The Laxton Farming System - Jury Day

On Thursday 25th November the members of the Jury, who had been appointed by the Court Leet in 2020, met at The Dovecote Inn for a warming cup of coffee before setting off into the crisp morning air.

With an eye on Covid safety, Stuart Rose had brought a flatbed trailer with straw bales for seats, with the jury members facing to either side. Robert Haigh had a car full and there were a couple of other vehicles and one member who joined the party at the field.

The first news was that there was a lady in the field



looking for a lost credit card, so everyone was asked look out for it for her as they went around. She would not have expected such a search party to arrive. Sadly there was no news of it being discovered.

The wheat field for the 2021 / 22 season is Mill Field, so this was the field to be inspected. Roy Hennell, Foreman of Mill Field, was in charge of allocating different areas to different sections of the field. Who was best able to walk the longer distances was an important factor. The jury members set off to inspect the strip boundaries with the sykes and with each other and also to check the drainage dykes.

Stakes were hammered in where necessary to mark the junctions. Another of Roy's duties was noting down the infringements recorded by



the inspection groups. This year there were very few problems, leaving Roy with a very short list.

Following the inspection everyone regrouped at the trailer or was gathered up from the further parts of the field to return to the Dovey and set off to enjoy their traditional roast beef lunch, which they had had to forego last year because of the tight Covid restrictions.

During their time in The Dovey, Roy was able to finalise his presentment paper for the court and the jurors discussed and agreed what penalties should be recommended for the infringements that had been noted.

Last year the Court Leet had to meet in an open barn with everyone well spaced apart to conform with Covid requirements. This ensured that matters were dealt with swiftly and efficiently. This year another change was scheduled to take place.

It is not widely known that the Court is a public one and that anyone can choose to attend to witness the proceedings, although they are not permitted to take part. The



Dovecote started life as a house with a bar in a front room and has developed into the comfortable pub restaurant it is today, but in the process the original floor plan has not expanded greatly and the rooms are still quite small to accommodate the minimum number of people required at the Court - the officers, and jurors.

With a need to seat people less closely packed and to also accommodate the Lord of the Manor, a number of people with professional input to make and observers, it was decided to move to the Village Hall in 2021.

The Court Leet is the last manorial court in the land to retain its powers to determine legal proceedings and levy the fines imposed to secure the management of a strip farming system.

Until the Administration of Justice Act was overhauled and a new one came into force in 1977, there were many such courts which had fallen out of use. At that time Laxton's court was scheduled to be stripped of its powers, but those involved at the time reported that the law was still needed here to manage the strip farming process. This led to Laxton being named in the Act as an exception. One other court was also named, although their powers are related to the rounding up and charging for the return of stray sheep. It is this legal power which makes Laxton and its strip farming system truly unique.

The business of the Court Leet is primarily to swear in the Jury who will inspect the wheat field the following November and to consider the infringements noted on the presentment paper. This will be reported in the February 2022 edition of 'Open field'.

Remembrance Sunday



Our Remembrance Service was held in church on Sunday 14th November. The service was led by the Rev. Canon John Chambers, our new Area Dean.

It was lovely to see the church nearly full with members of our group of churches and family and friends, remembering

together again after lockdown etc. As we had not held a Remembrance Service at Laxton for five years, it was lovely to see about 65 people in church. The weather was fine and the bells were ringing out. What



more could we have asked for? We began with hymns and prayers followed by Simon reading the lesson.



The vicar preached his sermon about his time in Ripon when he was chaplain to some of the Army barracks. He told us how many soldiers returned from active duty suffering from PTSD. There was one in particular who ended up on the streets going from church to church and village to village because he was so traumatised by his time

abroad fighting that he could not cope and had to leave the Army.

The congregation processed outside to the War Memorial to lay their wreaths and for the children to place their crosses. This was followed by the Last Post and 2 minutes' silence followed by the Reveille. The service ended back in church with prayers and the National Anthem.

Tea, coffee and cakes were served after the service.

Our thanks to Wellow, Walesby, Egmanton, Kirton, Moorhouse and Laxton churches, Laxton Parish Council and Tuxford Young Farmers for their wreaths, and to the ten young children who placed crosses. This is the generation that we must not allow to forget.

