Laxton History Group



Fourteen members are due to be enjoying a trip to the Framework Knitters Museum in Ruddington on Saturday June 18th as this issue is being printed. More next month.

Next month, on **Wednesday July 20th** we have our long awaited, and much delayed by Covid, visit from Professor Mark Pearce of Nottingham University. His topic is 'Towards an Archaeology of Cheese'. He will be speaking about how early humans began to settle the land, develop early agricultural practices and work out how to preserve surpluses for times of hardship.

It promises to be an interesting evening and is open to everyone. There is no membership fee for the group; just a £3 fee on the door. The meeting begins **at 7.30pm in Laxton Village Hall** and ends with refreshments. We would be delighted to see any new villagers, friends and visitors as well as our regular membership. Please speak to any member or just come on the night.

Laxton Castle - or Perhaps Not?

The annual volume of 'Transactions of the Thoroton Society of Nottinghamshire' was published at the end of April and contained an article likely to enrage Laxtonians far and wide. The author, Paul Everson of Keele University, claims that 'the earthwork complex identified as a medieval castle at Laxton is actually the remains of a post-Medieval house and garden ... Laxton indeed probably never had a castle'. 'Goodness me', I hear you saying, who is this imposter and what are the grounds for making such an assertion?

Everson is a distinguished archaeologist and he has looked carefully at the evidence available to him. From this he concludes that 'there is no whisper of any contemporary medieval documentation of a castle at Laxton.' His discussion takes into account the manor house, the site of the manor, and the role of King John on his regular visits to Laxton. Authors writing for 'Transactions' are allowed to give away 50 copies of their contributions in the form of PDFs.

I will ask Paul Everson if he can spare a few to pass round the village, and I am sure as well that he would be happy to enter the lion's den, i.e. speak at the History Group!

Ossington Airfield Marker Unveiled

Eighty years after aeroplanes first flew from RAF Ossington, the airfield finally has an official marker of its existence. Following several years of research and planning, which was interrupted by the pandemic, local residents came out in force to witness its official unveiling.

The Airfields of Britain Conservation Trust commissioned and erected the special granite marker stone, inscribed with the dates of the airfield's inception and closure. The stone is placed very close to what was the centre of the airfield, near the intersection of two of the runways – one of which is now the public road connecting Ossington to Kneesall. The road to Kneesall was closed for the duration of the airfield's existence.



During World War 2 thousands of air force personnel, including many Canadians, including the crew who are commemorated facing South Field, Laxton, were based at Ossington whilst in training to fly bomber aircraft. Directly after the war, the airfield was used as a training base for BOAC pilots.

Kenneth Bannerman, the Chief Executive Officer of ABCT, unveiled the memorial with help from locals involved in the project, after an introduction by the land owner, Georgina Denison.

Present: Councillors: M. Manning (chair), S. Hill, M. Hennell J. Hill, S. Rose, J. Godson, R. Hennell

In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Wilson (Clerk), S. Michael (District councillor), B Perry (Thoresby Estate representative), Members of the public (7)

 Councillors noted that this annual item had been omitted from the agenda in error and **agreed** to consider the following as though they had been agenda items.

Election of Officers:

The following were **elected**:

- (a) Chair Mr Manning (unanimous)
- (b) Vice-Chair Mr S Hill (unanimous)
- (c) Accounts scrutineer Mr S Hill (unanimous)
- (d) Defibrillator inspection councillor Mr J Hill (unanimous)
- (e) Resilience store keyholder Mr Roy Hennell and Mr J Hill (unanimous)
- (f) Flood contact Mr M Manning (unanimous)
- Apologies for absence: There were no absences. <u>Declarations of interest</u>: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 10 (Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field maintenance and licence completion). There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. Dispensations: None required.
- 4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** Concerns were raised about the condition of the roads in the village. These included potholes on Toad Lane and flooding on Moorhouse Road. The public will provide the clerk with details and she will follow up with NCC and Mr Pringle.
- 5. **Thoresby Estate report (if any):** Councillors welcomed Mr Perry to the meeting. He reported that:
 - a. Work was now underway on the toilets. The team is currently working to address damp issues and had had to wait for the warmer weather if these works were to be effective. The source of the damp had been cured and a new hand drier installed. Redecoration is planned for the end of the week so the toilets should be ready for the jubilee weekend.
 - b. The content for the interpretation boards had now been provided and new wording prepared by a volunteer. The Estate was now looking for a volunteer to redo the photos. Sir John Starkey had offered support with the graphic design. As regards funding, Mr

Perry will provide an application form available to the Lady Rozelle Charitable Fund. It was **agreed** that it would be sensible to mount the boards vertically to prevent water collecting at the bottom.

- 6. Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 22 March 2022: The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 22 March 2022 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair, subject to the amendment of "Landsyke" to "Langsyke".
- 7. **Matters arising:** No other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.
- 8. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Mrs Michael referred to her earlier report at the preceding Annual Parish Meeting reported and drew councillors' attention to NSDC's renewed community grant scheme.
- 9. **Reports from councillors:** Mr S Hill had been unavailable to attend the last SNG meeting. Mrs Michael reported that very little had changed since the last meeting. The main concerns had centred on speeding.
- **10.** Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field maintenance and licence completion: Councillors noted that the sports field is being used for the jubilee. Mr Rose will liaise with the Glebe field tenant regarding the jubilee tree to be planted and appropriate protection.

