Letter From Revd. Zoe

Dear friends

Writing this letter as the clocks go forward and the daylight hours change and time seems different. Yet despite the lengthening day, do you find that there still doesn't seem to be enough hours in the day? Are you a person who is constantly 'clock watching' - checking the time so that you are not late for the next event in your diary? Do you

find when you are doing something that you really enjoy, time ticks away really fast – 'time flies when you are having fun' as the saying goes! Of course there is the opposite of this; time seems to drag when you are not enjoying yourself! What a strange concept time seems to be. I suppose it



depends how we understand time and the nature of time itself.

Unlike us, the Ancient Greeks had 2 words for the word time: *Chronos* and *Kairos*. In the Western world we are predominately the inheritors of chronos time which is understood as 'sequential time': seconds, minutes, hours, days, months, years, for instance, a '9-5' job or the 'school day'. Chronos time speaks about the ordering of the world, we might say - the sun rises and then it sets. Chronos time is time passing from the present to the future and so becoming the past. It can be measured and defined by quantity.

Kairos time is understood more as 'the moment' and often defines a significant moment when time appears to stand still (suspended time) and you find yourself totally immersed or deeply engrossed in whatever it is you are doing. This understanding of time is immeasurable, can only be experienced. In this sense it is described as quality time. What would you call 'Kairos moments' in your life?

The Bible says in the book of Ecclesiastes that there is a 'time for everything under heaven'. God is beyond time yet experienced within it. In Kairos, we are invited to become what we are called to be as human beings, co-creators with God, experiencing the wonder of creation. The reality is that we live in both time frames – Kairos leaves us refreshed and renewed, perhaps for many it would be fair to say that Chronos leaves us stressed! I wonder how we might take more kairos moments in our days over this coming month?

Laxton History Group

March Meeting

Our speaker, David Mooney, busked outside for the early arrivals to introduce his talk on the history of busking. He also described how his own interest in busking from casual fun to his sole occupation. He likes to busk with a jigging doll which he made himself and which he demonstrated for us.

He drew attention to the way cute animal characters are portrayed as humans in a fairly consistent way by society. Hedgehogs are cute and kind, weasels are sneaky and generally not nice. He used an example of a weasel busker seen as disreputable and associated with gypsies.

Little of the history is written as buskers were looked down upon by the educated folk who might have written it.

A busker performs or offers a 'service' for money and so is distinguished from a beggar who simply solicits money. The 'B' word is offensive to genuine buskers.

David concluded with an amusing tale of a gentleman who had watched him busk then followed him to a record store where he asked the staff to play a particular track. To his amazement David discovered that he had been included in a hit recording as 'Unknown Street Musician'.

In recent times attitudes to busking have mellowed. There are incidents of, mostly foreign, buskers using menacing behaviour towards the public and fellow performers.

Michael Wood Award

The display of work produced by the children at Kneesall School was truly impressive when members went along to have a look at their display and talk to the young researchers about their projects. There is no doubt that they take it seriously and put in tremendous effort. We now have the headache of working out which items we will be able to display at Mansfield, despite begging an additional display area from the organisers.

5th June, 9 and 10am is scheduled for the presentation of gifts and certificates.

We received a call out of the blue from Tuxford Primary School in early April asking if we 'do anything with schools'. This was doubly unexpected as we had not been in touch with them since they declined an invitation to take part when we first started the project.

Roger and Joan went to see the teacher who enquired and the result is a mini project with them as a pilot, which could be expanded in future. They plan to do this over three weeks and they will present their work on the same date as Kneesall. Members are invited to attend Tuxford Primary School to see what they have produced. The time will be announced in due course.

It is encouraging to think that another local school is showing an interest in their local history. Members are encouraged to attend both events.

We will be taking examples of the work the children produce to display at the Great Nottinghamshire Local History Fair in Mansfield on Sunday 12th May. Everyone is welcome to attend this free event which includes talks and entertainment as well as a large number of stalls from groups across the county. It is open 11am - 3pm.

AGM and Mummers' Play

The AGM was held at Egmanton, but we were still able to entertain a full hall with a tasty supper to sustain them through the business. We are blessed with a willing selection of cooks who prepared cottage / fish pie for everyone followed by fruit pie or crumble.

The business did not detain us long. John Chambers gave his review of the year and thanked everyone for their efforts and support over the year. We were particularly pleased to be joined by Hugh Matheson from the Thoresby Estate and our Hon. President Prof. John Beckett, both with their wives. We appreciated them all giving up their time to join us, and their good humour during the entertainment.

Our meeting was rather different this year with the usual historical supper replaced with historical entertainment, thanks to Joan's efforts 'enlisting' a cast of 'volunteer' actors to perform the script of the Laxton Mummers play in the Archives in Nottingham.

Historically it was played by men, who would have been farm hands, and in the style of a pantomime. The initially reluctant cast threw themselves into rehearsals with gusto and took Joan at her word that



they would get laughs regardless, so they might as well play for them. Some costume purchases completed the preparations, though Joan was still learning her lines on the night after her players, who had been told they could read, all decided to learn theirs.

