Letter From Revd. Zoe

Dear friends

2020 marks the 10th year of me being an ordained minister and therefore I am eligible for a sabbatical. On Monday 10th Feb I began my sabbatical leave. Sabbatical leave means I am away from my work desk, released from my parochial/congregational responsibilities for 6 weeks leading up to Easter. The remainder of my sabbatical shall resume after Easter. Sabbatical leave is in keeping with the Biblical principle of work and Sabbath rest. In the beginning when God's work of bringing the whole of creation into being was followed by rest – 'On the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done'.

Why take a sabbatical? To ensure the wellbeing and healthiness of ministers in roles and to offer a break from the incessant call upon their time and nonstop nature of ministry. Sabbaticals benefit not only the healthiness of the minister but the health of the wider Church and can significantly enhance the ministry of the whole people of the God. This resonates with our vision of 'Healthy people, Healthy Church, Healthy Communities'.

The benefits of sabbatical include time to be with God: to listen and not have to rush away; to reduce stress, to improve the mental, emotional, physical and spiritual wellbeing of the minister; to rebuild lifestyle habits affected negatively by the nonstop nature of ministry; sabbatical leave provides time to take stock, to re-invest in family life and help re-focus on priorities of Church and ministry.

The purpose of the sabbatical is rest, renewal and re-creation so that the minister can return to work refreshed and re-energised.

I return back to my responsibilities on Mon 23rd March and over the weeks leading up to Easter, I shall be in the schools celebrating their Easter services as well as journeying with our churches through Holy Week when we re-member the last week of Jesus' earthly life and then celebrating Easter Day which will be my last Sunday in our churches. In June I will be taking up new responsibilities as Vicar of Blidworth and Rainworth and Area Dean of Mansfield. Go well through March!

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
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At the end of February we will be holding a members' meeting at Janet's house in Timothy Road.

His self portrait from c. 1799 also appears along with his signature taken from his Will, in which he left many of his paintings to the nation.

You will still be able to use the paper £20 note until it is withdrawn from circulation. Six months' notice will be given of this date.



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Laxton Village Hall Opening Party



All of us who had worked so hard for the opening on February 8th awoke in trepidation; would it rain, would we have enough food, would we have enough room, would anyone at all come to see the hall?

The sky was grey and there was a cold wind blowing along the village street, but it at least wasn't raining as the Rattlejag Morris Dancers commandeered the road outside the hall and began to warm us up with their lively folk dances. Colourful and energetic they made the watchers forget the bitter wind as they nonchalantly danced their way around passing traffic. It was an excellent start to the proceedings.

As they finished, Colin Cree, a former pupil of the old school, rang the

old school bell to announce the start of the official proceedings. The bell has been beautifully restored by Stuart Rose.

We all gratefully moved into the warmth of the hall where Roger Cottee welcomed our guest speakers and Mick Manning thanked all who had been concerned with the refurbishment and the Opening Day.

Robert Jenrick MP spoke warmly of his affection for Laxton and complimented the Trustees on the success of the refurbishment. He and the Mayor of Ollerton, Councillor Donna Cumberlidge, cut the splendid cake which had been specially made for the occasion by Janet Cook and decorated by her daughter.



Hugh Matheson of Thoresby Estate, who officially opened the hall and commented on its attractive and welcoming atmosphere, had a special surprise for the village. He announced that only the day before at noon the contracts had been signed to enable Thoresby Estate to become the new owners



of the Laxton Estate. The completion date for the change of ownership is set for 25th March, Lady Day.

He gave an undertaking there and then that Thoresby intended to preserve the three field system in Laxton. This was met with enthusiastic applause, at last the weeks of uncertainty and anxiety about who would take over the estate were over. Laxton would return to its former owners.

Rather appropriately the announcement was made in the old school built in 1863 by Lord Manvers, Lord of the Manor of the Thoresby and Laxton estates.

Four pretty and super efficient little girls then presented bouquets to our invited guests Sylvia Michael from the District Council, Stella Herbert from Sherwood Forest Rotary Club, Cate Brimblecombe-Clark from the Lottery and Councillor Donna Cumberlidge. Councillor Mike Pringle, Rotarian Malcolm Bevan, Sir



John Starkey and our architect, Carl Andres were all presented with maps of Laxton's three field system.

A delicious lunch was then served by the WI and the Mothers Union, who made full use of the new kitchen and café area. The buffet was a perfect delight and all of those who baked and served the food are to be congratulated.



The afternoon fun began with the SteelGen steel band which set everyone's feet tapping to the Caribbean rhythms, which



brought sunshine into the hall and even tempted some to dance.

They were later joined by Tuxford Primary School choir and Majorettes who delightfully entertained their parents and villagers, and who helped to see off the remains of the rather wonderful buffet.

