Letter from the Revd. Chris Levy

Dear Friends,

Last month we were thinking about the start of the season of Lent. As March begins we are now nearly half way through this season and on March 6th we reach the Fourth Sunday of Lent. This is often referred to as 'Refreshment Sunday' or we perhaps know it more familiarly as Mothering Sunday. We all are most probably aware of the many traditions and customs from times gone by about the importance of Mothering Sunday. In our own times it has become more a time to send cards, buy a present, give flowers and yes if families live a distance away visit and spend time together.

In the Church's teaching there is more to this special day than just the opportunity to show love and gratitude to our own Mothers. There is that additional element of thinking about Mary who was the Mother of Jesus and our relationship with the Church itself, which we often refer to as Mother Church. There are other times during the Church's year when we think of Mary but on this day it is particularly appropriate to think of her as His Mother at the centre of their family life together in Nazareth. Family life for Mary all those years ago would have been so different than what it is for many Mums today. The idea of Mothers working outside the home would have been unheard of. No the place of a mother was at the centre of the

home, looking after the children, caring for where they live and supporting their husband as he goes about his daily work. This picture of a family is one that lasted for many years and if you have been watching the series 'Back In Time' recently you will have seen that the Mother from the 21st Century found it very difficult to relate to the way many women lived as recently as the 1950's! It was not until the 60's that many of the changes that seem so 'normal' to us today that begun to happen.

There is still a desire to give every Child a good stable relationship within our homes. In her way Mary did this and with all the different pressures and at times the luxury of items not around 2000 years ago many Mothers carry out that same important role today. Hence we can look to Mary and see one who offers an example of one who shows love and devotion to her family. We are not told how much Jesus did or did not appreciate all that she carried out for him but at the centre of their family there must have been the same gift of love that cements our family life together still today.

And so it is as Christians we come to Church. Just as we see God as our Father so we see her as our Spiritual Mother. The place where we come for nurture, support, fellowship and to know that we are loved. Just as not every child always remembers to show love to their Mothers we too can often neglect to show how important the Church is to us. However, the important thing to remember is that the love we receive from her is unconditional and whilst we may occasionally turn our back on Her she is still there waiting for us to return. So give thanks to God for our own Mothers, Mary who became the willing Mother to Our Lord and Mother Church our Spiritual home.

A Look Behind the Archive Doors - Building in Laxton



Continuing our look into the Manvers Collection's uncatalogued correspondence at the University of Nottingham, this edition looks at the people involved in the building works in the village.

The small jobs were simply delegated to the bricklayer, but the Clerk of Works was involved in more complex or expensive works to determine what was needed and to prepare estimates.

Unfortunately the Manvers Collection does not have the correspondence received by the Estate in the first quarter of the period we have studied, so our only picture for that time is drawn from their outgoing letters.

The Clerk of Works is a Mr Hill and two bricklayers are mentioned by name. We read that Mr J Mee, bricklayer, will possibly be leaving his cottage at Laxton in a letter of 8th June 1909 when B Moody is asked if he would like refusal of it. By 2nd September the same year S Sampson is asked if his son wants the cottage 'lately occupied by J Mee at Laxton.' Prior to this bricklayers are referred to by either their name or role, but not both in the same letter.

The first mention of a bricklayer in our period is in July 1903 when the school drains are the subject of the correspondence with Rev. Collinson, whom Mr Wordsworth addresses as 'My Dear Collinson'. He concludes the letter with the first reference we have to the 'new church gates', which become cause of much correspondence for a considerable time, and which will feature in another edition.

Mr Barnes was in demand for work on the church in 1915. On 16th June Mr Argles tells Rev. Collinson *Barnes can certainly do church roof as you propose and I will send slates and copper strap as requested.*'

In a further note about this work, we get an insight into the expectations for delivery of correspondence. Mr Argles writes again to Rev. Collinson 'Many thanks for your letter received his morning. I am glad to hear that Barnes can cut the slates at Laxton Church and make them satisfactory. You shall have an account at the end of the month.

Owing to the stupidity of a messenger, I find that a letter which I wrote to you on Saturday morning was not delivered at Laxton the same day, and the same messenger neglected to post it till Monday evening. I much regret this.'



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Most of the correspondence regarding works seems to date from the war years, when the bricklayer himself was the subject of much of it. Mrs Bagshaw required work done in 1915, when Mr Argles wrote 'Referring to my call at your house a few days ago. I will endeavour to arrange something with you as soon as possible about moving the kitchen range from the front kitchen. When the days are short, and the weather bad. I want some indoor work for the bricklayers, and perhaps it can be done then. At present there is great pressure of outside work and shortage of men owing to the war.'