It is fair to say that the play is unlike anything we have had to entertain



us before. It really had to be seen to be appreciated. The characters included Beelzebub, King George, and a 'pretty young maiden' as well as a farm hand who rose from the presumed dead. Many thanks to Graham Laughton for providing musical





accompaniment and particular thanks to an initially reluctant Roy Hennell who was persuaded not only to perform, but to do so on his birthday. He received a chorus of 'Happy Birthday' to mark the day.

Our planned visit to Leicester has been cancelled as it clashed with holidays and other commitments for too many members. As a consequence, we have decided to hold a film night with some of the historic films of Laxton from our archive. This will take place on our usual meeting date of 15th May at 7.30pm in

Egmanton Village Hall. As always, everyone is welcome to attend.

On Tuesday October 15th, wrongly given as 12th last month, we will be going to Oxford for the day. The Mark Pierce 1635 map of Laxton will be featured in an exhibition of historical maps.



This is a rare opportunity to see this wonderful document on public display and it will be alongside amazing survivals of very early maps.

We are currently deciding if we should go by minibus or hire a coach. At present we have enough to fill a minibus and will only hire a larger vehicle if we get a significant number of additional names.

Please will anyone, members or non members, who would like to see the exhibition, or simply take advantage of a bus trip to this lovely city let Jean know of their interest so we can choose our transport wisely.

Our May meeting will be a chance to see a selection of films, so do join us in Egmanton Village Hall on 15th May at 7.30pm.

GDPR

Brenda speedily dispatched the evening's business, including reports of our annual party, and had positive noises coming from our fellow WI guests. At the Spring Council Meeting in Nottingham we were presented with the Canada Cup; awarded for an amusing poem on 'GDPR'. Some challenge and we Lesley congratulate on writing our entry.

The morning speaker, Chris Yasper, enthralled and fascinated us with his involvement in the Marathon des Sables. This gruelling 6 day running event, in one of the most inhospitable and barren parts of the world, is all done for charitable causes with multi national contestants.



Film footage moved, delighted and at times horrified the audience. There were few dry eyes. The word inspirational was on everyone's lips.

In the afternoon Johnathan Moseley entertained with wit, charm and expertise as he fashioned glorious flower arrangements. Many stories, gardening tips and recollections were shared as he worked. The

time sped by. The arrangements were raffled at the close of the proceedings and the winners must have been somewhat perplexed at how to get them home - hopefully not by tram!

Our own April speaker was Sue Floyd whose talk entitled 'Don't ask the price - it's a penny' charted the development of Marks & Spencer's from

its humble beginnings. Michael Marks who came here from Russia in 1863 aged 19 fleeing persecution of the Jewish people. Speaking very little English, he joined the large Jewish community in Leeds. When he arrived, the brother he had planned to join had joined the Gold Rush. He sought the advice of a prominent businessman who also gave him a loan, which he used to buy goods to sell. To cope with his limited English he displayed a sign saying 'Don't ask the price - it's a penny.'

He thrived and business expanded to market stalls in five towns. After one of his staff died of pneumonia he abandoned outdoor markets in favour of indoor penny arcades affording better protection to workers. He soon developed a reputation as a caring employer.

Married with five children he moved to Manchester. His original backer declined to back further expansion, but introduced him to Tom Spencer who quickly became an enthusiastic partner. Marks & Spencer was born.

They moved into 'Penny Bazaars' where produce was on view and could be handled. Weekend entertainment encouraged families to go along to enjoy the shopping experience. Business flourished and spread.

Tom Spencer died aged 53 followed by Marks 2 years later, neither leaving a son old enough to take over. Trustees managed the business until Simon Marks reached his majority. He had inherited his father's business skills and returned from checking out Woolworth's in America to change the M&S motto to '5/- nothing more.'

The company became a major innovator, developing new fabrics and designs and expanding the range of their merchandise. The Headquarters moved to London in 1926.

In the 1930s, notably pre NHS, Flora Solomon was made head of M&S' revolutionary welfare scheme, providing health schemes, dentistry, holidays, cosmetic help, and social support for all staff. It became THE place to work. Efforts to develop and source new materials lead to the St Michael brand in honour of Simon's father.

The decline of the High Street is the firm's latest challenge. They are changing their focus with food stores are a dominant feature.

Brenda thanked Sue for a fascinating talk. General conversation continued for some time. It seems Marks & Spencer's has been ingrained in us all.

Sue judged our competition, for 'A Recollection of M&S. Lesley won Lesley with Joyce second and Sandra third.

May sees our annual discussion of the Resolutions to be taken to the National Federation AGM in Bournemouth, where Sally will represent us. This will be followed by a light supper. Everyone is welcome. Please note that we will still be meeting in Egmanton.