Our thanks to Graham for playing the organ, to

Dik for preparing and printing the extra service sheets, and to the bell ringers, who we weren't expecting. A special thank you to Jon for playing the Last Post and Reveille, to Janet, Lesley and Jean for serving the refreshments and to Cath and Sandra for the lovely knitted poppies and to Roy for the soldiers he made us.

Most of all, my thanks to everyone who came and joined in this lovely service and made it such a success.

Remembering People and Animals



The villagers at Moorend gathered around the memorial stone for the Canadian airmen who lost their lives in South Field to remember both them and all of the others who gave their lives in war.

This year we also chose to remember the animals who were caught up in war and who suffered alongside their human masters. The horses who never returned to the

farms, the dogs who served alongside their handlers and the homing pigeons used as messengers. Sixty-five PDSA Dickin medals, the 'Animal Victoria Cross', have been awarded since WWII, plus an honorary award



to all the animals who served in WWI. The most recent award was to Treo, a black Labrador, honoured for his "heroic actions as an arms and explosive search dog in Afghanistan."

Whilst there are recorded incidents of soldiers adopting cats for emotional support,



even whilst serving on the front line, only one cat has received the Dickin medal. 'Able Seacat Simon' served on HMS Amethyst during the Yangtze Incident in 1949. He received the medal for surviving injuries from a cannon shell, raising morale, and killing off a rat infestation during his service.

In November 1944 Khan, a German Shepherd, served with Corporal James Muldoon of the Scottish rifles. During the invasion of Germany Khan and Muldoon were on an assault craft which capsized after coming under heavy shell fire. Khan swam to shore but couldn't find Muldoon, who couldn't swim. Whilst still under heavy shelling Khan swam back 200 yards to Muldoon, he then pulled him from the water, dragged him past the muddy shoreline and up to dry ground before collapsing next to him.

Purple Poppies

The purple poppy was introduced by the charity Animal Aid in 2006 in remembrance of animals that lost their lives at war.

The charity started the appeal because it felt the animals that die at war – which tend to mostly be horses and dogs - are often forgotten. They have since changed to a purple enamelled paw badge, but animal charities still sell and display purple poppies.

The Royal British Legion does not endorse the purple poppy, but has no objection to it.

"We see no conflict in wearing the red poppy next to the purple or white poppy. Many animal rights supporters also support our work. We do ask that the items are not offered alongside each other however as this would confuse the public," it has said.

Vaccination Update

At the time of writing towards the end of November, the Government is urging everyone to take up the offer of both their Covid booster jab and the flu jab. Covid

The Pleasures of Being a UK Pig Farmer

As a lot of you have seen in the press recently, and some might have felt it first-hand, that the UK pig industry is in a difficult place.

We are only 60% self sufficient in pork in the UK and by May next year I expect it to be down to 50% self-sufficient in UK pork. This is due to a "perfect storm" of events that have all come at once:

- Two poor world harvests have meant high food costs for the pigs. 60% of the cost of growing a pig is food.
- Brexit and the UK government welcoming in loads of cheap German pork in January to avoid empty shelves post Brexit.
- A shortage of labour on farm and on the processing side
- A shortage of CO₂ which a lot of the large abattoirs use to stun the animals.

This led to pig farms "rolling over" pigs i.e. holding them on the farm after they are ready to go. The pig game is like a game of chess. You must move one piece to move the next piece but if you do not move the end piece then the whole game stops.

All this results in the shocking news that pig farmers are killing healthy, fit-for-the-food-chain animals on farm as they cannot get them off the farm. Leaving them on the farm means those animals are still growing, still eating expensive food, and therefore growing too big and becoming 'out of spec'. The farmer gets penalised by a lower price for being 'out of spec' by as much as half the value of the pig.

The frustrating thing is pork sales have stayed the same we are just importing pork instead of using our own.

In a time when climate change is a top topic and very important, I feel it's more important than ever that the UK public back UK farming and buy local, but also buy seasonally, reducing the need to import food grown abroad.

We would all agree that the lettuces, strawberries and the tomatoes that you can buy at the moment, from Egypt for example, are tasteless and full of water. In contrast the UK grown salads, fruits and veg grown in the correct seasons taste great and are more nutrient rich than what you buy out of season.

Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council Draft Minutes of the Meeting 29/11/21

Present: Councillors:

M. Manning (chair), S. Hill, M. Hennell, J.Hill, S,Rose,J. Godson

In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Wilson (Clerk), S, Michael (District councillor), M. Pringle (county councillor), Juliette Wilson (Conservation officer), Member of the public (x1)

- 1. **Apologies for absence:** Apologies were received and accepted from Mr R Hennell.
- Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 11 (Property matters – including sports field and Glebe Field and sub-tenancy). There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. Dispensations: None required.
- 4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** The state of the roads and quality of repairs was discussed at length. Mr Pringle agreed and urged residents to report all issues to NCC. In order to facilitate this:
 - a. The member of the public would be provided with the link and telephone number to report problems to NCC
 - b. The chair will share the link and telephone number with the Open Field
 - c. The clerk will publish the link and telephone number on the website.

The clerk will also:

- a. Chase up the outcome of the traffic speed rumble strip survey
- b. Report the poor road condition at the bottom of Cocking Hill near the brickyard.
- 5. **Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 21 July 2021:** The minutes of the meeting held on 21 July 2021 were agreed as a true record.
- 6. **Matters arising:** No other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.
- Laxton Conservation Area Character Appraisal Review Conservation Officer presentation: Councillors welcomed Ms Wilson to the meeting. The key elements of Ms Wilson's presentation were as follows:
 - a. The conservation area had been designated in the 1970s and

had not been reviewed since.

- b. NSDC had chosen a number of conservation areas to review. Laxton was one which had been identified as a priority
- c. The suggestion is that the boundary is extended to include the open fields
- d. The primary impact of a conservation area designation is on residential properties because it changes the planning context in terms of development. An extension to include the open fields would have minimal planning impact because it would not remove any rights. It would, however, bring the open fields within the scope of the conservation appraisal. This means that their importance and the reasons that they should be recognised would be formally set out in the assessment.
- e. Public support would be required for the extension. NSDC is only in the early stages of gauging opinion.
- f. The process would begin with a draft proposal which would then be put out to public consultation. If that demonstrates that there is no appetite for the extension, the area would remain as drawn now.
- g. The redrawn boundaries would extend planning scrutiny but because it was inclusive of the open fields, it would not increase restrictions. The extension would enhance the importance and value of the open fields by providing recognition within the planning system.
- h. NSDC is also looking at potential local policies to protect nonmanmade structure archaeological sites such as grasslands
- i. Inclusion of the open fields would complement the village because the village is an inherent part of the open field system
- j. A management plan would look at and promote the overall condition of the area
- k. In a conservation area it is also possible to place an Article 4 direction on agricultural buildings which would restrict permitted development rights.
- I. Laxton had been selected because of the recent change of ownership and associated potential for change. It is also one of the oldest designations and has never had an appraisal
- m. Consultation is delivered as follows:
 - i. A paper copy is published and a copy made available online for a period of six weeks
 - ii. Questionnaires are issued and public events held
 - NSDC will probably also write to every resident notifying them of the consultation, dates of events and how to view the documents
 - iv. It is difficult to be definite because of Covid but the process will most likely take place in spring 2022
 - v. If the consultation is completed in spring 2022, any

amendments would then be made before the proposal is considered by the Economic Committee. Adoption would be almost immediate with the new area being in effect at that point.

- n. Ms Wilson will update the clerk as to progress in advance of each meeting
- o. Ms Wilson was invited to attend the court leet on 2 December 2021.

Councillors **agreed** that, being of benefit to the village, they supported the proposed extension in principle. If they have any queries or questions they will contact Ms Wilson. The clerk will circulate her details.

Ms Wilson also reported that she had inspected inside Bar Farmhouse and been in contact with the owner. NSDC is taking action. Some work had been done to tidy the site and works were being required to the roof before the winter sets in.

8. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Mr Pringle's written report was noted.

Mrs Michael reported that:

- a. Safer Neighbourhood Group meetings had resumed.
- b. In spring 2022, NSDC is moving from a committee to a cabinet model of governance. This will reduce the tiers in the decision making process and should therefore lead to quicker outcomes. Contrary to the committee based model, where all parties are represented, cabinet is run by whichever party is in power. Scrutiny will be exercised through the calling in process.
- c. NSDC has no further involvement in the cattle market, the party interested in running the market having no interest in the site owned by NSDC.
- 9. Reports from councillors: Mr S Hill reported that the next SNG meeting would be on 30 September 2021. A new Chief Inspector and police constable had been appointed for the area, together with PCSO Dunn. The issues raised at the last meeting had been rural theft and traffic speeding through villages. In the latter regard, the police had offered to train a minimum of six volunteers to use a speed gun which the parish council would be required to buy. It had also been reported that the police were carrying out operations to tackle diesel theft. Councillors noted that a police representative would visit to talk about ways to secure properties.

10. Financial Matters:

- a. **Financial position as at 31 August 2021:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 31 August 2021 (incorporating the 2021-22 budget figures).
- b. Accounts for payment: The council unanimously approved ten payments totalling £1005.45. Councillors agreed that they had intended the clerk to order two

dog bins. The clerk will place an order for the second.

- c. **Use of reserves:** To be discussed at items 11 (Property matters) and 15 e (Christmas events and decorations)
- 11. **Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field and sub tenancy and associated legal services:** Councillors reconsidered the requirements for the lease following a request received from Larken & Co. They noted that the field has no water supply and that someone had been doing some maintenance because the elders had been cut and burned. Further discussion confidential and minuted separately. The clerk will contact Larken & Co. Mr Rose confirmed that:
 - a. The soil which had been blocking access to the field had been removed
 - b. He had tried to obtain three quotes for the fencing and hedge laying. Four contractors had inspected the site but he had received only one quote, £8535. Councillors thanked Mr Rose but, after discussion, **agreed** that the price was uneconomic
- 12. Planning matters:
 - a. Applications: None.
 - b. To note planning decisions by NSDC:
 - i. 21/01548/HOUSE Proposed single storey side sun lounge replacement extension - Brecks Cottage Bed And Breakfast, Green Lane, Moorhouse, <u>Newark</u> – Approval noted
 - ii. 21/01573/HOUSE Proposed single storey principal extension, partial conversion of garage and external alterations - Walnut Cottage, Toad Lane, Laxton, Newark - Approval noted
 - c. Compliance: No matters raised.
- 13. **Defibrillator inspection report:** Mr M Hennell had reported that he had completed the inspection. There were no issues.
- 14. Thoresby Estate Village meeting 22 September 2021 Next steps: Councillors approved the record of the meeting circulated by the clerk. Councillors noted that the owner of Rufford Park was a regular visitor to Rufford Parish Council which aided good communication and effective working relationships. After discussion, they **agreed** that, now that the purchase was complete, Thoresby Estate had begun to establish itself as the new owner and the pandemic was easing meaning that projects and plans can be progressed, Mr Pierrepont or his representative should be invited to attend council meetings regularly. This would help forge strong, constructive links with the estate for the future. The clerk will contact Mr Pierrepont.
- 15. Village environment and appearance, including:

- a. Dog bin installation Update: See LMPC/85/21 above (Financial matters)
- **b.** Relocation 30 mph speed signs to village entries: Mr Pringle had been in contact with the relevant officers.
 Speeding traffic including possible weight limit: See LMPC/79/21 (10 minutes public speaking time).
- **c. Bar Farmhouse:** see LMPC/82/21 above (Laxton Conservation Area).
- d. Christmas event and decorations Councillors discussed potential sites for trees and lights. The chair will formally apply to Thoresby Estate charity for a donation for Christmas trees lights and electricity costs. Mr S Hill will explore sources for a tree for Moorhouse. Councillors authorised Mr S Hill to order up to £500 worth of lights for Moorhouse.

Councillors **agreed** that they should organise a light switch on event to take place at The Dovecote, together with other village representatives. They **appointed** Mr Rose, Mr Manning and Mr M Hennell as the parish council Christmas event representatives.

- 17.Correspondence: All items of correspondence noted.
- 18.Agenda items for next meeting: As above
- 19.Date of next meeting: Tuesday 23 November 2021
