Letter From Revd. Anna

Rev Anna writes...

Well, it comes as rather a surprise to us all that after two and half years serving this group of churches as the Growing Disciples Priest my time here is coming to an end.

My work began in earnest in January 2017 as I tried to meet with each serving Church Warden to find out about each church and each community; a group of twelve different communities felt quite daunting as I knew each would be different even though we shared our common faith.

It has been interesting, joy filled and not without challenge as I tried to build relationships across the group of villages, at times we have not met each other's expectations which led to tension and fear, at other times we have had beautiful and profound spiritual moments and at others we've had an absolute hoot as we've laughed together.

I have learned so much about ordained ministry, about leading people and myself as we've navigated the large number of team members and large number of parishes.

On the whole my ministry here has been a series of experiments, as I've sought to build up and encourage, to build "church" where there was previously nothing and to connect community events with our worshipping communities, some of these experiments have led to success, others have fizzled out after short time but I firmly believe that nothing is wasted in God's Kingdom, every conversation, every exasperated prayer, every bizarre creative experiment has been used by God.

Highlights would include working with Kneesall School, Walesby School and Bilsthorpe Flying High School. Its been wonderful to build relationships with the children and to help them explore their own faith; and my work in the community here in Bilsthorpe.

I've enjoyed being a member of the team, working with interesting and creative ministers, both lay and ordained, I am sad to be leaving the team and the friends I have made over the last couple of years.

So I'll finish with some final words of encouragement from John 7:37 On the last and greatest day of the festival, Jesus stood and said in a loud voice, "*Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink.*"

It is my prayer that our churches will be even greater places of hospitality and refreshment, places where ordinary people come to hear about, to pray to, and to be filled with the joy and peace of God.

What a Night!



Most people will know by now that our lovely old church was struck by lightning on the night of Tuesday 23rd July 2019. It was at 2.35am when we had a horrendous storm and lightning struck the church tower on the south side.

It hit the clock with a massive bolt and stripped the blue and gold paint off the face which is hard to believe. It didn't

touch the clock face on the west side. Both clocks stopped and we had no electricity. Luckily it had only tripped the electrics and once it was switched back on again both clocks started to go. Fortunately the lightning strike had done no damage to the mechanisms.

We have since had our lightning conductor tested by a professional and he has sent us his report. He has advised us to have the conductor fitted to all 8 of our pinnacles and our two clocks as a better precaution.

We are now awaiting an estimate for the cost of the work which needs to be carried out. As far as we can tell, no-one can remember anything like this happening before, but as our weather is now getting increasingly worse, we must take more precautions against the elements..

We are thankful to Sam Wortley, who witnessed what happened and for diligently keeping a watch on things and reporting it so quickly.



The stone mason will give you a squared piece of stone with dressed faces and edges, with chamfers if required, but a master stone carver is the master of his material and will provide your gargoyles in all their glory. He can insert repairs to pinnacles, provide roof bosses and, if you require a Queen Elizabeth head, he will carve an excellent likeness.

The Start of World War II

3rd Sept 1939, Church Farm, Moorhouse: Even as children we knew about Hitler and his 'invasions' and about Mr Chamberlain's ultimatum to Germany, so on this morning 80 years ago there was an air of expectancy about, a mixture of hope and fear, of what is happening, what is going to happen, what is it all about?

My father was called in from his work on the farm just before 11 o'clock and we, Mum, Dad, Ken, Noel and I, all sat down around the kitchen table. It was very quiet, we children awed by the expressions on our parents' faces as we waited in silence for 11.15 a.m. They had already lived through one world war, experienced the losses and somehow their fears, their forebodings were communicated to us.

I cannot express the sombre atmosphere as we watched their faces, whilst they listened to the announcement from the Prime Minister, Mr Chamberlain, that Germany had not pulled back from Poland and "consequently this country is now at war with Germany".

My father, grim faced, scraped back his chair loudly as he stood up, swore 'Blast it' and, without another word, went back to his work.

My mother shed a few tears and carried on preparing Sunday dinner. It must have been a momentous occasion. My mother, for the only time that I can remember, hadn't taken us to Sunday School in Laxton.

We children were left solemn and quiet, wondering what was going to happen next. Would we be bombed? Would the Germans come today? Would we be killed?

The church bell rang five times. And remained silent until the 8th May 1945.

Lesley then introduced our speaker for the evening Ged Hall - a very apt name as the hall was very much in our thoughts. He treated us to a woodland walk, unusually using slides, which he had taken in and around Whitwell Wood in Derbyshire. It is a place he knows well as he lives close by and visits the wood daily.

Ged is an accomplished photographer and he introduced himself explaining the letters after his name, all gained through his photography. The talk began with views of poppy fields both 40 years ago and today showing how the density of the flowers has declined.


Throughout the talk Ged gave pointers on how to take better photographs. His first tip was to think about turning the camera from the usual landscape orientation to portrait even to capture a view.

