Letter From Revd. Philip Howson

An end is nigh.

I've been with you all for nearly three years as Curate with Revd Zoe and the team, but I now need to let you know that I've been offered a proper vicar's post in rural Cambridgeshire and am moving very soon. My final service – and day of work – will be at 10:30, 30th June at St Paulinus Church, Church Circle, New Ollerton. It will be a farewell celebration, so if I don't see you before I would love to see you then. The offer is a cause of great celebration for me and my family but I've no doubt I shall shed some tears as I leave you.

I'm moving on to be the vicar in a little corner of rural Cambridgeshire joining seven villages and churches in their life together as a benefice (that's church-speak for a clutch of churches that have one vicar). The benefice is called South Leightonstone. It sounds like a lot of work, but it's not that many people (apparently the area I'm going to is the least populated in Cambridgeshire) and there will be a good team of people to work with. It's something of a surprise that we are going that far, but it fulfils what has been a growing desire for me to go and vicar in country parishes.

It has been an extraordinary gift serving in our town and villages. The team I've worked with have been extremely generous of their time and talents in helping me adapt to and learn the ropes, and the communities have been equally generous in their welcome and support.

There have been some strange highlights (being St George!?) and some deep sadnesses as we've said farewell to some wonderful people. Community life has been rich and rewarding and I shall certainly take with me the great benefits I've found here.

So, thank you. Thanks for having me, for encouraging me, for welcoming us. Thanks for letting me into your wonderful communities and helping me get to grips with this strange and wonderful role.

The announcement was made on Sunday 5th May that the Bishop of Ely had appointed the Rev. Philip Howson as Rector of the Benefice of South Leightonstone in the Deanery of Huntingdon and the Diocese of Ely.

Philip will become Rector of seven churches including St Giles, Barham; All Saints, Covington; St Peter's, Easton; St Andrew's, Kimbolton; St James, Spaldwick; St Botolph, Stow Longa and All Saints, Tilbrook.





Philip will be installed by the Bishop of Eley on Tuesday 9th July 2019 at St Andrew's Church, Kimbolton. He took his last service here in Laxton on Sunday 12th May. We were joined by members from Moorhouse, Wellow, Egmanton and Kirton to say goodbye to him.

After the service Philip was presented with a card which everyone had signed by Brenda Noble and Simon Hill.



cream teas to be baked, and a club scrapbook


to put together.

Michael Wood Award

Between the presentation of their work by the children at Kneesall School and our presentation to them, we took their projects and some of those from Norwell / Normanton completed last year to Mansfield. They formed our display at the Great Nottinghamshire Local History Fair.

There were some wonderful models this year with something of an emphasis on mining. They included one showing the headstocks and buildings at Clipstone and a pit pony pulling a coal tub. Our plea for an extra table was well judged as we filed all the space allocated to us. Almost 500 people visited the exhibition between 11am and 3pm and our representatives saw a steady stream of interested people.

David Amos, a former miner turned speaker and now Research Associate in Coal and Dialect at Nottingham Trent University, who as been to talk to us in the past was very impressed with Ella Hoyland's project on pit ponies inspired by her grandfather, who was a horsemaster in a pit in the north east. With permission from Jill, he plans to take it and show it to the National Museum of Mining near Wakefield, where he feels it would add to their educational display in an underground stable.

We now look forward to returning to **Kneesall School** on 5th **June**, **between** 9 and 10am for the presentation of gifts and certificates.

We have continued to have contact with Tuxford Primary School, where 83 children in years 5 and 6 are taking part in a mini pilot of the Michael Wood Award this year. We have an invitation to go to the school on both 5th and 12th June, when the two years will present their work to us separately.

May Meeting

We were sad to hear of the death of Mac Mumford on 1st May. He was a friend, member and speaker and will be sadly missed by all who knew him.

We had planned to visit the tomb of King Richard III in Leicester in May, but things conspired to make the trip unviable so it was deferred. We decided to hold a film night instead. We welcomed Ruth White as a new member and several visitors. Roger also reported the success of the large display we took to Mansfield to showcase the work of the children. We were able to speak to a good number of visitors and exhibitors. Some were really interested in individual projects and the Award process. Coincidentally we bought a copy of a local history book on Tuxford from the Library Service.

We then moved on to the films. Janet was unfortunately still unwell, but had kindly sent along her comprehensive list of the people and horses shown in the 1935 film.

Our next meeting is on **June 19th at Egmanto**n when we will welcome Brian Howes to tell us about '**Treasure in the Attic**'. This will be at 7.30pmm in Egmanton Village Hall.

Dear Catherine

Apologies for the slight delay but we have agreed that we will not issue any updates without agreeing the statement with all parties involved.

