Letter From Revd. Zoe

Dear friends

As I write this letter, we have just taken down our Christmas cards with several personal handwritten letters written inside of them. There is something about receiving a handwritten letter which in many ways has become something of a rarity. When was the last time you sent a personal letter to someone? Who did you send it to? Our handwriting reveals much about the person who writes the personal letter – is your writing hurried (are you always in a hurry), flamboyant (are you a flamboyant person)...... I know of many bereaved people who have reread letters of condolence over and over again. Electronic communication, I am told, doesn't have quite the same effect and generally isn't cherished in quite the same way.

You will often hear me talk about 'both/and' rather than 'either/or'. I have a beautiful handwritten letter from my daughter in China – it is like I am receiving something of her each time I read it. To receive this letter, she had to go to the time and trouble to address an envelope and post it – I was somehow worth all this extra effort and attention. But saying this, I don't have to wait 3 to 4 weeks each time to receive correspondence from her as we 'video chat' weekly and message each other several times a week - this has made the distance more bearable – 'both/and' definitely does it for me!

As a result of social media I must confess that I feel more connected with my wider family and friends. Social media is a great medium for getting a message out there to lots of people at the same time – we shouldn't decry this and in many ways this makes receiving a personal letter all the more precious.

In recent weeks, the Christmas story reminded us that God chose to get personal – the Word became flesh and moved amongst us – God's personal love letter in the flesh - available for everybody to read! His words of hope and wisdom are also recorded in the Bible along with many personal letters written from Church leaders to their church communities. Down the Ages, these words of wisdom and encouragement have been cherished and re-read and re-read time and again. Have you read these words?

Perhaps we are challenged to reflect upon the impact personal letters make to our lives and whether we ought to write more letters in our own personal hand? When would be a good time to do this and to whom should we write them?

They are very keen to start quickly and have suggested it could be as early as February.



Laxton History Group



There was an almost full turnout for the first meeting of the season and it was good to find ourselves putting out more chairs. John welcomed everyone to the meeting and jean distributed programme cards for the year to come. She pointed out a number of trips which will be by minibus on a first come, first served basis.

Later there will be a chance to visit Oxford for a rare chance to see the original of the 1635 Mark Pierce map of Laxton on public display. This may be opened to non-members if we opt for a big coach, so if you are not a member and would be interested to join us, please let Jean Hennell know to help with planning nearer the time.

Our speaker for the evening was Richard Jones, the son of Michael and Elizabeth from Norwell who have also been to speak to us. He specialises in medieval agrarian practice and peasant culture.

He introduced his talk with the title page of the 6th edition of the first full length book on manuring and its benefits. First published in 1796, it was a best seller of its day and recorded knowledge and practice some 50 years before agricultural chemistry and the advent of chemical fertilizers, when it all changed.

The medieval farmers learned from the cultures which preceded them. Roman writers had catalogued hierarchies of different manures. Pigeon manure was widely seen as the best, with the dung of ungulate mammals being prized above that of pigs and with warnings of the burning qualities of the excreta of water fowl. Green manures in the form of crops grown or material gathered to be ploughed in were also discussed. Varro alone advocated the benefits of human excreta. The nature of the soil and the availability of the materials available influenced manuring traditions in different cultures.

Texts advocated the best phase of the moon and the best weather conditions to apply manure. Our knowledge of what happened is gained from the written work of scholars. The oral tradition has been lost and Richard has worked to discover whether the scholarly wisdom was known to the peasants working the fields.

That manure and similar substances were important to the people can be seen from the 60 words which relate at that time to dung / filth / dirt. Many of these also appear in place names, mostly referring to sites or buildings associated with the dung. This can be seen is some old Laxton names which survive, some albeit in modified form e.g. Blacklands, Honeyhole and Skitterpool. While now we try to distance ourselves from manure, to the medieval peasant it was a vital resource.

Archaeology demonstrates that peasant sites are remarkable in their cleanliness. Waste food, ashes and other material was gathered up, along with bits of broken pots etc., and spread on the land. Richard showed records of the patterns of pot sherd finds in relation to where people lived and he pointed out patterns. In one the majority of sherds are close to the village, reducing moving away. In two others the sherds appear in mutually exclusive patterns. The medieval peasants may have known where crops grew well and manuring where they do worse. Earlier manuring will have increased the organic matter in the soil and so improved fertility in the better performing areas.

Early pottery finds around villages and later finds predominantly in fields suggests that subsistence farmers prioritised manuring their gardens. Once they began to grow cash crops they prioritised manuring their fields to increase yield.

Richard remarked that most works on manuring in medieval times are expressed in modern chemical terms, which were unknown then. He looked back to 1246 when a writer expressed germination in terms of the elements of earth, fire, air and water and their properties of cold, heat, dry and wet.

A further text in 1286 built on this writing a work for estate managers which would have needed to be understood by peasants. This talks of the need to maintain balance between these elements and how mixing (cold) earth with (hot) dung works. It also describes the moon, sucking material from the earth when waxing and allowing it to move downward when waning. The advice was to manure during a waning moon so that the benefits were drawn into the soil.

The qualities of manuring substances can be fitted into the pattern of medieval understanding. Materials from fires and hearths, vegetable matter, animal bone and animal dung fit the pattern well and show how different substances can be used to improve different soils.

Comparing this with modern studies showing cropping and grazing in different areas, the chemical composition of dung and the demands of different crops, it shows that, however they got there, the medieval peasants had arrived at the correct solutions for the soil they had and the manures they had to treat it with. Evidence shows that lighter soils were fertilised with manure from the farmyard while heavier soils received manure from the fields in the form of plant material.

Brenda had a list of opportunities as long as ever and members were able to choose to take part in such diverse things as Bingo, beginners flower arranging, embroidering landscape pictures and learning about the finds during the restoration of Nottingham Castle.

We have finally had a reply to our Group's letter of objection to the unilateral decision by County to amalgamate us with other local WIs, which make us too big to hold meetings in out village halls. Our view has prevailed and we will remain as we have previously, much to the satisfaction of the members present.

Sandra is planning the annual party, but the date coincides with an invitation to History Group members to join in a meeting at Norwell. This will cause a lot of members to choose, so everything may change.

We welcomed Chris Abbott to talk about her life afloat. We learned that she planned to condense the story of 20 years of her life into 45 minutes. The big move afloat was the result of an existing interest in boating and a lot of discussion. Chris and Adrian, her husband, already had a boat and belonged to a club.

Adrian's job was stressful with long hours and the family had experienced a number of young deaths and serious illnesses. He could not face staying I the job until retirement and, after Chris commented that they could leave their children to stand on their own two feet in three years' time, he suggested buying a suitable boat and going off in it.

Chris agreed that they would try it for 5 years, letting their house out, selling their current boat and buying another. She was very distressed to have to leave her job as a vet nurse so they agreed tat after 5 years it would be she who had the final stay about continuing.

Narrowboats come as empty shells, so they ordered another and set about fitting it out for the trip. They arranged to have it moved from the landlocked Lancaster Canal which was 44 miles from end to end in to the main network. There followed a period of costing the plans and working out how to live on a very much reduced income. They considered how to combat boredom and living in such a small space for so long and planned for it.

They carried out the work, stored or disposed of their stuff' and set off complete with cat and dog. They loved the life and made many friends in the different places they visited. They often travelled in convoy with friends and enjoyed a very hot first summer.

They had to decide what to do in winter because you are not allowed to moor anywhere for more than14 days unless in a boatyard with permission. The first winter they were offered free mooring in exchange for working two days a week as volunteers in a museum. Later they worked over winter and cruised in summer. Chris particularly loved cruising on the Thames.

Near the end of the 5 years they discussed continuing. Chris said she wanted changes such as a bath, a washing machine and a different layout so that mucky boots and dogs did not come straight into the lounge. This prompted buying another boat for Adrian to fit out. They expected selling their boat to take time, but in the end it was sold and three weeks later they had used the 10 days' notice they had to vacate it.

Adrian worked all hours to fit out the new boat and while having an engine fault fixed was introduced to people with a fleet of boats who wanted the skills he had. This lead to a job with them after the engineers admired the new boat's design and workmanship.

So life continued until changed family circumstances caused them to once again take up residence on land. Margaret Palmer thanked Chris for a fascinating talk.