Councillors **confirmed** the chair's **authority** to sign the licence which the chair then did.

There was discussion of the basis on which the cutting of the grass around the telephone kiosk was being undertaken. Councillors were grateful to the resident who was kindly undertaking the work. Mr J Hill will contact the resident to enquire whether the arrangement was suitable for them.

11. Planning matters:

- a. Applications: 22/00440/FUL- Implementation of Phase One of Landscape Masterplan, plus new Extensions to the Ronson Building and the Cottages with associated alteration and refurbishment works. Alteration and refurbishment works to the Main House. | Beth Shalom: After extensive discussion, councillors **agreed** that they had no collective comments to make. Individual councillors were free to comment in that capacity should they wish to do so.
- b. To note planning decisions by NSDC: None.
- c. Compliance: No matters raised.
- 12. **Defibrillator inspection report:** Councillors noted that the clerk had ordered a new one but there were significant supply issues with none available from established sources. She is receiving regular stock updates. The delays appear to be caused by a combination of Brexit, Covid and the war in Ukraine. Councillors were concerned but recognized that their options were limited in the circumstances.

13. Village environment and appearance, including:

a. Second defibrillator: The chair had still not received any suggestions in response to his article in the Open Field seeking

residents' views on a second defibrillator.

- **b.** Use of telephone kiosk: Again, the chair had not received any suggestions in response to his article in the Open Field seeking residents' views apart from the suggestion that a sign referring to the defibrillator location be displayed.
- **c. Bar Farmhouse:** No developments. The deadline for the owner to undertake repairs had not yet expired.
- d. **Jubilee event:** Mr S Hill reported that the council had received £150 grant from NSDC and £625 from Lady Rozelle Charitable Fund. Councillors expressed their thanks. Mr Hill went on to report as follows:
 - 1. The events would begin at 9.45 pm on the Thursday night with a beacon being let by the Dovecote.
 - 2. From 3 pm on the Friday there will be an ice cream van at the pub and also a hog roast with accompaniments provided by the Dovecote.
 - 3. There would be a picnic at the sports field from midday on the Saturday and a band from 1 pm.
 - 4. Sunday would see the tree planting by Sir John Starkey followed by a Songs of Praise at the church and a village hall tea provided by the WI. Residents must book if they would like to attend the tea, in the village from 3 pm on the Saturday.
 - 5. Two competitions have been launched in the village: the best buntinged house and the bet royal scarecrow.
 - 6. Commemorative mugs were being given by yeh parish council to all under 16s in the parish. These were being funded by the clothing bank.
 - 7. The event has no more than 500 people attending at any one time.
- e. Laxton Conservation Area Character Appraisal Update: The extension of the conservation area had been approved by NSDC on 24 March 2022.

14.

a. **a. Financial position as at 30 April 2022:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 30 April 2022 (incorporating the 2022-23 budget figures). The chair verified the stated balances against bank statements.

- **b.** Accounts for payment: The council discussed the discrepancy between the invoice received in relation to Glebe field and the hedge laying works, £1820, and the quote, £1150. They unanimously decided that only the quoted amount should be paid and approved fifteen payments totalling £2364.39.
- c. Review system of internal control and internal audit system effectiveness: Councillors discussed the operation of the system of internal control and **agreed** that it remained adequate and continued to operate effectively. Councillors also reviewed the effectiveness of the internal audit system and **agreed** that, taking account of the straightforward nature of the council's transactions this year, it operated effectively on an annual basis.

- **d.** Risk assessment 2022 23: Councillors considered and approved the draft revised risk assessment for 2022-23 circulated by the clerk.

- 16. Correspondence: All items of correspondence noted.
- **17.** <u>Agenda items for next meeting:</u> NSDC Community grant scheme and jubilee feedback.
- **18. Date of next meeting**: Tuesday 19 July 2022 at Moorhouse church. Noted that this was one week earlier than usual. The meeting closed at 9.30 pm

83% of people in the East Midlands have been targeted by a scammer so far this year as the cost-of-living crisis takes hold, new research by Citizens Advice Sherwood & Newark has found.

Of those people targeted by a scam, the top three most common types of scams reported in the East Midlands included:

Deliveries, portal and courier services (54%)

Government or HMRC scams (41%) Investment or financial (32%) Rebates and refunds (32%) Online shopping (22%) Banking (22%)

Ahead of many households receiving vital government help to cope with rising prices, Citizens Advice and the Consumer Protection Partnership held their annual Scams Awareness campaign in June. They are sharing information and tips to avoid scammers, such as helping people find information on the genuine types of help available and how they'll receive it see '*lf you're struggling with living costs*' and '*Grants and benefits to help you pay your energy bills*' on the Citizens Advice website.

If you've been scammed, Citizens Advice Sherwood & Newark advises:
