Many congratulations to Sarah Hill on the safe arrival of her twin boys just in time for this edition of Open Field.


They were born on 16th January and as yet have no names. We hope to bring that news next month.

Court Day at Laxton 2024

Laxton Court Day took place, as usual on the first Thursday in December. This comes exactly one week after Jury Day, when the field Jury goes around the field which is newly sown with wheat.

Laxton is unique in having a functioning Manorial Court or Court Leet, which can legally



determine legal proceedings and levy fines within its remit of



managing the Open Fields.

In 1976 the government looked at the many such courts which were still on the statute books of the land to function as they had in the past. The intention was to delete them all from the statute books and tidy things up.

The Laxton Court has a Steward, appointed by the Lord of the Manor, to ensure the proceedings are carried out properly. For a very long time the Steward has been a solicitor from Tallents of Newark.

The Steward in post at the time of the change of plans received and read the draft changes and realised that Laxton's court leet would lose its powers. He wrote to point out that this power remained essential to the functioning of the court he was involved with. As a result the legal draft Act was rewritten and when the Administration of Justice



Act (1977) came into force, Laxton was specifically mentioned as continuing to have its powers.

There was another survivor, the Estray Court of Denbigh, which had powers relating to rounding up of stray sheep and allowing their owners to claim them. The claimants pay a fine and are able to recover their sheep. The two courts are similar historically but function for very different purposes and Laxton is unique not just for the functioning three field system, but the existence of the Court to manage it.

The court opens with the Bailiff, Robert Haigh, reading the traditional form of words, now adapted to refer to His Majesty the King, to open proceedings. The Manor suit roll is read - effectively a list of people with property in the estate - and for those not present an essoign of 2p is paid. This name comes from the Old French word essognier, to excuse, so it is not officially a fine. Traditionally the Bailiff would have gone round to collect the money from those who were absent, but these days Robert brings a bag of 2p pieces. On average around 12p is collected.

The people who have been asked to form the Jury for the following year are called forward in turn to take a formal oath to serve after the Foreman of the following year's wheat field has taken a more detailed oath on behalf of them all.

The Foreman of the field, known as 'the wheat field', which has just been brought back from fallow and drilled with wheat presents the findings of the Jury. On this occasion West (Top) Field had been examined and the Foreman, Johnny Godson should have taken this oath. Sadly he died before the Court session and the current Steward, Alistair Millar paid tribute to him and his service, calling for everyone to stand for a minute's silence. Steven Noble was elected unopposed as the new Foreman, succeeding Johnny who in turn had succeeded Steven's father.

The transgressions in the field were recorded and the recommended fines agreed. The Foremen of the other two fields were invited to bring up any issues relating to their fields. This is a relatively new innovation.

When the business was concluded, Robert read the formal closing statement and the meeting opened for general business. Gregor Pierrepont was present representing the Thoresby Estate and he spoke about current activities in the village and plans for future work, including ideas for the creation of a new Visitor Centre adjacent to the Village Hall. This is currently at the early stages of planning. axton History Group





Keith's was a fascinating presentation, looking into many aspects of the river. It is185 miles long and one of the fastest flowing in the country. He old names for the river (the Celtic Trisantona and the Anglo Saxon Tréenta) both translate as 'Trespasser – a

reference to its regular floods .

The Trent rises on Bidulph Moor in Staffordshire in a spring which has never dried up in the 400+ years that records have been kept.

Along much of the river's length there are ruined buildings constructed by different Holy Orders. Canals also feature. Josiah Wedgwood persuaded Brindley to choose the route for his Great Salt Canal so that it also connected Stoke and the Potteries.

The network gave access by river or canal from the Humber to the Mersey ports. The Trent itself was navigable as far as Shardlow, although bridge building restricted access to Nottingham for some time.

The connection to the Potteries brought not only trade, but pollution. Trentham Hall, built by the Dukes of Sutherland, fell victim to this and was demolished barely 50 years after it was built because the terrible smell was unacceptable.