Finally, the steel band

brought our village party to a close. It had all been a great success with over two hundred folk

having visited our village hall. They had been given a real Laxton welcome, royally entertained and really well fed. We could not have asked for a better celebration of Laxton and all it stands for.

Laxton's Historic Open Field Farming System and Sale of the Laxton Estate

SUCCESS!!

It has finally been announced that Thoresby Estate is to be the new owner of The Laxton Estate. Hugh Matheson from the Thoresby Estate made the formal announcement during the celebrations of the official opening of the refurbished Village Hall on 8th February 2020

On the right is a copy of the letter from Thoresby confirming this announcement and confirming it will be completed on 25th March 2020.

Look What We Have Started!

The item below was sent in by Hugh Matheson of Thoresby who remembers enjoying Laxton History Group members' performance of the Laxton Mummers Play at the AGM and supper in 2019.

The longer article from the Society of Ploughmen's Spring 2020 edition refers to the 2019 British National Ploughing Championships. It reads:

"The village hall was being renovated, so we weren't sure where we could hold our social evening ... [the church and its ladies obliged] ... we were then treated to something rather different.

The Branston Players, a local amateur drama group put on a 'Plough Play' in the church. Plough Plays were performed by rough farm plough boys in the 19th century during the winter months when ploughing with horses was impossible due to frozen ground. They would put on a play in the local pubs and the houses of the aristocracy to earn a little money and food or drink.

Now the plough play we were treated to at Nocton took us quite by surprise. It consisted of seven people dressed up - some of the men dressed as women and some of the women dressed as men - it was hilarious and extremely entertaining."

It seems that where Laxton leads, others follow!

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Laxton WI



Our February meeting greeted the return of our President, Brenda, after her illness. We were delighted to have her back with us. Unfortunately, after thanking people for their cards gifts and good wishes, her first news was sad. Brenda announced that much loved member Rosemary Crothers had died a couple of days previously. Rosemary grew up in Laxton, the daughter of the village blacksmith, and was a lifelong friend of other members who had grown up here. She was a lovely lady and will be sadly missed by us all. Everyone will have a good memory of her kindness, patience, love of Laxton and WI and her contributions to craft and catering events. Brenda asked for a minute's silence in memory of Rosemary, who remained a committee member until Christmas 2019.

Brenda commented on the success of the Village Hall Opening Party the previous Saturday. WI had organised the catering, which had been another much appreciated effort. They were so busy that no one had a chance to estimate how many people were catered for, but it must have been a couple of hundred. Being WI this was carried out with good humour and efficiency and even some spare cakes at the end of it. Brenda thanked everyone who had helped by making food, serving teas, washing up or in whatever capacity. She reserved special thanks for Derek Storton, who was declared an honorary co-opted member as he had done sterling service collecting all the crockery and delivering it to the ladies washing up. His help was very much appreciated.

Brenda reported that we had received thanks from Mike Manning, Chair of the Village Hall Trustees, and that comments from the VIPs showed that they had also been impressed with our service.

Thoughts turned to the County Show in May. The competition theme is for 'The Roaring 20s', and it requires two craft items. Lesley discussed ideas which have been shared to date and showed members the idea she has for creating the background to our display.

The Spring Council Meeting will be in the Playhouse this year and Joyce has written our entry for the county Canada Cup competition, which was won last year by Lesley.

We have many preparations in hand at the present time with a team for the Village Hall Quiz, ideas needed for an outing on 10th June, our own party and invitations to several others at local WIs. Planning for our Fashion Show is moving up a gear now and final arrangements are being made. Members are reminded that Brenda or Lesley would like to receive items for the two raffle hampers, one to be food and one to be toiletries.



Kay Guliotta, the Education Officer for the Newark and Nottinghamshire Agricultural Society then spoke about the heritage and history of the Society and the County Show. She had the privilege of being the first speaker to be able to use the new screen at the Hall. It is not widely known that the Society, in common with all other county agricultural societies, is a charity. The

Society dates back 220 years, although the Newark Society merged with the Nottinghamshire Society when the latter was in danger of folding.

Societies were forming in times when children as young as 3 or 4 worked as bird scarers and gleaners. Employment was not guaranteed for labourers. Should a worker be unable to work through illness or injury, a harsh employer might dismiss them, turning them out of their home

Some agricultural labourers were hired at the hiring fairs. In 1762 there were 25 hiring fares in Nottinghamshire. A potential employer would examine those offering their services and question them about their dependents or any liability which would count against them as suitable employees.

The repeal of the Corn Laws, Enclosure and threshing machines all reduced demand for agricultural labourers. There were riots and dissent in the countryside. Workers moved to the city for higher wages.

Agricultural societies formed as charities to promote good practice and to support workers. The first formed in Salford in 1768. In the last three years 16 societies have been lost, largely due to the huge losses incurred in running County Shows. Big shows such as the East of England and the Royal Show, both of which have now ceased, were losing over £1 million a year. We learned, to our amusement, that the Notts society made a profit in 2001 - due to the show being cancelled! The facilities at the Showground are hired out to generate income to support the shows and work in the community.