Laxton & Norwell: An Open and Closed Case

This was the title given to the May meeting at Norwell hosted by their Parish Heritage Group. They had been kind enough to invite Laxton History Group members to join them for an interesting discussion between their own chairman, Prof. Michael Jones, and Laxton's Hon. President Prof John Beckett.

The two villages are only a handful of miles apart, but have had a very different history over the last 300 years or so. Most people know that Laxton is famed for it's open field strip farming system with the only example of a working Court Leet. The estate was under the ownership of a diverse group of people for a long time and the inability of the major landowners to acquire sufficient land to press forward with enclosure was a major factor in it not happening.

From the 1800s, which is regarded as late enclosure, the majority of enclosure happened by Act of Parliament. When, eventually, sufficient land had been exchanged and acquired by the Earls Manvers to consider implementing enclosure, they were heavily committed in the building of Thoresby Hall and the cost was prohibitive. As a result Laxton adapted through the agricultural depression which followed in the mid 1800s, when smaller farming units became popular again. There was substantial rebuilding in brick in the village to provide decent housing for tenants to encourage them to want to work Thoresby land. In the early 1900s the open fields were substantially reorganised with the acreage in strips and the size of those strips being changed to suit the times. Some enclosure had happened by 1635 as seen on the familiar map, and now more land was fenced into fields. The Court Leet continued to manage the open fields, leading to the adapted version of the medieval system we have today.

Norwell was owned by the church for some 800 years until 1952. This might seem to make for a simpler system, but in fact the estate, which is of similar size to Laxton, was divided into three prebendaries. This meant that there were three courts leet and three sets of officers to manage the system and community. Being at some distance from their ecclesiastical owners, they were largely left to manage themselves and they worked a very similar system of strips to Laxton until the 1800s.

There were no gentry living in Norwell. Two families tried to claim nobility, but when this was tested, both were found wanting. Notably they undertook none of the roles normally occupied by gentry. The housing stock was generally poorer than in Laxton and as a result examples of timber framed houses survive. Latterly they have been clad in brick, but the original timbers still exit within. There are no similar examples in Laxton.

The enclosure Act for Norwell was passed in 1826. Enclosure was also happening locally at this time (Egmanton's Act was passed in 1821). Although lands were exchanged after this, the three part system continued. By the end of WWII there were more small farms in Norwell than in Laxton at a similar time.

The meeting concluded with a discussion with the audience. It was an interesting opportunity to learn more about our neighbours and it was generally agreed that it would be good to do more together. We have booked James Wright, the county expert on castles, to speak to us about medieval castles in March 2010 and Norwell will be joining us in Laxton for this event.

Laxton on Notts TV

We reported last month that the students from Brackenhurst had visited with Notts TV to film in Laxton. We have now received the following information by email from Chris Breese, the producer of the film.

'Firstly to say the new series starts this coming Tuesday (9th April)at 8pm. We kick off with a fascinating look inside a cave system called Rouse's Sandmine, hidden below Nottingham city centre.

The show you contributed to has been titled 'Hidden Castles of Nottinghamshire'. We are at the stage where a 'rough cut' is close to being finalised, laying down the time line and narrative. The visual effects are also progressing well and will be added to this over the next few weeks.

The episode now has a firm air date/time of Tuesday, May 14 at 8pm.'

The broadcast occurs on Freeview Channel 7. Unfortunately some local transmitters received in Laxton seem to receive different broadcasts on the channel. You can, however, find the programmes on the NottsTV web site after the original broadcast. We understand that, with input from James Wright, mentioned above, they hope to include a digital recreation of what the castle may have looked like.

Scrapping section 21 "no-fault" evictions in the private rented sector.

Citizens Advice has responded to the government's announcement that it will consult on scrapping section 21 "no-fault" evictions in the private rented sector.

Gillian Guy, Chief Executive of Citizens Advice, said:

"Scrapping no-fault evictions is a groundbreaking shake-up of the private rented sector and will better protect the almost 5 million households who live in it.

"It means renters - including families - will be able to put down stable roots where they live and prevent landlords from evicting tenants for simply complaining."

Background

Citizens Advice helped nearly 200,000 people with housing problems last year - almost 60,000 of those in the private-rented sector.

Our research found more than 2 in 5 tenants say fear of eviction prevents them talking to their landlord about disrepair.

Tenants who made a formal complaint to either their local authority or to a redress scheme had a 46% chance of being issued with a section 21 eviction notice in the following 6 months, our research from March 2018 found.

We found revenge evictions have affected 141,000 tenants since laws attempting to ban revenge evictions were introduced in 2015.

Nearly half of tenants (44%) who experienced delays in getting repairs done by their landlord said fear of eviction would stop them from continuing to negotiate about the disrepair.

There are 1.7 million families with dependent children renting privately, according to the English Housing Survey.

The central feature of the day is the crowning of the new May Queen, Lucy Hollingworth. Retiring Queen, Isabel Leatt and her retinue will gather with Lucy and her retinue at the church then process down beside the Red
