Open Field Subscriptions

Despite increased printing costs, we have maintained the price of the magazine over the last seven years or so. The change to an 11 edition year will mean a saving in printing costs and so once again it has been decided that the price of the annual subscription will be £4.

Moorend Remembers Those Who Gave Their Lives



On a misty Remembrance Sunday morning the residents of Moorend, young and old, gathered around the memorial for the Canadian airmen who lost their lives in Southfield. The group observed two minutes silence for all of those who gave their lives in both World Wars and also in more modern conflicts. They were pleased to be joined by Polly with Ore, her horse, in remembrance of the animals who also fell in the battlefields of the World Wars.

The late Edmund Rose, former bailiff of Laxton, remembered the Canadian aircraft crashing in Southfield. He joined the men from Laxton who tried to douse the flames, sadly too late to save any of the young men in the aeroplane. A few years ago, Ken Shepherd, who before his recent death was for many years Clerk to the Parish Council, arranged for a memorial stone to be set up in Moorend. He also managed to contact the families of the airmen in Canada, who were both thankful and grateful to think that the village remembered their relatives.

In the History Group's collection of interviews from villagers who have now sadly passed away Marian Cooper remembered the Life Guards and their horses who were billeted here during World War 2. Marjory Sayer recalled the death of Miss Willis, the school teacher, at the door of her home when a bomb fell in the School House garden, demolishing all the outhouses

opposite and uprooting an apple tree. Marian Cooper also told us that her father and her uncle had to go around the village afterwards killing all the cattle that had been injured.

Miss Cox, the Head Teacher during World War 2, recorded the coming of evacuees from London and Sheffield; gas mask practice; the scattering of children to adjacent houses should there be a threat to the school; the children practising running to take shelter in the trenches dug in the Church Fields. The men who gave their lives in that war are recorded on our war memorials and Laxton remembers them every November by the laying of a wreath, indeed many of their families still live in the village today.

The war memorial also commemorates the 9 young men from Laxton who died in World War1 and the other men, and a woman, who served in the war. They also are still remembered by their descendants in the village. As one would expect men from the village joined the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry and served with their horses. Elmer John Rose from Laxton, for instance, was a "rough rider" with the Battalion. They were sailing from Salonika for service in Egypt when their ship was torpedoed with a great loss of men and horses. Those who survived, both men and horses, went on to serve in the Desert Mounted Corps under General Allenby.

When the war was over not only had the Thoresby Estate lost men, but also horses. Earl Manvers was especially fond of one particular horse, Planet, and he tried to buy him back from the army in 1919. He was, however, firmly told by Major General Birkbeck, Director of Remounts, that the war was still lingering on in the Middle East, where Planet was now serving, and since "there was a shortage of good chargers in the Army", Planet would not be returned. In fact, very few horses returned from the war. The majority of those which still survived after 1918 were either humanely killed, sold to farmers in France or sold for horse meat.

Our little village of Laxton therefore paid the inevitable price of war in the lives of men, women and horses. Young men and women served and died, as did the horses which the villagers had bred, stabled, hunted and worked with.

By the time of the Second World War horses were no longer used in battle but they were still used to transport men and supplies. As late as 2001 the U.S.A. Special Forces used horses in the invasion of Afghanistan. That is why at Moorend we were delighted that Polly and Ore came to join in our little remembrance moment around the Canadian memorial stone. We felt it was a fitting tribute to the many people and to the many animals whose lives have been lost in war.

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

Jury Day 2020

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Jury Day had the distinction of being one traditional, annual event which actually took place in 2020, albeit in a modified form.

Normally the Jury assemble in the pub before travelling out to the field in the back of a cattle trailer, equipped for the occasion with straw



bale seats. This arrangement is snug rather than socially distanced, so a new plan had to be devised.

The task of the Jury is to inspect the work that has been done in the wheat field. There are three fields in the Open Field crop rotation system, and each field in turn becomes the wheat field. It then becomes the field with the second





year crop , followed by a year as the fallow field. This means each is inspected every three years.

The system requires that the boundaries between the

individual strips are maintained. The sykes (the areas between the blocks of sykes which are too wet or too steep to be farmed) must also be maintained, so farmers must not plough too far, while being required to plough all of their land. It is a fine balance between sticking to the historic line and being a little bit too far one way or another.

Each farmer ploughs away from his neighbour and away from the boundary of the strip with the syke. It is these boundaries which the Jury is looking at in detail as well as checking that watercourses are unobstructed.



The Bailiff, Robert Haigh, summons the Jury to gather and the field Foreman takes charge, recording the transgressions noticed. This year the task fell to Johnny Godson, the Foreman of West (Top) Field.