Matters could have become worse when Barnes was passed fit for service. The Estate felt forced to intervene and Mr Spink wrote to the Officer Commanding 45th Recruiting Area, Derby: 'I am desired by Lord Manvers to communicate with you with reference to a bricklaver named Barnes, W3291 Class C.11. No 4648.

I understand this man has now been passed as medically fit. As he is the only bricklayer able to attend to work necessary over a wide area, comprising the villages of Laxton, Kneesall, Kersall, Eakring,

Fledborough and Weston, can you release him or will an appeal have to be made to the Southwell Tribunal for the purpose of asking for his exemption?'

He then writes to Capt. J Murray, the Recruiting Officer at Retford on the subject: 'Barnes, our bricklaver, of Laxton has been to see me this morning re your circular inviting him to offer himself for work of National importance. I understand this man has been passed fit for work. Class C.

I was instructed by Lord Manvers to write to Derby asking if he could be retained in his present occupation, and was informed that as the man had not been called up I had better appeal to the Southwell Tribunal. The appeal has not yet been heard.

I am sure you will understand how necessary it is to retain this man as a bricklayer, when it is next to impossible to get small repairs done in the country by tradesmen living so far away. Barnes is responsible for really all roof and other repairs to farm houses, granaries, stables, cottages and other premises covering a wide area belonging to his Lordship.

Lord Manvers is anxious that every man that can be spared should join up, and more than half his staff have already gone. Would you kindly tell me whether Barnes has any option in this matter?'

It is a further nine months before the matter is resolved and Mr Spink writes to Barnes in June 1917 'I enclose certificate of exemption which you should sign and put in safe keeping. It will be required by the local Tribunal when it ceases to

be in force.'

A Look Behind the Archive Doors.

This month's look into the Manvers Collection at the University of Nottingham's manuscripts and Special Collections looks at the village's bricklayers. The correspondence is only catalogued at the folder or book level, with no alternative but to look at every page to find anything relevant to Laxton. Literally thousands of documents have been found and copied, providing far more information than our booklet authors are able to use in the size of volume we are producing. 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The February meeting started with the presentation from our speaker, Kath Hobart, one of the founders of the Tuxford Mine of Information. She gave us a

history of how the organisation came into being from an original idea in 1995 to the organisation we know today.

The idea was born from the difficulties of local miners put out of work wit the closure of the mines. Some who were non drivers, were having difficulty getting to Worksop or Newark to find the information and help they needed.

At the outset there were three people involved and they rented premises and involved the police and welfare rights services. They soon also involved North Notts College to provide training opportunities. They brought in computers and trained people to use the then new technologies of the Internet and email.

When the A1 was built through the middle of Tuxford, it created an artificial divide whereby the two halves either side of it did not know what was going on in the other. From this was born the Tuxfordian, the newsletter for Tuxford and surrounding villages, which is now 18 years old. Our magazine, 'Open Field' was established long before this and liaises with them over items of interest to readers.

After a while the Mine moved into the old Nat West Bank in Tuxford when the efforts of residents to save it finally failed. They were offered the premises rent free until the bank decided to sell at auction. This occurred as the Board were going through the process of trying to get funding to buy the premises and caused considerable stress as the Board members tried to raise the money quickly. Eventually they were successful, bidding by phone for the property and securing it for just less than their maximum of £45,000. Bassetlaw Council were persuaded to give them the deposit of £4,500 which made it possible to proceed with the purchase. They were lucky to be allowed two months rather than the normal one month.

Kath stood back from the management when funds were secured to employ some staff as she wanted to apply for the centre manager's job. There was an independent interview process and Kath was appointed to the post.

The services and staff expanded, with eight employees at the maximum. Much time was spent in bureaucracy monitoring usage for the funders and to justify future applications, preparing applications developing new services and mangling the premises. They discovered that it is easy to get start up funding, but very much more difficult to get

funding to keep going. Staffing and projects have had to be adjusted as sources of funding have diminished and changed.

Kath explained that they are able to help people with renewing driving licences and passports as well as securing blue badges. This they do by means of video conferencing with Worksop so that the applicant can speak to the right person without the need to travel and can ensue their forms are correctly completed. This service was introduced very early on and was innovative.

They run the Forget Me Nots twice weekly for people with memory issues. This involves collecting and returning the members, trying to retain consistent contact so that members are familiar with their driver.

