The Great Field at Braunton, Devon

Have you been on holiday this year? We went to North Devon - don't ask about traffic on the M5! Naturally I went off in search of the Great Field in Braunton, which is the equivalent of Laxton in the south-west!

The great local historian W.G. Hoskins linked Braunton Great Field and Laxton together in his writings on the English landscape, complete with strips and appropriate farmsteads. It was clear from his work that as at Laxton, the number of strips had long been in decline: from 500 strips in 1820 to 172 in 1950 and 140 in 1975.

Going prepared was a good idea, because where was Braunton Great Field? Here I ran into difficulties. I went to the Tourist Information Office to seek help. A very pleasant lady showed me on a map where it was - roughly speaking. We drove to the edge of the field, only to discover that it is in corn (on the cob) and so the vegetation was well above my head!

Then we went off in search of the viewing point, named as such on OS map, and we could not find it. Not a sign in sight.

So that was it! By contrast, of course, Laxton is excellently presented to the wider world via its Visitors' Centre, walking routes around the fields, guidebook and excellent pub.

We are used to seeing the farmers carting their newly harvested trailers full of grain to the grain merchants in Weston. On average this is a one hour round trip, which over a good harvest

such as this could add up to 35 or 40 hours of driving back and forth.

To reduce the time this wastes, some people sell to other merchants who come to the farm to collect. The farmer simply has to load his grain onto their lorry. This year the routine phone call doesn't result in a lorry arriving next day, but more likely in several weeks' time and the grain has to be stored safely in the meantime! Another unforeseen impact of Covid and Brexit.

The 'Flu Jab Campaign

The 'flu jab has been another casualty of the transport difficulties caused by what one supplier has been quoted called "unforeseen challenges linked with road freight delays". The supplies of vaccines intended for GPs have been held up,



appointments have had to be cancelled and new dates can't be offered.

With the nation getting closer to normal life, we are having to learn to live with Covid-19 alongside other viruses. The Methodists united in 1932. In 1935, when Mrs Taylor, who lived in the house became too infirm to look after the chapel, my mother, Mrs Violet Saxelby, became the Steward and Sunday School teacher for 45 years. The Chapel then remained open for about 2 more years, after which it was sold and became part of the house.



Thanks to Janet Cooke for the following: This picture was taken in the Chapel at Laxton approx. late 1950s at a celebration of the chapel's anniversary, usually in May. It shows the 'Ladder of Life'. This was built rung by rung by the children, who had pieces to say and to place on the ladder. Mrs Saxelby had a different model built each year by Heathcote of Moorhouse. There were services on the Sunday afternoon and evening and again on the Monday evening. The chapel was always packed, with some people having to sit outside. Most of the congregation were entertained for tea at the Saxelby's at Moorhouse. Janet's family always had a house full as well. This was a *big* event in the life of the Methodist chapel in each village and was supported by neighbouring villages.

The Laxton Farming System




Periodically when there have been a number of new arrivals in the village and new subscribers to '@pen field', we describe the unique farming system in operation here. In the last 12 -18 months there have been many changes, so it seems like a good time to describe the system again.

Everyone will see the text on the village signs saying 'England's last open field village'. Laxton is world famous for the system which sees farmers working individual strips in the three open fields. Historically there were originally West, East, Mill and South fields, with West and East Field being worked together so that here there was a three field rotation system, just as it is now.

Commonly held misconceptions are that the strips are allocated by either the Court or the Jury and / or that each farm has 10 strips. Neither are true. The strips are owned by the Lord of the Manor and are worked by the tenant of each farm. The strips in their holding are set out in the tenancy agreement along with their enclosed fields and pass from tenant to tenant when the farm changes hands.

It is true that the number of strips has reduced from 2,280 in 1635 to the 164 we see today. In the mid to late 1800s six farms with their fields in a ring fence around them, including Brockilow, Copthorne, Knapeney and Westwood, were created from the furthest flung parts of the estate. The early years of the last century saw a major reorganisation of the fields and strips. East Field was enclosed, strips



were increased in size and areas of land close to the village were also enclosed at that time. This resulted in farmers being allocated an equivalent area of land. by the Lord of the Manor's Estate Agent, Mr Wordsworth. Their strips remain much the same now with only minor further changes having taken place. The three field crop rotation system calls for one field to lie in fallow for one year. This means no crops are grown on it, and in recent times this



has been managed with helping overwintering birds in mind. Now that chemical weed killers are used, the fallow field is not worked. Historically each strip might have been ploughed as much as six times to break up and kill the weeds.

After the season in fallow this field is prepared for a new crop of wheat, and will be referred to as 'the wheat field'. These days preparing the seed bed may involve ploughing or turning with discs (discing).

The new seed is then sown with a seed drill (drilling) and harrowed over to begin the new growing cycle. By the time you read this, Mill Field will be well on the way towards being drilled for the 2022 crop. The working and preparation of the previous wheat field, in 2021 West Field, will largely be later. It will grow the second year crop of wheat, barley, etc. as permitted under the Rules of the Open Fields.

What sets Laxton apart from all other areas where remnants of the great open field farming systems may remain is the management system comprising the Court Leet and the Jury or Homage. The permanent positions are the Bailiff (Robert Haigh), the Clerk to the Gaits & Commons (Stuart Rose) and the three field Foremen: Roy



Hennell (Mill Field), Johnny Godson (West Field) and Ivan Rayner (South Field). The remaining members of the Jury may change and are sworn in annually on Court Day.

