

For the first time in 13 years Laxton held an Open Gardens event. It was a very pleasant and gusty day, perfect for the many people walking up and down the village street. Around 200 people came to see the seven gardens which were open.

In addition to the gardens, the church opened and two villagers put on displays with vintage tractors. There was a lot for v

The start point was optional and each garden had a supply of maps to guide the stream of people working their way around. The gardens were numbered and numerically they started at Mike and Cath's the bottom of the village; a pretty cottage style garden with attractive borders and imaginative planting and containers.



Part way up Main Street was the garden created by Joy and Richard who inherited some mature trees, a lot of lawn and a sloping site moving in 13 years ago. The result of a

terrific imagination and a lot of hard work is the most beautiful garden, which would grace any

magazine. It draws you in with different little areas, lots of seating and a picturesque stream running down the carefully created and planted contours throughout the main garden.

Across the road is Dan and Sarah's more open garden on a very sloping site. The borders are full of traditional country



Thank you for nominating the Village Hall this year.

Thank you to all those involved, and a special thanks to all those swept along by the event and the sense of village pride it instilled. It was fabulous to see and be part of. I know that I don't want to see another bag of compost for a while, although washing pots really gets your hands clean!

#### **Future Possibilities**

I have been thinking about trying to open up new social activities in the village for a while now. I think that the Village Hall is the perfect place to start, and we have come up with a new project, called "Laxton Alive". Our aim is to encourage people to get out and about, socialising in the village. As a start, we have just applied to NSDC for 3 grants from their Community Grant Scheme. They have been very well received by NSDC, and if successful we will be looking at: -

A dance fit class - 1 evening per week for 6 weeks - as a free taster session, with a view to the teacher taking over running it after the 6 weeks. Probably October onwards. Places will be limited, due to the size of the

hall. I have a teacher interested, but she can only do Thursdays at present

Are you interested in taking part? What start time would be best?

A luncheon club. Another free event. Everyone welcome, particularly those who don't see many people throughout the week. The idea is to book a place, have a chat whilst preparing, cooking and then eating the meal together, although helping isn't compulsory One lunchtime per month for 6 months, from October to March.

### Nature Notes From Moorhouse

Here is the second in the series of nature notes sent in by Paul Longmuir from Moorhouse. Many thanks to Paul for doing this.

April saw the return of the house martins and the swallows, which were a week or two later this year, no doubt due to the cold and wet start to spring. After a slow start, everything is growing at a frantic pace and has virtually caught up, the cow parsley has just burst into flower along with the valuable dandelions, forget-me-nots, foxgloves, apple and cherry blossoms and hawthorn, to name but a few.

I am proud to say we are delighted to share our home, immediate garden and outbuildings this year, like most these days with a pair of nesting swallows, four pairs of house martins along with goldfinch,

dunnock, pied wagtail, collared dove, starlings, kestrel, robin, wren, lots of house sparrows (noisy!!) and a barn owl that we have the privilege of watching hunt on most evenings.

In our field and wood I have recorded so many beautiful birds so far this year, in particular and notedly a black cap, skylark, willow warbler, spotted flycatcher, greater whitethroat, bullfinch, chiff chaff, goldcrest, linnet, chaffinch, pheasant, partridge, greenfinch, blue, great and long tailed tit, dunnock, wren, robin, song thrush and blackbirds, that sing an amazing melody most mornings and evenings.

We also have quite a few beautiful vivid greater spotted woodpeckers that squabble around the bird feeders. The

magnificent red kite and buzzards often drift over, usually quickly chased away by the carrion crows or jackdaw. Unfortunately, though,

so far this year I have not heard a cuckoo (apart from down by the river Trent at Carlton), or turtle dove, and adding to this list are the willow tit and tree creeper.


The amazing-looking green woodpecker has made a late appearance, digging up the many ants' nests that we have around the garden. I would really be interested to hear from anyone who has seen or heard anything unusual or can remember a day when hearing a cuckoo, swift or a turtle dove was commonplace in Moorhouse or Laxton. Various butterflies are starting to appear now, with sightings of the orange tip, red admiral, small tortoiseshell, speckled wood, small white, peacock and lots of brimstone!


We had an encounter with a cockchafer beetle, or May bug; quite a

big ungainly creature bouncing off the foliage, but magnificent in its own right.

At the time of writing in mid May, the solitary bee (possibly our most important) seems to be in abundance this year, massing around the bee hotel and on the crumbling mortar brick wall. They say that the solitary bee is up to 7 times more productive at pollination than any other bee!

# **Laxton History Group**



As this is written, History Group members are looking forward to an evening with their Honorary President.

Professor John Beckett, whose talk will take a look back at Laxton through time. John is looking forward to renewing old acquaintances and making new ones.