However I can confirm that following the short listing process, interviews were held with The Crown Estate with those short listed parties and as a result of that The Crown Estate now have a "preferred bidder". I can confirm that The Crown Estate and Carter Jonas are working closely with this party to progress the sale.

We remain keen to keep you updated, however you will appreciate the sensitivities around this sale and the need to keep the purchaser confidential during these early stages. As soon as we are in a position to confirm who the purchaser is, we shall do so.

Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council Minutes of the Meeting on 26/3/19

Present: Councillors: M. Manning (Chair), S. Hill, R.Hennell, M. Hennell, J.Hill, R.Godson

In attendance at parish council meeting

- C. Millward (Clerk), S. Michael (District councillor), M. Pringle (County councillor), Members of the public (x2)
- 1. **Apologies for absence:** Apologies for absence were received and accepted from Mr Brown.
- Presentation Rural communities and an ageing population Councillors welcomed Mr John Gray to the meeting who gave a presentation on rural communities and an ageing population. Mr Gray referred in particular to:
 - a. The delineation of the census area, which includes Ompton
 - b. The value of the census in informing future plans and strategies for the area
 - c. The increasing percentage of residents who are over 60
 - d. The needs of this ageing population and implications for the Laxton community in terms of services and sustainability.
 - e. Councillors thanked Mr Gray for his thought-provoking presentation.
 - Councillor Michael arrived during this item.
- Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 13 (Property matters – Sports field) and an interest as member of the village hall committee in item 16 a (Village environment – Village hall refurbishment project).
 - There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 4. **Dispensations:** None required.
- 5. 10 Minutes public speaking: Matters raised:
 - a. Brockilow Bridge The clerk will again report water pooling at the bridge. Councillors agreed that it was caused by a combination of the drains being too high and blocking easily. Mr Pringle will raise concerns at the narrow width of the bridge.
 - b. Relocation of 30 mph signs to further out of Laxton village Mr Pringle confirmed that these will be moved although the work

- would take place when there is an opportunity to combine it with other work in the village.
- c. Tree overhanging on The Bar/Cross Hill The clerk will report the issue to NCC

Mr Pringle invited councillors and residents to join him in a parish walk round with councillor Michael to identify and photograph highway shortcomings more widely and form a view as to the priorities for repair and improvement which Mr Pringle will then raise with NCC.

- 6. **Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 22 January 2019:** The minutes of the meeting held on 22 January 2019 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair.
- 7. **Matters arising:** All action points having been completed, being in hand or appearing elsewhere on the agenda, there were no matters arising.
- 8. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Councillor Pringle:
 - a. Updated councillors on developments in the wider area
 - b. Reported that the NCC share of the precept would rise by 1.9%.

Mrs Michael reported that:

- a. She had spoken with NSDC's enforcement officer who had inspected Bar Cottage but decided that its condition was not sufficiently poor to justify enforcement action.
- b. The recent NSDC survey had revealed that 90% of the ward's residents were either satisfied or very satisfied with the ward as a place to live. This contrasted with 13 areas in which fewer than 90% were satisfied.
- 9. **Reports from councillors**: Mr Hill reported on the matters discussed at the recent SNG meeting. Residents were invited to contact Mr Hill if they had any issues.
- 10. 2019 Annual Parish Meeting date and arrangements: In view of the statutory meeting requirements in an election year, councillors agreed that the Annual Parish Meeting and annual parish council meeting should take place earlier than usual, on 7 May 2019, at 8.00 pm and 7.00 pm respectively. The clerk will invite the Inspector Heather Sutton to speak at the Annual Parish Meeting.
- 11. **2019 Parish council elections:** The requirements for nomination were noted.

12. **Property matters including sports field:** Councillors noted that the sports field committee's contribution to the field rent had increased to 100% for 2019-20 onwards.

13. Financial Matters:

- a. Financial position as at 28 February 2019: Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 28 February 2019 (incorporating the 2018-19 budget figures).
- b. Accounts for payment: The council unanimously approved seven payments totalling £341.43. Property matters including sports field: Councillors noted that the sports field committee's contribution to the field rent had increased to 100% for 2019-20 onwards.

- b. Moorhouse Village fingerpost including LIS funding application: Councillors authorised the chair to sign the s115 permission and LIS capital funding agreement. The chair signed the documents which the clerk will submit to NSDC.
- c. Permissive access Land surrounding cricket pitch: The chair is taking matters forward. Reports of an application to create a footpath from Norwell Woodhouse to Laxton were noted.
- d. **Fibre broadband for Moorhouse:** Mr Pringle reported that £1m is to be paid by the EU irrespective of Brexit. Moorhouse is amongst the areas to benefit from the funding. However, work will only begin when the funding is received