Flowing through the rich coal field areas, the Trent provided a convenient means of getting coal to the emerging power stations. Keith had counted 13 power stations on the banks. Ratcliffe on Trent had been the 12th worst source of pollution in Europe, but has recently closed. Only three power stations remain. Cottam has been closed but is being looked at for alternative power sources because of the capacity remaining in its distribution system.

At Burton on Trent the river supports the brewing industry.

The Romans venerated the river because it created defensible positions against the rebellious tribes of the north. It provided a natural barrier to travel between north and south. Pre 1750 only four bridges had been built. There are now 95. Trent Bridge was built in 1800 and when the old, low bridge at the same point was demolished it restored the navigability of the river. The first bridge at Newark was Saxon.

The geology of the river is interesting. It originally started near the Severn, but moved due to the Ice Ages. The ice did not retreat uniformly and left

lakes as well as creating the different rock layers over which the river flows.

Keith told us that the Trent is a 'river in old age', characterised by flooding frequently. Younger rivers flow over more gravels and carve their own channels as they go. Glacial action made the Trent valley U-shaped, allowing the river to meander and flood.

The Trent takes water from eight counties and is joined along its length by five other rivers. The water coming from the Derwent and Soar doubles the Trent's rate of flow in five miles. Sometimes the flow is too great for some boats and they have to tie up until it falls and they can travel again.

The bridge at Gainsborough was the first box girder bridge built in this country.

The waters of the Trent join the Humber at Blacktoft Sands, a muddy promontory cared for by the RSPB as a bird sanctuary.

Following this meeting, the Group took the regular winter break, but there was a general consensus that a social get together as in some previous years, was welcome in January. This was arranged at The Birds Nest Coffee Lounge at Hall Fa\rm, Weston on 15th January.

January Social

We do not hold a meeting in the Village Hall in January - a practice which dates back to the days before the Hall's refurbishment when we sat there in coats in freezing temperatures. Even when the heating was working, it struggled to overcome the chill which had gripped the building over the festive break. Members were reluctant to tear themselves away from their warm firesides and brave the elements for a less than comfortable evening.

More recently we have got into the habit of holding a social get together at Hall Farm's Birds Nest Coffee Lounge in January to simply get together and have a chat..

This year it was a last minute decision, but Jean, true to form, had it all organised in a morning. A big thank you to her.

It was lovely to get everyone together over a cuppa and the Birds Nest's usual tempting selection of cakes. It was a very pleasant afternoon and enabled people who had not seen each other for a while to exchange news.

We will now be all ready for our very special **19th February** meeting when our speaker will be **John Millin, son of the D-Day Piper**, who will be telling us about his father. All villagers are most welcome to come along, but please let Helen or Jean know if you plan to do so to ensure we are prepared with chairs and refreshments.

We hope this will also be an opportunity to welcome villagers who are not regular members as well as interested people from surrounding villages. In lieu of a fee, we will be making a donation to Forces Charities.

Minutes of Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council Meeting held on 24/09/2024

Present: Councillors: S.Hill (chair), J.Hill, M.Hennell, S.Rose, D.Sheard, A.Moorhouse, R.Creighton

In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Wilson (Clerk), M. Pringle (county councillor) Members of the public (x9)

- 1. Apologies for absence: Mrs Michael's apologies were noted.
- 2. **Declarations of interest:** There were no declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. Dispensations: None required.
- 4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** Councillors were asked how the parish council would support Moorhouse residents who will be disproportionately adversely affected by the solar farm development if approved. Councillors confirmed that the parish council is engaging with JPAG and appreciates that a number of residents are opposed to the farm. The clerk confirmed that it is a standing agenda item which the councillors must consider on behalf of all their electors.