Many of the photos we saw were of wildlife and in particular birds. He is clearly an accomplished bird photographer and his shots were really beautiful. As he showed each photo he told us something about the habits or the habitat of the species and also discussed how certain species had fared better than others with the modern challenges of chemicals, sprays and loss of habitat.

We were interested to learn that we might see up to 1000 lapwings very near to Ollerton around Christmas or New Year. We also learned that the parent birds will split the brood and each go off with some of the chicks so that if they are predated some should survive.

Much of the timber in Whitwell wood is immature because much was cut down for the war effort in World War II. The wood is mostly deciduous with only small areas of conifers. It was originally designed for shooting purposes and is set out in a circle marked into quadrants with rides. We learned that this is the biggest woodland in Great Britain at 428 acres. It was probably news to most members that a wood greater than 500 acres is a forest.

One series of photos showed how a pond was put into the woods in 1989. The pond was triple lined and the lining went well up above the sides to help to capture all the rain which falls around. There was no convenient tap and hosepipe to fill this pond. A lot of water was needed to fill it when it was finished and the local Fire Brigade was



Flu Vaccinations

It is time to start thinking about booking in for your annual flu vaccination. As the older members of our community were told a couple of years ago '**You may not feel over 65, but your immune system is.**'

By the time you read this, some of the surgeries will have already had 'flu jab clinics'. You will need to make sure when you book whether your surgery is dividing the clinics along vaccine type lines or not.

Tuxford Surgery kindly sent us the following last month:

This season there will be 3 vaccines being given.

- One for patients over 65
- One for patients under 65
- Nasal spray vaccine for pre school and primary school children

Our over 65 vaccine is (supposedly) being delivered from 20 September.

However – our under 65 vaccine has been delayed and will now be delivered in 3 batches, starting w/c 07/10/2019

This may change – but currently we're thinking of flu clinics on;

- 01/10/2019 – Vaccinations for **over** 65s 1 - 6pm
- 02/10/2019 – Vaccinations for **over** 65s 1 - 6pm
- 15/10/2019 – Vaccinations for under 65's 4 - 7pm

As we've discovered in previous years – it's all subject to last minute delays and delivery problems.

With uncertain delivery dates, clinic dates are tentative – so please make sure your surgery has got up to date mobile phone numbers so that they can let you know as quickly and efficiently as possible if things change.

If you are registered with one of the other surgeries serving our community, e.g. at Sutton on Trent or Ollerton, please contact your surgery for details to see when they are offering vaccinations so that you can get yourself and your family booked in.

Dukeries Woodturning Society

Our demonstrator in August was Emma, the Tiny Turner. 38 members and visitors attended, including some fellow turners from Lincolnshire Wolds. It was a good night as we had Pat there with his wood working supplies and Steve Wright with a wide selection of wood for carving.



Emma began making a triangular box with a twist starting with a rectangular chunk of lime wood which she first turned roughly into a cylinder. She marked it up, explaining how to create the twist. Using the marks she had drawn, she reset the block into the lathe chuck off centre.

This is quite advanced work and causes the piece to wobble a lot when the lathe spins.

Emma explained how to shape each side of the piece to create the outside of the box. She then carved the surface to give it texture similar to that created with an adze. She explained that she does that before parting the top and bottom of the box so that it will match up afterwards.


Having hollowed out the centre, Emma coloured the outside black and, while it dried, showed some samples of gilding and spoke about the techniques you can use. She finally applied gilding to the inside of the box and a different type of gilding product to each of the faces of the box to demonstrate how they differ. It was an excellent and informative evening.

Minutes of the Meeting 23rd July 2019

NB Minutes unapproved, to be presented for approval on 24th September.

Present: Councillors:

M. Manning (Chair), S. Hill, R.Hennell, M.Hennell, J.Hill (from 7.55 pm)
J Godson, S,Rose

In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Millward (Clerk), S. Michael (District councillor), M. Pringle (County councillor), Inspector H Sutton

Members of the public (x2 plus 2 from 8.00 pm)

1. **Apologies for absence:** Mr J Hill was absent at the start of the meeting. Councillors consented to the absence.
2. **Declarations of interest:** The chair declared an interest as a member of the Laxton Visitor Centre and village hall committee in item 10 d (Donation), sports field committee in item 11 (Property matters – Sports field) and village hall committee in item 15 a (Village environment – Village hall refurbishment project).
There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
3. **Dispensations:** None required.
4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** Matters raised:
 - a. The cleaning of the twitchell. The clerk will write a letter of thanks to the resident responsible.
 - b. Concerns in relation to footpath route in the village that this remains an issue which councillors noted although they regretted that they have no powers in this regard.
5. **Open forum – Inspector Heather Sutton, Nottinghamshire Police:** The chair welcomed Inspector Sutton to the meeting who reported as follows in particular:
 - a. She is responsible for Southwell, Caunton and the surrounding villages in which overall crime has fallen by 10.5% between Aril 2018 and April 2019.
 - b. Burglary, a key focus because of the proximity of A1 and the area's isolated communities, has fallen by 16.7%. There have been a number of significant arrests. She reminded all residents of the importance of keeping their properties secure and remaining vigilant. The chair left the meeting at 7.45 pm during this part of Inspector Sutton's presentation.
 - c. Fuel theft on the A1 is in the top three priorities because of the

damage it causes to farmland.

