# The Proclamation of the Accession

Following the Proclamation of the Accession of King Charles III on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> September at Westminster Hall in London, the news was cascaded down throughout the country. On Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> September, it was the turn of towns and other settlements to announce the news. Locally this took place at 3pm outside Castle House, the headquarters of Newark and Sherwood District Council.

The ceremony was actually quite short in length. First of all, David Lloyd, Leader of the District Council, welcomed those present. He then handed over to Air Chief Marshal Sir Andrew Pulford GCB CBE, Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Nottinghamshire, who briefly reviewed the contribution Queen Elizabeth II had made over the record breaking 70 years of her reign through her dedication, service and duty. He then encouraged us all to look forward to the new age before us with King Charles 'at the helm'.

Following this short address, the Chairman of Newark and Sherwood District Council, Councillor Sue Saddington, read the official proclamation to those assembled, ending with the declaration 'God Save the King!' All present then sang the first verse of the National Anthem for the King, the first time that most present will have sung this version. The event ended with the Chairman calling for three cheers for His Majesty the King. The Union Jack outside Castle House, which had been raised for the Proclamation, was then lowered again to half-mast for the remainder of the national mourning period.

#### **Bells Ring for Proclamation**

Throughout the land, church bells have rung out at the news of the Proclamation of the Accession. In the villages, the instruction via the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers was that bells should be rung 'open' i.e. un-muffled in celebration of the Accession in as many towers as possible after the Proclamation had been given locally. This presented a challenge as these days locally there are less bell ringers than there are church towers with bells!

Laxton does not have a resident 'band' of ringers. Instead bell ringers from other towers come together to form a band to ring when needed. So it was that the bells of St Michael's rang out at about 4.45pm on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> September to celebrate King Charles' accession to the throne. The band consisted of six ringers from Mansfield, Retford, Ossington, Egmanton and Weston.

#### **The Proclamation**

"Whereas it has pleased almighty God to call to his mercy our late Sovereign lady, Queen Elizabeth II, of blessed and glorious memory, by whose decease the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland is solely and rightfully come to the Prince Charles Philip Arthur George.

"We, therefore, the lords spiritual and temporal of this realm, and members of the House of Commons, together with other members of Her Late Majesty's Privy Council, and representatives of the realms and territories, aldermen, and citizens of London and others, do now hereby, with one voice and consent of tongue and heart, publish and proclaim that the Prince Charles Philip Arthur George, is now, by the death of our late Sovereign of happy memory, become our only lawful and rightful liege lord, Charles III, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and of his other realms and territories, King, head of the Commonwealth, defender of the faith, to whom we do acknowledge all faith and obedience with humble affection, beseeching God, by whom kings and queens do reign, to bless His Majesty with long and happy years to reign over us. "Given at St. James' Palace this tenth day of September in the year of Our Lord twenty thousand and twenty-two.

"God Save The King."

**scrapped!** The leaflet shown here has been distributed, and the text is reproduced at the end of this article for ease of reading.

Please note that although it says "coming soon", the new scheme started on 31/8/22. Unfortunately this was done with little time for consultation and discussion about it.

It is a pilot scheme so we will have to see how it works – essentially <u>there are no time-</u> <u>tables any more</u>, <u>all bus journeys are "on</u> <u>demand" via an app or a Nottingham</u>



**number.** At the moment the number is frequently busy and very few elderly people will be happy with or have access to the app.

If you do use, or try to use, the service please let us know about your experiences of it.

It's time to tear up the timetable and try a new more flexible way of travelling by bus!

"**Nottsbus On Demand** is a brand new, flexible, on demand bus service being trialled in your area. You can choose the time you would like to travel by booking your journey through an easy-to-use app, or by phone.

## A Personal Account of Attending HM The Queen's Lying in State

Jill and Ella Hoyland from Egmanton felt they just had to go down to London to pay their personal tributes to Her late Majesty. They were joined by two friends, travelling by train to Kings Cross and arriving around 8am. They took a taxi to and found their way to join the queue at 9.20am at Southwark Park. They heard there that



they would face a



14 hour period before they reached the royal coffin.

We have all seen the TV images of the queue snaking back and forth across

the park

before setting off into the back streets of London. It took Jill and Ella over 3 hours to leave the 'snake' in the park. Jill was struck by the number of very elderly people who were in the queue, and was upset to see one collapse when the ordeal became too much for them. Two people near her were 86!



Naturally the older generations wanted to pay their tributes to the Queen they had loved for a life time, and it was a pity they could not have been eased through the throng to make it more bearable for them.

Jill and Ella got to know those around them in the queue and said that, as they progressed, staying with these people who had shared their experience became more important. One was an elderly gentleman and another a tall, military gentleman wearing medals who was easy to spot when they had to make a quick dash out of the queue. He had been on a Thames river trip just four weeks previously and was able to recount details of the many sights which were new to them as they passed through the area near the river.

