I wonder how long this one will last. Will it still be in use in 40 years time, or will our church be closed, as now we are only getting one service a month? What will it be like in a few years time. With the decline in the congregations all




over the churches and the drop in the number of curates going forward to be ordained, it is a worry as to what will happen.

Our old register cost a total of £7.50 including VAT. The new one was £33.25.

The first entry in the old register was on Saturday, October 31, 1982 and our vicar at the time was the Rev Jack Hassett. It was the wedding of Albert Elliott, our church warden, and Mrs Winifred Ward, Enrolling Member of the Mothers Union.

It makes interesting reading. On Sunday 31st October there was a Holy Communion service and a family service. On 7th November there were also two services. On the following Tuesday the funeral of Wilfred Rayner (uncle of Ivan) was held and on the 25th November



the funeral of Mary Elizabeth Frecknall took place. She was the grandmother of Stuart Julie and Geoff Rose.

The Rev Hassett was with us until the end of February 1983 until he retired to go and live down south. On 17th of March 1983 we welcomed our new vicar the Rev Clive Handford.

He was installed as vicar of Kneesall with Laxton, licensed as priest in charge of Wellow and licensed as a rural dean of the Norwell and Tuxford deaneries by the Bishop of Southwell.

Our first entry was a wedding on the 31st of October 1982 and the last was our harvest festival on the 14th of October 2022



The Church of St Michael dates from the 12th century. At that time, burial within the church was reserved for a few people, including lords of the manor. The Lexington family had their burial place to the north of the chancel and before 1257, John de Lexington founded a chantry chapel with an altar built there. At the same time, the asiles were enlarged and a little later, in the early 14th century, the chancel was rebuilt. The Everingham family were buried in their chapel on the south side of the chancel. At the end of the 15th century, the top row of windows

Monuments inside the church represent members of the Everingham (amily. Adam de Everingham (who died in 1341) is accompanied by both his wives, Clarissa and Morgery. The oak effigy of Margery Everingham (died in 1336), who was his second wife, is the only surviving wooden effigy in Nottinghamshire. The figures lie on a bose made up of pieces from the altar that used to stand in the Lexington chapel.


(known as clerestory) was added, as well as the gargoyles between each window on

the outside and the carvings of angels and anostles on the inside.

During the 18th century, many churches suffered from a lack of maintenance and Laxton was no exception. In the 1790s, John Throsby was appalled by the state of the building, describing the north chapel as "the foulest man ever saw".

LAXTON

The Church of St Michael the Archangel





In the 19th century, Earl Manwers, lord of the manor, pold for a drastic remodelling of the church, which took place from 1859 to 1860. The tower was taken down, the nave shortened by one bay, the aisles reduced in whith and the chapels demolished. The materials were then used to rebuild the tower further to the east, at the end of the shortened nave. You can see the starting point of the arch that was removed inside the church, on the south side of the nave. The seating capacity was reduced from 397 places to 295.

CHANTRY CHAPEL

Wealthy patrons would pay for a priest to conduct masses for the souls of themselves and their families. Often, a new chapel with an altar would be constructed within the church, where the masses took place, and this was known as a chantry chapel.



The church before 1860



In front of you are the remains of a medieval castle built by a great Norman landowner called Robert de Caux. In the 12th century, he was appointed hereditary Keeper of Sherwood Forest. The size of the castle reflected this important role, and many royal visitors were received here.

In the 1230s, the castle and responsibility for Sherwood Forest passed to the Everingham family. In 1286, Robert de Everingham was imprisoned at Nottingham for trespass on the king's deer – he had been poaching.

The castle fell out of use during the 14th century. When the Roos family acquired the manor of Laxton in the mid-15th century, the old castle was no longer a desirable blace to live.

THE MOTTE

This motte, the largest in Nottinghamshire, is nearly 22 metres high and 37 metres across the top. The buildings on top of the motte were the hub of the feudal castle, dominating the village and the surrounding area.