Members of the public referred to the following matters in particular:

- 1. The existing solar farm at Egmanton is not an issue because it is small. In contrast, the Great North Road (GNR) proposal is vast in size.
- 2. The cumulative effect of losing good agricultural land to energy production and associated implications for food security and farming output.
- 3. The ecological considerations, including:

a. Increased flood risks, which is a concern to NCC

- b. The impact on wildlife of the loss of so much open space
- c. The risk of creating a microclimate bringing heat and wind issues
- 4. The health risks for residents arising out of the loss of rural outlooks to a view of glass panels
- 5. The implications for house prices
- 6. Residents do not oppose solar panels but believe they should be placed on roofs not good quality agricultural land
- 7. The impact on Moorhouse will be significantly higher than on Laxton, with footpaths and bridleways badly affected and the village surrounded by panels which will be visible from all properties

8. Moorhouse will be affected by construction and traffic noise.

Councillors noted all the concerns which they would consider at item 11

c on the agenda.

In relation to item 11 a ii on the agenda (Planning application 24/01463/CPRIOR – Change of use – Church Farm), councillors also noted concerns at any associated risk of impeded water flow creating a flood risk.

- 5. Thoresby Estate report (if any): No report.
- 6. **Minutes of the Parish Council meetings held on 23 July 2024:** The minutes of the parish council meetings held on 23 July 2024 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair subject to the amendment of LMPC/102/24 to refer to "out of date" instead of "pit of date.
- Matters arising: LMPC/107/24 Agenda items for the next meeting – The clerk reported that Oliver Scott of NSDC planning was able to attend a meeting. She will invite him to the November meeting. There were no other matters arising.
- 8. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Mrs Michael was absent.

In his report, Mr Pringle referred to the following in particular:

- i. Issues continue to arise in relation to road surfaces
- ii. The closure of day care facilities in North Nottinghamshire

An update will follow the forthcoming full council meeting. **Reports from councillors:** It was reported that the new gate and fence on the Moorhouse side of Croftway were not aligned with the boundary. Photographs will be sent to the clerk who will report the issue to NCC. It was also reported that grass is still covering the stretch of pavement between Bottom Farm, Main Street to Moorgate Farm on Moorhouse Road. The clerk will remind NCC.

- **9.** Property matters including sports field, lease and pavilion and Glebe Field matters (if any): Mr S Hill and Mr Rose had obtained keys to the pavilion and had undertaken an inspection. Their inspection report referred to the following in particular:
 - i. The pavilion is well constructed, in very good condition and is looked after
 - ii. Ideally, clearing up around the outside woodwork would be of benefit
 - iii. Retreatment of the wood nearer the ground would also be desirable
 - iv. Both the above were not out of ordinary but were just usual maintenance
 - v. A generator is used to provide electricity
 - vi. The outside tap would benefit from some lagging
 - vii. The sports field looks fantastic

Councillors commended the committee on the standard to which the site has been maintained and thanked the members for their hard work on this community asset. The clerk will contact the committee formally to pass on the council's thanks.

Sports field and pavilion condition report to be an agenda item for the

November 2024 meeting.

Councillors discussed the Thoresby Estate's request that the parish council pay its legal fees attendant on the variation of the lease to provide for subletting. They expressed concern at the budgetary implications of a contribution of £750 (excluding VAT) which represents over a sixth of the council's annual income. After further discussion, they **agreed** that the clerk should contact the Estate to explore the possibility of a smaller contribution.

It was noted that there is a temporary fence around Glebe Field. Councillors commended the tenant on the work they do to look after the field. The clerk will contact the tenants formally to pass on the council's thanks.