The competition for 'something nautical' was won with a model boat, with Heather second showing a pair of fenders and then Bridget with a photo of a WREN.

In February we welcome back Stephen John with 'The Fundamentals of Puppets', a talk about his puppet making and puppetry. The competition will be for something to do with puppets.



- 1. Apologies for absence: No absences.
- Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 10 (Property matters – Sports field) and an interest as member of the village hall committee in item 14 a (Village environment – Village hall refurbishment project).

There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.

- 3. **Dispensations:** None required.
- 4. 10 Minutes public speaking: The clerk will:
 - a. Report the poor road surface on High Street, Egmanton Road and Toad Lane
 - b. Seek an update from Mr Keeling of NCC regarding the areas of standing water on Moorhouse Road and Kneesall Road
 - c. Seek an update from Mr Pringle regarding relocating the 30 mph signs further out of the village. Councillor Michael will seek an update regarding the condition of Bar Farmhouse
- 5. Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 25 September 2018: The minutes of the meeting held on 25 September 2018 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair.
- 6. Matters arising: *LMPC/95/18 Service faults –* The clerk will seek an update from Mr Pringle regarding when fibre is likely to reach Moorhouse.

All other action points having been completed, being in hand or appearing elsewhere on the agenda, there were no matters arising.

7. Reports from district and county councillors: Mrs Michael reported that she had attended the recent SNG meeting where the police had warned of heavy objects being thrown from bridges on A1 between Carlton on Trent and Sutton on Trent between midnight and 2.00 am. Councillors noted that Inspector Louise Clark's successor, Heather Sutton, had been appointed. The clerk will ask Inspector Sutton to add the chair to her mailing list. The next SNG meeting is on 3 January 2019. NCC is meeting on 14 December 2018 to discuss moving to a unitary council

8. Reports from councillors: The chair reported on an issue relating to Newark & Sherwood Homes and the steps taken by it to rectify inappropriate action it had taken in relation to a resident. Councillors were pleased that the matter had been resolved and Newark & Sherwood Homes had reviewed its processes. Councillor Michael confirmed that procedures were under review.

9. Financial Matters:

- **a. Financial position as at 31 October 2018:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 31 October 2018 (incorporating the 2018-19 budget figures). The chair verified the stated balances against the reserve bank statement.
- **b.** Accounts for payment: The council unanimously approved eleven payments totalling £726.03 noting that the new cheque book had not yet arrived. As a result there were no cheques available to sign.
- **c. Appointment of internal auditor:** Councillors **agreed** that Mr Roe should be asked whether he would be prepared to undertake the role for a further year.
- **d. Review system of internal control:** Councillors discussed the operation of the system of internal control and **agreed** that it was adequate for the size and needs of the council and continued to operate effectively, subject to the appointment of an internal auditor which was in hand.
- e. Consider need for interim internal audit: The clerk advised councillors as to the on-going nature of the internal audit process. Councillors considered their financial affairs for the financial year to date. They **decided** that, given the thorough nature of the internal audit carried out by Mr Roe, an interim internal audit would be disproportionate and was not justified.
- 10. **Property matters including sports field:** The chair confirmed that payment of the council's rent invoice was in hand.

- 4. The bidding process may not be completed until spring 2019 A meeting between tenants, the vice chancellor of NTU and Kay Cutts of NCC was taking place on 28 November 2018.

13. Village environment and appearance, including:

a. Village Hall refurbishment project: The chair reported that the costs of the project had increased significantly and now exceeded the lottery award. The architect is reviewing the plans and is confident that the costs can be reduced. Councillors expressed regret that the village hall had been closed for a long period and was losing revenue. The chair invited interested residents to join the committee and help take the project forward.

b. Moorhouse – Village fingerpost including LIS funding application: Mr S Hill reported that Mr Keeling of NCC Highways to did not need to approve the design of the fingerpost because it is of a traditional design without artwork. Mr Keeling had also advised that the parish council was free to decide where to position the brown cycle way sign. Mr S Hill will decide whether this would be better incorporated on the new post or left on the existing.

c. Permissive access – Land surrounding cricket pitch: No developments.