THE INNER BAILEY

The inner bailey defences were built during the earliest days of the castle. The enormous bank may once have been capped by stone walls. Within the bailey were buildings essential for the working life of the castle: stables, accommodation and kitchens.

THE OUTER BAILEY

This outer enclosure is a later extension to the castle. It was probably built after the de Caux family became the Keepers of Sherwood Forest in the 12th century.

THE POST-MEDIEVAL CASTLE

A new manor house was built in the inner bailey. This house, the old costle motte and the baileys are shown on Mark Pierce's 1635 map of Laxton (pictured left). At the same time, many of the medieval earthworks were reduced in height to give better views from the house and gardens. Traces of buildings survive as hollows, where the foundations have been dug out.

The earthwork mound crowning the motte appears to be a garden feature belonging to the house. It is known locally as Pan Pudding Hill, and is likely to have been a prospect mound, from which to view the gardens below.



A46 Dualling Around Newark









Holly Rye is a teacher who will be coming to Egmanton to give a free taster session in the Hall on **December 1st.** The session will be mixed



Don't Forget to Use Old Stamps

The familiar stamps issued by Royal Mail are being replaced by bar coded equivalents as we mentioned several months ago. The final date for using the old ones is rapidly approaching.



Non bar-coded stamps issued as Christmas specials or other pictorial commemorative stamps continue to be valid and need not be swapped.

We all like our seasonal stamps, but this year Royal Mail are urging people to use up the stamps they have in stock without bar codes. This applies to "eligible stamps", which are defined as the regular 1st and 2nd class stamps featuring the profile of the Queen and those that show any other value.

Any commemorative pictorial stamps, such as those issued for previous Christmases or special events, remain valid for postage and do not need to be swapped out.

There is a form available which simply asks for your name and address plus the number of stamps you want to swap. This has to be completed in capital letters and placed in an envelope with the stamps you want to swap.

Self adhesive stamps must be stuck to their original paper backing or book and any which are not self adhesive need to be stuck to a **sheet of paper. The envelop should them be sent to** 'Freepost SWAP OUT' by 31st January.

The above instructions apply to a combined stamp value of under £200. For stamps of a combined value of over £200, see **royalmail.com/barcodedstamps** for more information.

Kneesall Village Signs

Kneesall Parish Council recently successfully applied for a grant to erect the kind of cast iron village signs we have in Laxton, and which are such an attractive feature of many small local communities in this area.

They were directed towards the designer Vanessa Morris who hand crafted the signs in three dimensions. Villagers had been asked to supply images which might be used on the signs and she drew her inspiration from these and ideas put to her for the overall feel of the signs.

She used villagers' images, distilled the essence of our ideas, including Mr Ian Thorne's unique crest. She also used photographs of the cattle at Ompton for the Kneesall and Ompton Gateway signs.



The designs for the signs were crafted to give a relief effect before they



were cast at a foundry. When the cast signs were returned, Vanessa Morris hand painted the enamel onto them before they were fired at high temperatures to bake the enamel to the metal.

Vanessa's hand made master

designs are in storage in case any of the signs are damaged by traffic! It's worth taking a closer look at the signs to appreciate the unique designs capturing the essence of these villages.

Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council Draft Minutes of the Meeting 27/9/22

Present: Councillors:

M. Manning (chair), R. Hennell, M.Hennell, J. Godson, J.Hill, S.Rose

In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Wilson (Clerk), S. Michael (District councillor), Members of the public (x3)

- 1. **Apologies for absence:** Apologies for absence were received and accepted from Mr S Hill. Mr Pringle was also absent.
- Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 10 (Property matters – including sports field and Glebe Field). There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. Dispensations: None required.
- 4. 10 Minutes public speaking: A resident explained that they had attended because they had understood that a police representative was attending the meeting. The chair stated that he had wanted to raise the issue of intruders and attempts to remove property which had recently been experienced in the parish. Mr Rose listed a number of different incidents which had occurred recently. It was noted that the police have a rural crime unit but it does not appear to be providing a deterrent.