Outdoor meetings of groups of up to six people being permitted, the whole Jury travelled in their own vehicles to Top Field. They gathered, but not too closely, while they decided who would inspect which area and set off in groups of three.

It was wet underfoot and the strips were very wet, but at least this year they had been worked and were showing signs of emerging crops, unlike last year when nobody had been able to get on the land because of the unrelenting rain.

To avoid getting their heads too close together while hammering in the stakes, one made a small hole to take the stake and another knocked it home. Here the soft ground helped, because a hammer was barely needed to secure the stakes.

It was probably the fastest Jury Day on record, and also could not end



with the traditional roast beef lunch. A final socially distanced gathering agreed on the fines and warnings for the transgressions which were noted. These will be put before the Court Leet the following week. Court Day will also break with the tradition of meeting in the pub and will take place at Crosshill Farm.



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Sherwood Forest Rotary - Cycling to Rome for Prostate Cancer Research.

This is my end of 2020 report on progress so far re my cycle to Rome, to be achieved by the end of June 2021. I remember Joy at the start mentioning something along the lines of age v cycling v body capabilities and so it turned out to be. For my last report I had cycled the equivalent distance to get me to Dover but at the end of August I set off early one Sunday morning to do a 15 mile circuit of Ossington and Carlton on Trent. In Ossington virtually every muscle from my hips southwards seized up and, unable to walk never mind cycle, I had to be rescued. My doctor banned the bike for a month and diagnosed dehydration, not warming up prior to the ride and not having breakfast. It took a month before I could walk past the football pitch and cycling was banned again, making a total of ten weeks. I am now back on the road and noting advice about being prepared.

While doing two or three circuits a week I have noticed the boxes of fruit and hedgerow produce that have been abundant this year. Produce ranges from plums to apples, sticks to eggs - and even bags of manure free for collection.

I'm finding cycling is good for the mind as well as the body. It's like the good old days when I walked the dog several times a day - it's a time of mental preparation or reflection on the day. The other day I reflected upon eggs. We can get eggs from shops, and often from the farm gate. We can get barn eggs, or so it says on some boxes. And then there are range eggs. Putting myself in the position of perhaps a non native English speaker what would I deduce from the term. They are obviously not produced on a farm or in a barn, they are range eggs. They are perhaps not as healthy either because invariably they are FREE.

I considered the very common, and generous notion, of FREE range eggs. These are available from many a garden gate and I hope our visitor will only ever take one box of six so that others can share that generosity too.

Have as good a Christmas as is allowed this year and please remember if you do meet up with family members (or even friends) that Covid will not be on holiday. Social distancing and face masks, well ventilated rooms or meeting outside, and regular hand washing are still the order of the day for our own survival. Keep Safe. 



Citizens Advice Sherwood & Sherwood & Newark gives their top tips to help people across Newark and Sherwood shop safely and securely from home

Since lockdown began in March we have seen an increasing number of clients turn to Citizens Advice Sherwood and Newark for help with consumer related issues. These have covered a range of issues but we have frequently seen clients with problems relating to buying electrical goods and warranties, second hand vehicles and frauds/scams.

As you might expect, due to the restrictions in place since March over half (51%) of people across the country feel more reliant on parcel deliveries. Across the East Midlands Citizens Advice has found that 46% of adults have had an issue with parcel delivery since the country went into lockdown in March.

Despite widespread problems, the charity found that only 35% people across the East Midlands knew their rights if something went wrong.

Jackie Insley Chief Executive of Citizens Advice Sherwood and Newark, said:

"Parcel delivery has been a lockdown lifeline for so many of us this year. It's



helped us turn our homes into
makeshift offices; send gifts to those we
love and miss; and get hold of essentials
and the occasional luxury. As we all turn to shopping online more, it's important
people feel confident that they can shop safely and securely from home."

As a result, Citizens Advice Sherwood and Newark are working to help clue Newark and Sherwood consumers up on their rights if something goes wrong with a parcel delivery.

1. **Check delivery policies** - before you place an order find out what the

delivery times, costs and returns policies are of the items you have ordered.

- 2. If you're out of the house during delivery Consider asking a neighbour or friend if it can be delivered to their address. But beware, if you do provide details of a safe space or nominated neighbour and something goes wrong it's not the seller or courier's responsibility.
- 3. Online trader or online marketplace? Make sure you know if you are dealing with a trader or a private seller on an online marketplace as dispute processes may vary. If you have an issue with a trader, a dispute can be raised directly with them, but if it's a private individual it may be easier to go through a marketplace's dispute process.
- 4. **Review traders** Check and review if the trader is genuine. It's always worth taking a look at reviews to gain an insight as to how reliable the company is and how well they deal with missing parcel complaints and refunds.
- 5. Who to deal with when a parcel goes missing your purchase and contract is with the seller. If your parcel goes missing you should speak to the trader to deal with the problem, not the courier company.

- Apologies for absence: Apologies for absence were received and accepted from Mr S Hill.
- <u>Declarations of interest:</u> The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 10 (Property matters – including sports field and Glebe Field).
- 2. There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. **Dispensations:** None required.
- 4. **<u>10 Minutes public speaking:</u>** No public present. A report of damage to the kerbstone at the bus stop at the bottom of Timothy Road was noted. The clerk will report the matter to NCC.
- 5. Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 28 January and 25 August 2020: The minutes of the meetings held on 28 January and 25 August 2020 were agreed as a true record to be signed by the chair at a later date when face to face contact is possible.
- 6. **Matters arising:** None. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Mr Pringle reported that:The Policy Committee had voted to proceed with a unitary authority
- NCC has a £60,000,000 deficit although it has received government funding towards the costs of managing the impact of the Covid 19 outbreak.
- 8. **Reports from councillors:** Councillors formally expressed their sadness at the former clerk's passing and recognised his contribution to the parish council's affairs and village.
- **9.** Otherwise, no reports.

10.Financial Matters:

a. **Financial position as at 31 August 2020:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 31 August 2020 (incorporating the 2020-21 budget figures). Councillors viewed the balances as stated in the bank statements on line.

b. Accounts for payment: The council unanimously approved twenty five payments totalling £2028.82. Twenty two were formally approved retrospectively, being payments approved by email and made during lockdown when no formal meetings had taken place.

Payments yet to be made included the reimbursement of the sum of £109.58 in respect of a PAYE payment funded inadvertently by another parish council. The clerk had used the wrong cheque book, the bank then clearing the cheque even though it was signed by the wrong signatories. Councillors verified the erroneous payment by viewing the relevant stub on line.

- c. Risk assessment 2020 21: Councillors considered and approved the draft revised risk assessment for 2020-21 circulated by the clerk, nothing that the document had been updated to take account of Covid 19.
- d. **Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field:** Councillors noted that an approach to assume the lease had been made by the sub tenants. Future of the lease to be an agenda item for the November 2020 meeting. The clerk will investigate the legal position in advance of the meeting.
- 10. Planning matters:
 - a. Applications: 20/01653/573 | Application for removal of condition 07 (agricultural occupancy condition) of planning permission 01/00098/RMA | The Orchard Moorhouse Road Moorhouse: Councillors considered the application and unanimously **agreed** to approve the proposal.
 - b. To note planning decisions by NSDC: 20/01009/FUL-Householder application for replacement of wood burning stove and fit an external chimney (flue) - The Barn, Moorhouse Road, Moorhouse, Newark On Trent, NG23 6AT
 - c. **Compliance:** No issues raised. **Village development including ownership and management of The Crown's estate in the long term:** Councillors noted formally that the Laxton estate was now owned by the Thoresby Estate. The chair confirmed that he had forwarded the Housing Needs Survey report to the Thorseby estate as owner.
- 11. **Defibrillator inspection report:** Mr M Hennell had completed the inspection. There were no issues.
- 12. Village environment and appearance, including:
 - a. Adoption of Moorhouse telephone kiosk: Councillors noted that the parish council was now the owner of the kiosk. The clerk will report the poor condition of the Laxton kiosk to BT.

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- b. Fibre broadband for Moorhouse: Nothing to report.
- c. Speeding traffic: Mr Pringle will seek an update regarding the re-siting of the 30 mph signs at the entrances to the village. To be agenda item for In attendance at parish council meeting

Morrisons recently provided an update about their doorstep deliveries which you may find useful. Orders may be placed by ringing **0345 611 6111 and select option 5.**

- It is still a bespoke service customers can order what they want and are not restricted to the original 35 listed products
- It is free to vulnerable and elderly and costs £2.50 for students and £4.50 for isolating families who are working.
- Next day delivery phone by 5pm. Orders are delivered any time 10-6 the next day – cannot provide specific timeslot.
- Available Monday Saturday and this will extend to Sundays in December. (temporarily)
- Some restrictions on products due to Covid for e.g. only 3 cans of soup in total except where it is part of an offer (currently 4 tins of Heinz soups are on offer for £3 and this would be allowed.)
- Customers should ask to have offers pointed out to them
- Alcohol is also restricted to only 2 bottles but of multiple types so 2 bottles of red wine but also 2 white at same time.
- Medicines limited again to 2 packs per order.

Opening Hours at Recycling Centres


Throughout December, January and February the recycling centres will open at **8am - 4pm.**