Unfortunately with the June meeting taking place on 19th, due to the way the 3rd Wednesday falls, we will bring a report next month.

John Beckett was here recently with a group visit and has written the report below.

#### **Thoroton Society Visit**

Twenty-five members of the Thoroton Society of Nottinghamshire, the county's principal historical, antiquarian and archaeological society, visited Laxton on 16<sup>th</sup> May and, unsurprisingly, it rained! They were shown around the village by Stuart Rose and John Beckett and had a pre-arranged lunch in the Dovecote Inn. John is now President of the Thoroton Society as well as the Laxton History Group!

In view of the weather, the party stopped first at the Visitor Centre and watched the film. They asked questions about the open fields and the village buildings. Next they went to the church, and heard about changes over time. With persistent rain seemingly getting more persistent it was decided not to walk to the castle site, and instead they retired to have lunch in the pub.

After that the party moved on to inspect the Mill Field, but it was too wet to do much more than view from afar (i.e. the road). At 3pm the visit was abandoned and the Thorotonians retreated home.

The Thoroton Society has visited Laxton on a number of occasions and hopefully will come again soon. It was a shame that the weather was so troublesome!

### News from the Museums of Tuxford

The impact of the ordinary man on our history has been highlighted during the D-Day events. Items in museums tell social stories and can connect with a wide variety of interests. We are reminded of the need

for team work to produce objects that are

both functional and beautiful.

The Museum of the Horse's 10th Anniversary exhibition is on until August. The museum is visited by people from all over the world and is widely regarded as one of the best horse museums in Europe.

In the collection is a buckle made for the Peacock coach used by the Shah of Persia (now Iran) for his coronation. It was given to us by the saddler who made the harness. Formed from peacock blue leather and with gilded fittings, it would have been a spare buckle that wasn't used.

We had some upsetting news this month, when we heard that our County Headquarters at Newark has been put up for sale. This is the grade II listed house which stands at the side of the river in the castle grounds. It is an old building which needs a lot of upkeep.

Since lockdown the county membership has fallen from 5000 to 3000, which means a significant drop in revenue for the county funds and therefore the executive committee have had to make the decision to sell and look for another property.

She gave a very informative talk about the work of the Trust. It was founded in 1891 by a lady called Gertrude Stock, under the original name of the Canine Defence League. In 2003 it became the Dogs' Trust.


## **Tuxford Young Farmers**

# Citizens Advice receives a complaint about used cars every three minutes.

#### **Citizens Advice Top Tips for Buyers**

Problems with used cars are consistently the top complaint made to Citizens Advice Consumer Service. We are offering top tips as a buyer as research shows 3.5 million people are currently looking to buy a used car. New data shows that our charity's consumer service received a used car complaint every 3 minutes last year.

These tips can help put a stop to unexpected issues motorists might face when purchasing a used car.

#### Check the trader

If you're buying from a trader (a business that sells cars) you should:

 Look for an established firm with a good reputation. Look for a garage that is a member of the Consumer Codes Approval Scheme, this means you can act through the Code Sponsor if something goes wrong

If you're buying from an individual seller:

 You're entitled to expect that the vehicle is roadworthy, unless you and the seller clearly agree it is bought for scrap or for spares and repair

#### Check the car's history

You'll need the seller's permission to have the vehicle inspected. Make sure to keep a copy of all inspections or checks, either by taking a screenshot or downloading the information.

- Check the car's details with the DVLA using their free online vehicle checker and check the MOT history on GOV.UK
- 2. Get a private history check. This might cost up to £20, but will give you valuable information about serious problems the car might have. If you're still not sure get an independent report. This will give you detailed information about the car's condition and will cost around £120 to £250
- 3. Inspect the car and take a test drive. You should arrange to view the car in daylight, preferably when it's dry it's harder to spot damage to the car if it's wet

#### Paying for a used car

Ask questions if you're unsure about anything in the small print. Remember you can stop the deal if you feel like you're being pressured into paying too much or buying additional features. And make sure you get the original (not a photocopy) of the log book (the V5C registration certificate) and the valid MOT test document. Never buy a car without the log book.

The way you pay will affect what rights you might have if something goes wrong:

- If you pay by cash, there are no extra fees or interest but if something goes wrong with the car you won't have the protection that you have if you buy using a card or on finance.
- If you use a debit card you might have protection from problems from your provider's chargeback scheme. And if you use a credit card, you're protected as long as you paid more than £100 and no more than £30,000, even if you only paid for a small part of the cost on a credit card (this is called 'section 75' protection).
- If you pay using finance arranged by a trader, you might have extra protection if there's a problem later, because you can take action against the finance company as well as the trader (or instead of the trader).

You can complain to the Financial Ombudsman Service if you have an unresolved complaint and have paid by debit card, credit card or using finance.