Mrs Michael drew attention to the role of the Safer Neighbourhood Group which discusses incidents in the villages in the area. However, the police often say that unless issues are reported at the time, it is difficult for them to take action retrospectively. Councillors noted that the next meeting is in 2 -3 weeks' time. The possibility of the resident in attendance joining SNG as a parish representative was discussed, the resident being a retired officer.

Crime in the parish to be an agenda item for discussion at the November 2022 meeting.

A resident requested an additional street light at the Bar near Cross Hill going up Egmanton Road. The chair will provide the lamppost numbers. The clerk will then raise a request with NCC.

The clerk will also report debris in the tree at Cross Hill.

A resident expressed dissatisfaction with the pilot NottsBus on Demand service. Councillors noted the difficulty of getting to Southwell particularly first thing in the morning but also between the two designated transport areas which are administered separately. Councillors recognised the need for a more joined up approach to bus services if they are to meet the parish's needs as a rural community. The chair reported that he had already raised concerns with Mr Pringle. After further discussion, it was decided that the parish council should begin a petition to present to Mr Pringle seeking a revision of the pilot on demand scheme.

- 5. **Thoresby Estate report (if any):** No representative was in attendance. The clerk will invite Mr Perry's replacement to the meeting on 22 November 2022, requesting a written report f he was not able to attend in person.
- 6. **Minutes of the Parish Council meetings held on 19 July 2022:** The minutes of the Parish Council meetings held on 19 July 2022 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair.
- 7. **Matters arising:** The History Group had requested that it be noted that they had made a contribution to the finger post in Moorhouse (LMPC/64/22). No other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.
- 8. Reports from district and county councillors: Mrs Michael reported that:
 - a. Planning delegations had been reviewed and changed reverting to applications being called in if refused by the parish council
 - b. Plans to move to devolution continue to be pursued.
- 9. **Reports from councillors:** Concerns at speeding traffic and the volume of HGVs in were reported and noted.
- 10. Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field matters (if any): Councillors noted that the newly laid hedge in Glebe Field had suffered badly in the excessive heat this summer. Councillors discussed the matter and agreed that the lost hawthorn quicks should be restored. They recognised that it was necessary for this work to be completed at the right time of year which would be before the next meeting. With this in view they authorised Mr Rose and Mr J Hill to incur costs up to £250 plus VAT to repair the hedge.
 Councillors discussed the issue of dog waste on the sports field.
 Councillors agreed to purchase a new dog bin for the sports field and that the bin at the village hall should be re-sited to somewhere more heavily used by dog walkers.

11. Planning matters:

- a. Applications: None
- b. To note planning decisions by NSDC:
 - 22/00440/FUL- Implementation of Phase One of Landscape Masterplan, plus new Extensions to the Ronson Building and the Cottages with associated alteration and refurbishment works. Alteration and refurbishment works to the Main House. I Beth Shalom: Approval noted
 - ii. 22/01308/HOUSE | Demolition of existing Conservatory. Installation of external door and window. | School House High Street Laxton Nottinghamshire NG22 0NX: Approval noted
- c. Compliance: No matters raised
- d. **NSDC Planning delegation update:** See LMPC/86/22 above (Reports from councillors).
- 12. **Defibrillator inspection report including spare replacement pads:**The chair confirmed that he had the signs which had been ordered at the same time as the new battery. He will display a sign on the Visitor Centre wall. After discussion, it was **agreed** that there was no need to order spare replacement pads as they were likely to go out of date.

13. Village environment and appearance, including Bar Farmhouse:

- a. Bar Farmhouse Councillors expressed concern that the condition of the property was now worse than it had been before with the roof removed and a window out. The lack of protection meant that the floor would now be damaged. Mrs Michael will raise these concerns with enforcement and update the chair.
- b. Parish roads and pavements County councillor's inspection visit 26 August 2022: The chair reported that, no one else being available, he and Mr Pringle had met on 28 August 2022 and inspected the following:
 - i. Bar Road
 - ii. Drain at then bottom of Hill Lane
 - iii. The water pooling on Green Lane
 - iv. High Street

and discussed the volume of HGVs visiting the brickworks and the disproportionate the impact they have on road surfaces compared to cars. Mr Pringle will press NCC to restore the dilapidated road surface.

- c. Fly tipping: The clerk is still awaiting a reply from NSDC.
- d. Bench for Moorhouse: The chair had inspected the bench. He expressed the view that it should be removed. Mr S Hill will also inspect. The bench will be removed if unsafe. Mr S Hill and Mr J Hill will canvass the views of Moorhouse residents on a replacement bench and report back to the next meeting.
- e. 2022 Christmas celebrations Planning arrangement:
 Councillors discussed arrangements and decided that the light switch on event should be repeated on 4 December 2022. They noted that the Christmas tractor run is to take place on 3 December 2022. A WhatsApp group of volunteers has been set up. The number of trees to be erected was discussed. Mr Rose will enquire of Thoresby Estate as to how many trees they would donate this year. Councillors discussed how best to undertake arrangements and agreed to set up a Christmas Committee comprising the chair, Mr J Hill, Mr Rose and Mr M Hennell to arrange the event. The chair will apply to the Thoresby Estate for a grant again this year. The clerk will establish the council's powers in relation to expenditure of the precept on an event and confirm to councillors as soon as possible.

14. Financial matters:

- c. **Financial position as at 31 August 2022:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 31 August 2022 (incorporating the 2022-23 budget figures). The chair verified the stated balances against bank statements.
- d. **Accounts for payment:** Councillors unanimously approved six payments totalling £428.80.
- e. **Change of banking provider:** The clerk reported the outcome of her investigations into an alternative provider. She will contact potential providers of free banking to establish the opening requirements.
- 15. Service faults: None
- 16. Correspondence: Item b Winter salt Councillors agreed that salt was not required this year. Item c Devolution See above at LMPC/86/22 above (Reports from councillors). All other items of correspondence noted.

Shop wisely this sale season and avoid getting less than you bargained for with top tips from Citizens Advice Sherwood & Newark

With the holiday season and sales fast approaching, Citizens Advice Sherwood & Newark has some top tips to remind bargain-hunters how to shop safely online.

- 1. **Do your research:** Before buying from a site you haven't used before, spend a few minutes checking it out. See what people have said about the person or company by looking at reviews on different websites don't rely on reviews on the company website.
- 2. **Be wise to scams in disguise:** If a bargain seems too good to be true, it probably is. If it's branded but a lot cheaper than it appears on the brand's website, it could be fake. It could be a legitimate 'look-a-like' product. Either way, it might not be the quality you were hoping for
- 3. **Ways to pay:** Beware of a seller who asks you to pay by direct bank transfer. Bank transfers have limited protection if things go wrong. You should only send and receive money through the online marketplace app or website using a debit or credit card, or via trusted methods of payment such as PayPal
- 4. **Know your rights**: If you've bought from a retailer you might be entitled to a replacement product or a repair of your faulty goods. You can even claim a full refund if you can prove the goods are faulty. If you've bought from an individual, perhaps via an online marketplace, you have far fewer rights. In fact, you have no right to return, so long as the goods are 'as described'. Always be sure to take a screenshot of the description, and be sure to check and double check before you buy
- 5. When things go wrong: Sometimes things just don't go to plan. If you've bought something that is broken, damaged, unsafe or not what you expected then contact the seller and give them a chance to put it right. If that doesn't work reach out to the Citizens Advice.

If you're worried that something you've seen online might be a scam, contact the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 0808 223 1133 or Relay UK - if you can't hear or speak on the phone, you can type what you want to say: 18001 then 0808 223 1133, Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm (closed bank holidays). Milton Mausoleum

We would like to thank all our friends, supporters and visitors over this last year. Again, it has been a busy year with all our usual events plus an additional one, a Commemorative Service for the life of Georgiana, the 4th Duchess of Newcastle.



This year was the 200 years anniversary of her death (26.09.1822). This service was a mixture of music, hymns, a poem, quotations from the diary of the 4th Duke and also an insight into the life of the Duchess. 