10.Planning matters:

- a.Applications:
 - i. 24/01472/FUL | Change of Use of Farmyard to Residential; Conversion and Alteration of Farm Buildings to Form 2 Dwellings; Demolition and Partial Demolition of Modern Farm Buildings; and Associated External Infrastructure Works: Councillors discussed the application and unanimously agreed that, subject to appropriate management of any increased flooding or traffic, they had no objections to the proposal.
 - ii. 24/01463/CPRIOR | Application to determine if Prior approval required for a Proposed Change of Use of Agricultural Buildings to 4 Dwellinghouses and for Associated Building Operations: Councillors considered the exceptions to Class Q permitted development permissions and **agreed** that, in this instance, the technical issues were better determined by NSDC.
- b.To note planning decisions by NSDC: 24/01228/AGR Proposed agricultural barn - Ide Farm, Moorhouse Road, Laxton, Newark On Trent, NG22 0TB – Noted that prior approval was required and had been granted.
- c.Great North Road Solar Park Update and consider contribution to planning consultant report to be commissioned by the local Joint Parish Council Action Group (JPAG): Councillors discussed developments and JPAG's request at length. Discussion focused on the following in particular:
- i. Compliance issues in relation to precept expenditure
- ii. Councillors' obligation to avoid pre-judgment
- iii. The two aspects of the JPAG request for a contribution, which were whether this should be agreed in principle and the proposed apportionment of the consultant's fees between the parish councils
- iv. The disproportionate effect on a part of the parish, Moorhouse, in circumstances where another part, Laxton, has special protections Conscious of their obligation not to pre-judge the issue, councillors broadly favoured obtaining a consultant's report if affordable. However, in relation to JPAG's current proposal they were

concerned at the lack of information, detail and clarity, of assurance that the proposed £12,000 expenditure would not increase depending on developments, of provision for contributing councils to have input into the instructions, apparent absence of any quality assurance process in relation to the consultants invited to quote or provision for contributing councils to veto proposed retainer instructions or content and the unexplained deadline of the end of October 2024.

The clerk will contact JPAG seeking clarification and assurances in relation to the concerns raised.

The clerk will prepare a forward budget to enable councillors to consider the financial feasibility of a contribution to JPAG. Councillors will arrange a special meeting to discuss the JPAG proposal once they receive the information, clarification and assurances from JPAG. Standing orders were suspended to allow members of the public to speak under this item. Councillors noted representations that the proposed farm will cover 11 square miles and be the biggest in the country.

d.Compliance: No matters raised.

11. Defibrillator:

- a.Inspection report: Mr J Hill reported that there were no issues.
- b.**Replacement defibrillator and funding**: Councillors considered the offer of DHSC match funding and unanimously **agreed** that the offer should be accepted.
- c.**Provision of first aid kit:** Councillors noted the availability of free community first aid training. They **decided** to consider the matter in more detail at the November 2024 meeting.
- 12.Parish benches Inspection report: Mr Sheard reported that:
- a. The benches had all been painted
- b. He had undertaken some repairs but some additional repairs were required
- c. The condition of the pinfold bench is deteriorating and it would be prudent to begin to plan financially for its replacement.

Mr Sheard and Mr Rose will liaise with regard to completing the outstanding repairs. Councillors **approved** expenditure on the necessary repair materials up to £50 excluding VAT. Mr Sheard will also circulate his report.

Councillors thanked Mr Sheard for the work he had undertaken.

- 13. Flood resilience working party Report and any associated decisions: Mr Sheard will follow up with colleague of Mr Marshall who is the principal officer at NCC flood risk management. The working party will then meet. He will also chase the Internal Drainage Board and record riparian ownership. Councillors will share their thoughts in relation to the NSDC flood resilience grant scheme of which the clerk had just been notified.
- 14. Christmas event 2024 Parish council Christmas event group –

Consider and approve proposed plans for the event including risk assessment approval and expenditure: The Christmas event group had met. They reported that the Thoresby Estate will provide a tree and a supplier has been located who will provide further trees at cost.

Councillors discussed the funding for the event given other demands on reserves at this time. Having considered potential expenditure and amounts, councillors unanimously **authorised** the group to incur expenditure on the event up to a maximum of £200 excluding VAT.