Kay spoke about public disengagement with where their food comes from. She gave shocking examples of children thinking cheese grew on bushes and spaghetti on trees.

The Newark and Nottinghamshire society runs the County show, the Vintage Tractor Show and the Midlands Machinery Show and supports

smaller shows such as those at Flintham and Collingham. It awards grants of up to £500 to students of both agriculture and agricultural engineering, and it awards long service awards to people who have worked in agriculture.

They work with schools, giving out seeds, compost, tools etc. to encourage children to grow their own food stuffs. They are delighted when they can eat



their produce. Kay was shocked that the teachers had no idea how to grow tomatoes and she had first to teach them so they could teach the children.

One of Kay's roles is to get across that farming need not be dirty, smelly and poorly paid. There is a very high-tech aspect to agriculture these now. Drones can scan a field to gather data to be fed into a computer on board a machine to apply fertiliser. Robotics is an area of intense study. Robots can work in conditions where humans cannot. Lincoln University, we heard, aims to be a world leader in robotics for agriculture.

Sue judged our competition on the theme of garden birds. The winner was Ann with her carved wooden bird.

Next month we will be learning about crochet from Sally Richards, and the competition will be for an item of crochet. In April we will learn about the REACH Flower Pod scheme for people with learning difficulties from Jane Hufton

The meeting takes place in the Village Hall at 7.30pm on 11th March at 7.30pm and we are always pleased to see visitors or new members.



Group Oil Order

The spring order went in in mid February. Most people seemed to have been able to make their late autumn delivery last over this mild winter but it was clearly well timed because 25 people



The next order is due around the end of July / early August depending on how things look by then. Existing group members are invited to email if they feel they will need oil as this usually indicates that others may be in the same position and may prompt an order.

New members are always welcome as long as they can email or have someone to do so on their behalf. It is helpful if you register before an order is due to spread the effort around order time. To register you should provide mobile and land line numbers, email(s) and full postal address plus any special instructions e.g. guard dogs, gates with locks, difficult access etc.

If you would like to order oil, you should provide your details or update what we hold about you and also specify a number of litres. 500 litres is the minimum order. Suppliers will not 'fill the tank'. If in doubt, and you really do want it full to the top, you should overestimate slightly and they will charge you for what your tank takes.

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The Families Who Left 2 - The Harphams

The first information I have of the Harphams is in 1632, the birth of William to John Harpham. In 1671 John Harpham of Moorhouse left a will, naming as beneficiaries his wife, his sons, William and John, and his daughter, Mary.

There are various mentions of the family over the years in Moorhouse the last being in 1901, when William Harpham died. He had tenanted Church Farm for some 50 years, but what happened to his family?

His eldest son, William, lived at home until his father's death and then went to live in Norwell. He had become a Tenantright Valuer and later a Land Agent. When he died my uncle went to the sale and bought a few of his effects which referred back to Church Farm, including the photo shown here.



The second son, John, became an apprentice chemist and druggist in Newark, a chemist's assistant and then a chemical manufacturer and pharmaceutical chemist in various parts of London. His wife, from Fledborough, was a teacher and later became Head of a private school. Even forty or fifty years later local friends or relatives were visiting them in London.

Seemingly neither William nor John had a family and Charles, William's youngest son, died as a toddler. His daughter, Elizabeth, was

unmarried, having kept house for her widowed father.

There remained just his daughter, Sarah, to carry on the genes. She became a governess and then in 1881, she married doctor and surgeon, William White, from Copthorne and went to live near Manchester. She did have children; a daughter, one son who became a doctor and two sons who became lawyers.

After some three hundred years those Harphams connected with Moorhouse had gone! Or so I thought!

John Harpham was born in Moorhouse in 1831. By the early 1850s he had become a carpenter and joiner in Chelsea with a wife, Emma, born in Piccadilly. They had eight children born in the London area, six girls and two boys, George and John. In 1911 the family was living in the Southfields area of Wandsworth. John and Emma had been married 56 years.

But then there was Fanny Harpham born in 1826. I found a book in the cupboard under the stairs at Church Farm in 1950, a Sunday School present Fanny had been awarded in 1840; left there by succeeding tenants for 110 years.

Fanny married and had a daughter Maria in 1854. She died in 1900 aged 76 rears. Maria died in 1934 aged 80 years, seemingly having lived at what is now 'The Holdings' for all her life. Violet Saxelby went to 'lay her out', as was the custom of neighbours in those days if there were no immediate relations nearby. I went with her. On her return her young son, Noel, asked 'Have you trussed her up, mam?" At three years old, his only experience of death was of his mother trussing chickens.

The last of the Harphams from here! Unless you know differently?