- d. In the previous three months, there had been two calls for service in Laxton, one of which was a hoax, and one for Moorhouse in relation to a stranger. All residents were urged to contact 101 in relation to any concerns they may have.
- e. Officers are to receive large animal handling training better to support with escaped livestock
- f. Domestic violence in rural communities is also a focus.
- g. A specific example of a lack of response to a reported incident was given and discussed. Inspector Sutton will investigate and contact the individual. Mr J Hill joined the meeting during this part of Inspector Sutton's presentation
- h. Police methods of communicating with its wider community were discussed. Inspector Sutton emphasised the use of Nottinghamshire Police Facebook page in this regard and urged residents to use the facility. She also sought expressions of interest by individuals interested in joining the Nottinghamshire Key Individual Network to act a point of local contact in the event of incidents in the locality. . Two members of the public joined and the chair re-joined the meeting at 8 pm during this part of Inspector Sutton's presentation.
Inspector Sutton was thanked for her attendance and left the meeting at 8.10 pm.

6. **Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 7 May and 11 June 2019:** The minutes of the meetings held on 7 May and 11 June 2019 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair. **Matters arising:** All action points having been completed, being in hand or appearing elsewhere on the agenda, there were no matters arising. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Councillor Pringle:

- a. Updated councillors as to financial developments at NCC, including an £8 million overspend on children's services.
- b. Reported that A614 improvement consultation is underway.
- c. The local minerals plan will be published on 30 August 2019
- d. The village walk had highlighted a number of concerns.

Mr Pringle was asked to note rotten gateposts on a footpath across the dyke. The clerk will report to NCC formally through the online system once she has been provided with more detail of its location. Mrs Michael reported that NSDC is reviewing the Laxton conservation area the boundaries of which were fixed forty years ago. Any change would involve an extension of the area.

7. **Reports from councillors:** Reports of dangerous parking in Laxton at the junction of Green Lane and Main Street were raised and discussed at length. Standing orders were suspended to allow the public to address the meeting. The possibility of raising the matter with PCSO Crowhurst was raised.

Mr S Hill reported on the matters discussed at the recent SNG meeting including fuel theft and the consequent damage to land, other forms of theft and door to door salesman. The next meeting is on 24 October 2019. Mr S Hill volunteered to join the Nottinghamshire Key Individual Network for Moorhouse.

8. Financial Matters:

- a. **Financial position as at 30 June 2019:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 30 June 2019 (incorporating the 2019-20 budget figures).
- b. **Accounts for payment:** The council unanimously **approved** ten payments totalling £2447.83.
- c. **Removal of bank account signatory and appointment of new signatory:** Mr Brown no longer being a councillor, councillors **decided** to remove him as a signatory and appoint Mr Stuart Rose, the new councillor, in his place.
- d. **Donations:** The chair reported that the Laxton Visitor Centre had donated the proceeds of the clothing bank, £2651.50, and the bank itself to the council. On the advice of the clerk, having disclosed a pecuniary interest at LMPC/66/19 above, the chair withdrew from the meeting. Mr S Hill chaired the meeting in the chair's absence and suspended standing orders to allow the public to address the meeting. Councillors noted from a member of the public that the offer had been made because of forthcoming changes in the village and the council, unlike the Visitor Centre Trust, is a statutory community body. After extensive discussion of the circumstances of the donation and need for clarification of the implications of being responsible for the clothing bank, councillors **agreed** in principle to take responsibility for the clothing bin, but needed confirmation that there is no restriction or other obligation on how the clothing bin proceeds are spent or otherwise attached to the bin itself. The clerk will seek the confirmation and include the matter on the agenda for the September 2019 meeting for a formal decision.
- e. The chair returned to the meeting and was informed of the decision. The chair referred councillors to a request recently made from the Village Hall Committee for:
 - i. A donation in the sum of £400 towards the cost of replacement glazing in the hall kitchen
 - ii. A donation in the sum of £2300 towards the cost of providing a village cinema.

On the advice of the clerk, having disclosed a pecuniary interest at LMPC/66/19 above, the chair withdrew from the meeting. Mr S Hill chaired the meeting in the chair's absence and suspended standing orders to allow the public to address the meeting. The member of the public explained the cinema proposal and why the funding was needed.

Councillors discussed the request and **agreed** to consider both requests at the September meeting when more information could be made available and the matters be included as a specific agenda item.

The chair returned to the meeting and was informed of the decision.

9. **Property matters including sports field and rent request:** Nothing to report.

Citizens Advice Sherwood & Newark reveals Welfare Benefits was its top local issue last year, with 1,215 people turning to its advisers for help.