Food and toilets were something to be taken advantage of whenever possible. Jill spotted a Pizza Express which was able to provide her with a

massive pizza and a comfort break in the space of a few minutes. The pizza was shared with the friends, and with the old gentleman, who by then had finished all he had brought with him. He had never had pizza in his life so he would never forget his first taste.

Jill's group were fortunate to be passing the sights along the Embankment during daylight. They had excellent views of the redevelopment of the Canary Wharf area, and were struck by the architecture of the

Butler's Wharf conversion.

They passed 'The Clink', a notorious medieval prison with a rather gruesome metal skeleton on the side of the current museum building.

HMS Belfast, The Tower of London, Tower Bridge, the Golden Hind, the Covid Memorial Wall, St Thomas' Hospital and some of the iconic modern buildings of the capital could be glimpsed or were passed close by.

The party were struck by the atmosphere of kindness not only in the queue itself, but from the people in the places they passed. An office offering toilets for £1 got no takers, but The Globe Theatre welcomed people free of charge. It was a wonderful opportunity to see inside this landmark. Grateful users happily put money into their regular donation box and some, getting cold by now, bought their sweatshirts. A baker emerged with a big tray of doughnuts he hadn't sold before closing and shared them with the grateful queue.

A friend who had been the previous day had told them that the wait would be around 4 hours from Westminster Bridge. They had their wrist bands by then and scouts were giving out water, sweets, sandwiches and even silver foil blankets to those who needed them. Darkness was falling and the street scene changed.

Jill noticed that the policemen who were evident everywhere were from forces all over the country. No doubt all leave had been cancelled to staff this massive security effort.

At our monthly meeting in September we had Suzanne Plamping come to demonstrate to us.

Suzanne is a member of our County Board of Trustees and she chairs the Communications Team.





Suzanne is a very good craft demonstrator and came to show us how to do Indian block printing, which was very interesting.

She told us how she had combined a holiday in India with taking a course in printing, learning from people in their homes and factories. She learned about the different blocks and inks they used.

We were then shown a selection of her work on different cloths including linen and silk. She spoke about the blocks that she used which were all different patterns. Susan told us that the Indian printers like straight lines in their patterns and part of the skill was lining up the printing

blocks. Even trickier was the task of overlaying two or more further blocks of different colours to create complex patterns. The blocks the workers used were about 9 inches square.

And then it was our turn to have a go. We were all given a linen zipped pouch which we were asked to decorate. Suzanne is keen on







recycling and gave us a piece of paper torn from a waste book to practice on. Then we all picked some patterned blocks and inks. Luckily



for us the blocks each had an individual design or picture and they were small enough to fit easily into the hand.

We had plastic lids from various household products to use as palettes for our ink. There were stiff sponges which had to be dabbed into the ink to distribute it evenly before tapping it lightly onto the block and applying to the surface to be printed. That was the tricky bit!

We then tried to do it. To our surprise, once we had worked out what



the blocks would print and thought about how to place them, it wasn't as difficult as it seemed to create a simple print.

We really had some lovely patterns on our finished

articles, to say it was our first attempt. It looked as if it was a children's classroom at one time with all the paints and things all over, and everyone enjoyed it.

Our next meeting, on October 12, will be our 60th anniversary. We have decided to go out for an evening meal and arranged some entertainment so that we can sit back and enjoy and being waited on.

# Group Oil Order

 $\mathbb{A}$ 

The next order will go in at our usual time of mid - late November depending on demand and prices.

The price of heating oil has fallen slowly but steadily over the last few weeks, which is in part due to the global situation and in part due to lower demand. On 4th August the England average was 86.54p/litre. On 18th September it had gone up then down to 91.85p/litre (Boilerjuice).

With all the news attention on the high costs predicted for energy bills this coming winter, little or nothing has been said about the higher cost of oil, which we are already paying. Just before Open Field was finalised for September, Boilerjuice sent out a message to customers saying that the Prime Minister had said that people using oil to heat their homes would also receive help, but that no details were yet available.

Mike Manning circulated a message to this effect quoting Boilerjuice and this month's Citizen's Advice article makes reference to it. We have asked them to inform us as soon as they have any information and will ask Mike to circulate it or get the word spread however we can.

People will need to buy oil when their tanks are running low and the group will continue to operate as long as people feel we can achieve better prices for them than they can achieve themselves. Anyone wanting to set up a monthly payment plan will need to deal direct with their choice of supplier and it is unlikely that this will be compatible with ordering with the Group. We are all going to have to play it by ear and do what seems best for us individually.

Group members receive a discount based on the total volume when ordering together. The price is negotiated based on our total, and so those wanting to benefit need to specify their requirement before the quotes are requested, the best supplier is chosen and the order is placed. Late orders are not accepted unless there are exceptional circumstances.

Anyone whose order can be placed by email is very welcome to join. Please contact me on <u>oil@openfield.org.uk</u> The group currently covers an area of roughly 5 miles radius from Laxton, plus one former villager who uses oil in his new home about 20 miles away.