15.Parish environment and appearance, including:

- **a. Mowing of verges:** Mr Sheard reported that the church had not agreed to the use of its mower.
- **b. Parish roads and pavements:** The clerk will report the condition of the footpath from the churchyard beside Twitchell Farm once she receives photos to share with NCC.
- **c. Community tidy up:** Mr Sheard reported that the tidy up of the church and churchyard had taken place on 22 September 2024 in poor weather. The gate and railings at the church gate would be painted.
- d. WWI and WWII remembrance memorial on the Green: Councillors considered the costings circulated by the clerk and expressed concern at the current extent of the demands on the council reserves.
- e. Parish environment enhancement in recognition of previous serving parish council members: The chair will circulate a photo of the proposed location for the proposed bench. The clerk will then contact NCC with details of the location and bench design to establish whether any permission is required.

16.Financial matters:

- a. **Financial position as at 31 August 2024:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 31 August 2024 (incorporating the 2024-25 budget figures) which the chair cross referred to the bank statements.
- **b.** Accounts for payment: Councillors unanimously approved eight payments totalling £646.49. The clerk updated councillors with regard to the continuing issues with the bank concerning signatories and will continue to liaise with the bank.
- 17. Service faults: Lamp 22 is still not working.
- 18. Correspondence: All items of correspondence noted.
- 19.5 minutes public speaking time: Omitted from the agenda in error.
- 20. Agenda items for next meeting: See above.
- 21. Date of next meeting: 7.30 pm Tuesday 26 November 2024 at the

Citizens Advice gives advice on Energy Bills

As temperatures drop it's natural to worry about the cost of the energy you are using. To stay in control of your energy costs we are offering advice on how to make sure you are on the best tariff for your energy and what to do if you are in debt to your provider.

If you're trying to save money on your gas or electricity, you might consider either:

- switching suppliers
- switching to a different tariff with your current supplier

Get help if you're behind with your energy bills

If you're struggling to afford your gas and electricity bills, contact your supplier to discuss ways to pay what you owe them. Your supplier has to help you come to a solution. You should try to negotiate a deal that works for both of you.

If you would like help to negotiate a payment plan with your supplier or if you want more information on switching your tariff we can assist you in doing so. Come along to one of our drop in sessions with your latest energy bill or call us on **01623 861769** to arrange a call back.

Grants and benefits to help you pay your energy bills

You might be able to get help if you're struggling to afford your energy bills or top up your prepayment meter. The help you get depends on:

- how you pay for your energy
- the type of energy you use
- if you claim benefits

Check if you can get a fuel voucher

If you can't afford to top up your prepayment meter, you might be able to get a fuel voucher.

You'll get the voucher as a code in a letter, text message or email. You can use it to add credit to your gas card or electricity key. If you don't have one of these, contact your supplier to get one. Your local council might be able to help you get a fuel voucher. If you're still not sure if you can get a voucher, we can help check for you.

Check if you can get a Winter Fuel Payment

If you've reached State Pension age and get certain benefits, you might be eligible for a Winter Fuel Payment. This is an annual one-off payment to help you pay for heating during the winter.

You'll get the payment if you or your partner get one of these benefits:

- Pension Credit
- Universal Credit
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Income Support
- Child Tax Credit
- Working Tax Credit

You'll get \pounds 200 if you're aged under 80 or \pounds 300 if you're over 80 years old.

If you believe you are eligible for the winter fuel payment but have not yet received it you need to make an application before March 2025.

You can make an application by visiting

www.gov.uk/winter-fuel-payment if you use a computer. If you do not have internet access you can call **0800 731 0160** to enquire.

Check if you can get a Warm Home Discount

If you get benefits, you might be able to get £150 off your electricity bill or £150 added to your prepayment meter. You'll get the payment by 31 March 2025. You don't need to apply for the scheme - payments are automatic.

If you got the Warm Home Discount last winter and your situation hasn't changed, you should get it again.

If you were not eligible for the scheme last year but believe you may now be you can give us a call on the number below and we will be happy to check your eligibility.