They have a new initiative called the Tuxford Friends Network which is bringing people together to set up their own groups to share their skills and interests such as floristry and sewing.

They have taken over Dial-a-Trip which provides essential car journeys for people without transport by linking them with volunteers who use their own cars. This service earns some money by providing contract services for children with special needs and after school clubs. Their volunteers do the driving for these trips and also one off journeys as the need arises. There is a charge for this service to individuals to enable them to meet the drivers' expenses. Some journeys are long and may involve long periods of daily trips to hospitals for people undergoing radiotherapy. For these users they subsidise the mileage rate to help people cover the considerable cost of so many long trips.

The Mine of Information always welcomes new volunteers and is there to provide help to people in Laxton and Moorhouse who may need it. As Kath said - just ask.

Following this fascinating insight into a service we are fortunate to have on our doorstep Brenda went through the business. We welcomed Jeanette Tate as our newest member. As always there was a wealth of opportunities on offer. Members could learn pottery, make friends with their sewing machines, go clay pigeon shooting (Joyce thought she might learn how to shoot her sewing machine, which is not quite the idea), join our teams for the county and village hall quizzes, choose their menu for our party or sign up to go to East Markham's party among others.

Members agreed to organise an event, probably an afternoon tea, to celebrate the 90th birthday of HM the Queen. This will be held on 18th June and details will be agreed next month.

Next month's meeting takes place on Weds. 9th March, when Lesley Bensley will be telling us 'The Oxo Story'. The competition will be for a piece of memorabilia - Oxo related or otherwise. Everyone is welcome.

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Local people invited to take part in research project led by Citizens Advice

With recent suggested changes to Tax Credits and changes to Universal Credit making the headlines, Sherwood and Newark Citizens Advice are researching the potential impact that changes might have on working families in the local area.

The research aims to find out how welfare reform might affect the incomes of working people. Local people are being invited to fill in a short survey to help Citizens Advice carry out the research.

The survey will consider factors such as employment, age and childcare costs. Participants will be asked how they might cope with a £100 reduction in income and how this might affect household spending, debt/borrowing and employment. There will also be an opportunity to take part in an in-depth interview for anyone who wishes to provide Citizens Advice with more information.

Health Matters - Styes

This month we look at a very common but painful condition – Styes. This is a condition that affects the eyelid, and can usually be managed at home without medical intervention. We will outline what it is and how it can be treated.

What is a Stye?

A stye (or hordeolum to give it its proper medical name) is an infection in the eyelid – there are two types.

- External stye is the commonest this is an infection in the root (or follicle) of an eyelash. It often starts out as a small tender red lump, but can become larger and more yellow if it fills with pus.
- Internal stye (or meibomian stye) is an infection of the meibomian gland on the part of the eyelid that is in contact with the eyeball – this causes the eyelid to feel like it has a small lump within in.

Styes often develop quickly over a few days and are usually unilateral affecting one eye.

What causes Styes?

Styes usually occur for no apparent reason, and the bacteria that usually affects them is one that is often found on healthy skin – Staphylococcus aureus. Styes can be more common in people with blepharitis, a chronic inflammatory condition of the eyelid.

What is the treatment for Styes?

- No treatment often styes will resolve on their own within a week or two. Once a yellow head forms, the majority will burst within 3-4 days and the pus released drains away without consequence
- Hot compresses ringing out a clean hot flannel and pressing it against the eyelid can ease the soreness and draw the pus to a head. This can be done for 5-10minutes, four times a day
- Plucking out the offending eyelash (external stye only) this will be uncomfortable at the time, but will allow the hair follicle to drain more freely.

Incision & drainage – if a stye persists then a medical professional can open up the stve aseptically so that the pus can drain freely

ANTIBIOTIC OINTMENTS OR DROPS ARE NOT RECOMMENDED FOR THE TREATMENT OF SIMPLE STYES

How can the chance of infection spreading be reduced?

Do not share flannels or towels with anyone if you have a stye Always wash your hands after touching the affected eyelid

Are there any complications of styes?

Most styes will resolve without treatment or long term problems, and do not affect vision.

A chronic stye can turn into a cyst called a chalazion – a non tender lump on the eyelid – this may require surgical removal. Very occasionally the infection may spread to the surface of the eye causing conjunctivitis (red or pink inflammation of the white of the eye). This may require antibiotic drops or ointment. Very rarely (fortunately) the whole eyelid can become swollen, making it difficult to open the eye you should seek prompt medical attention should this happen as it may have developed into orbital cellulitis, a condition that usually requires hospital admission and intravenous antibiotics.