On the last Thursday of November the Jury sets out from The Dovecote, currently in a tractor drawn trailer, to inspect the Wheat Field. They split into groups to look at

different areas and their duties include noting if farmers have ploughed too far or not far enough, whether rubbish has been left on the areas between the strips and the state of the watercourses. They knock in stakes where the strip boundaries meet the sykes (pronounced 'six'). These areas are too steep or too wet to plough and provide turning space for those working the fields. They have never been sprayed or cultivated and many are Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSIs). Farmers bid annually for the right to take one cut of hay from the grass which grows on the sykes at the 'Grass sales'.

The Foreman is informed of their findings by the inspection groups and compiles a list of transgressions on a 'Presentment Paper'. The Jury returns to The Dovecote for a traditional roast beef lunch, after which all the transgressions are discussed and fines are recommended for each. The Foreman notes the outcome on the Presentment Paper to be read out at Court the following week.

On the first Thursday in December the Court Leet meets. Since 1977 this is the last legally constituted manorial court in the country to retain its powers to determine legal proceedings and levy fines.

The Court business is managed by a steward appointed to the role. Currently this is Alistair Millar of Tallents Solicitors in Southwell. Anyone who is on the Manor Suit Roll, which for practical purposes means the Estate tenants, is required to attend and answer to their name. They are officially summoned by the Bailiff and If they do not attend, an essoign (similar to a fine) of 2p is charged against them. Once the Bailiff would go around and collect these payments, but nowadays Robert simply brings a bag of 2p coins and pays the 10p -14p average total himself!

The Bailiff has the job of finding the members of the Jury from those eligible for the coming year. Each Juror must swear a legally binding oath and kiss a bible as they are sworn in. The Foreman of the Wheat Field swears an individual oath on behalf of his fellows.

Health and Safety has had an impact and the old bible is freshly covered in brown paper each year. We shall have to see what Covid safe practice looks like ... Any Juror who is unable to attend on the day must visit Alistair at his office to be sworn in later.

The Presentment Paper is discussed and those subject to fines have the chance to appeal, or others may even do so on their behalf. On the conclusion of the official business there is a chance for discussion of any other business of mutual concern.

The Court is open to the public, but this has been difficult in past years because of space constraints in the Dovecote. This year it has been decided to move to the Village Hall. If you would like to attend on Thursday 2nd December, please call Robert Haigh on 07968 215777

desperate for ringers for the service and both stepped up to help out! On the left is a more modern photo of a team from the 1970s. Pictured here L-R are John Chambers, Thelma Staples, David Chambers, Joe Chambers who coached them, Bryan Burkitt and Janet Sayer (now Cooke).

There were formal competitions for experienced and skilled teams of bell ringers to enter, but a group of ladies who made tea for the North Notts bell ringing meetings felt there needed to be a competition for those who had yet to acquire the greater skills. Vaccine Passport Scams

Action Fraud has received over 700 reports about fake emails allegedly from the NHS. They claim to be able to provide people with a "digital passport" that "proves you have been vaccinated against COVID-19". These emails are fake, and the links within them lead to genuine-looking websites that steal your personal and financial information.

To protect yourself, remember, **the vaccine is free of charge**. The NHS will never ask you for your bank account, card details, PIN or banking passwords.

- The NHS will never arrive unannounced at your home to administer the vaccine.
- The NHS will never ask you to prove your identity by sending copies of personal documents such as your passport, driving licence, bills or pay slips.
- Your vaccination status can be obtained for free through the official NHS app, NHS website, or by calling the NHS on 119.

Vaccination Centre Closure

After delivering over 100,000 vaccine doses since opening its doors, the Vaccination Centre at Newark Showground closed on Friday 10th September.

As over 80% of all adults across the district have now had both doses of vaccine, the vaccination programme will be moving into a new phase which will see local pharmacies and GP surgeries taking more of a role.

The site at Newark Showground has been central to the vaccination programme in Newark and Sherwood. The Showground offered a way to help residents get their jabs without having to travel to Nottingham or Mansfield.

Recently there have been pop up clinics and the vaccination bus working alongside the Showground to achieve good rates of take up.

Anyone who has not had their first dose or is waiting for their second one can still 'Grab a Jab' at the other sites around the district. The vaccination bus will be visiting sites in Newark with no appointments needed. Boots in Newark, the Life Centre in Ollerton and the Riverside Church in Southwell will also be offering walk-in appointments for COVID-19 vaccines. The rules in the Highway Code are updated when there are changes in the law. New rules may be added while you are preparing for your practical test, or after you have passed.

There have been 15 changes since 2015 alone. That means it's really important to stay up to date, whether you've only had one lesson or held a licence for years.

The changes made as of today refer to guidance on smart motorways. A total of 33 existing rules will be amended and two new rules introduced, with a number of amendments made to the additional information annexes.

Hand Bell Ringing in Laxton

In addition to the bell ringers who rang the bells in Laxton church tower,

there was, for a period in the mid 1980s a very successful team of hand bell ringers.

At this time Frank Cooke, Janet's late husband, was the leader of the tower bell ringers and in the tower there was a box containing 12 hand bells. He and Janet discussed if they could be used, and so the hand bell ringers were formed.

They recruited girls from the village and taught them to ring. Mostly they each had two bells, but both Janet and Frank could manage two bells in each hand if necessary, striking each in a different direction to ring them singly.

The team travelled round and gave concerts. In that way they had great fun and made enough money to build up the collection of bells to an impressive 28. They are still in the village today. They developed a uniform and looked very smart when they went out to perform.

these performances. The performance would end with a rousing rendition of 'Land of Hope and Glory'. The two little girls hid behind the bigger ones during the playing then burst out waving the Union Jack when it came to the end.