# Autumn Vaccinations



The best way to help protect yourself and others from flu is to have a yearly flu jab. Protection from the flu jab gradually decreases and flu strains can change, which means a previous flu jab may not protect you from this year's strains.

Û

At the time of writing anyone aged over 65 who did not come into any of the other priority groups was eligible to book their Covid booster jab. The age able

to book is coming down, so check to see if you qualify. Vaccination centres had been set up in East Markham Village Hall and Ollerton.

This year there is a vaccination against Covid which incorporates the original vaccine and a new addition against the Omicron variant. *NB* some people may hear this called a 'combined vaccine' and wrongly assume it incorporates the 'flu vaccine. It doesn't and unless you receive both separately at the same time, you will still need to go and get a 'flu jab to maximise your protection for the winter.

After your jab, it usually takes around two weeks to be protected.

More people are likely to get flu this winter as fewer people will have built up natural immunity to it during the COVID-19 pandemic.

- $\Rightarrow$  if you get flu and COVID-19 at the same time, research shows you're more likely to be seriously ill.
- ⇒ getting vaccinated against flu and COVID-19 will provide protection for you and those around you for both these serious illnesses.
- $\Rightarrow$  If you've had COVID-19, it's safe to have the flu vaccine. It will still be effective at helping to prevent flu.

Some people may be eligible for both the flu and the COVID-19 booster vaccines. If you are offered both vaccines, it's safe to have them at the same time.

Check to see if you are eligible for a free 'flu jab.

You can have the NHS flu vaccine at:

- your GP surgery
- a pharmacy offering the service
- your midwifery service if you're pregnant
- a hospital appointment

### Don't struggle with your energy bills alone

On Thursday 8 September, Prime Minister Liz Truss announced that the average

household's gas and electricity bills would be frozen at £2,500 for the next two years, from the 1st of October.

Earlier in the year the government announced additional support for people to cope with increased living costs, including scrapping the  $\pounds$ 200 energy rebate and replacing it with a non-repayable grant of  $\pounds$ 400 for all households. To get the  $\pounds$ 400 grant:

- Most people won't need to do anything to get the money
- You won't have to pay it back
- If you pay via direct debit, the £400 will be automatically added to your energy account paid to you over 6 months starting from October 2022 That should equate to about £67-a-month:
  - People who pay via direct debit will automatically see it as a reduction or a refund to their bank account
- Standard credit/payment card customers will see it added to their credit
- Smart meter customers will see it added to their smart meters
  - If you have a prepayment meter, you'll be issued with vouchers in the first week of each month, via SMS text, email or post. Make sure your energy company has your up-to-date details
  - You'll need to redeem these at a top-up point e.g. PayPoint or Post Office

To receive any of the above support you won't be asked for your bank details, so watch out for scam emails or texts asking for this information.

However, households using oil will not benefit from the  $\pounds 2,500$ energy price guarantee. The Prime Minister announced that there would be a discretionary fund providing equivalent financial support for heating oil homes this winter. The details of this support have yet to be confirmed.

Even with the support from the government we know that for many energy bills are still much higher than they have been and they simply don't have extra cash to spare to pay for the increasing cost of energy. The scale of this crisis is unlike anything we've seen even in the pandemic. We're helping more people with crisis support like food bank referrals and access to grants because they simply can't pay the bills or put food on the table.

## Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council at Moorhouse Church on 19/7/22 (Draft)

Present: Councillors: J. Hill, S. Rose, S. Hill (chair)

In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Wilson (Clerk) Members of the public (x2)

- 1. **Apologies for absence:** Apologies for absence were received and accepted from Mr Manning, Mr M Hennell, Mr R Hennell and Mr Godson. Mr S Hill took the chair in Mr Manning's absence. Apologies were also accepted from Mr Pringle and Mrs Michael.
- 2. **Declarations of interest:** There were no declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. **Dispensations:** None required.
- 4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** Concern was expressed that there was a lack of attention and focus on Moorhouse by the parish council. The example of the village signs for Laxton was given. The clerk explained that these had been funded largely by the Crown Estate. Mr S Hill drew attention to the new fingerpost for Moorhouse which the parish council had secured.

The condition of the bench in Moorhouse was also raised. Mr S Hill had been going to raise this under councillors' reports at item 9 on the agenda.

Concern was also expressed at the condition of roads in Moorhouse. Mr S Hill confirmed that, as a Moorhouse resident, he raised these. The clerk offered to ask councillor Pringle to include Moorhouse in his walk round to take place over the summer. Mr S Hill invited any Moorhouse resident with any concern to contact a parish councillor or the clerk via the website and these concerns would receive attention.

- 5. **Thoresby Estate report (if any):** No Thoresby Estate representative present. Councillors noted that Mr Perry had let the Estate and that Mr S James had taken the role. The clerk will invite Mr James to the next meeting. to the meeting.
- 6. **Minutes of the Parish Council meetings held on 24 May and 21 June 2022:** The minutes of the Parish Council meetings held on 24 May and 21 June 2022 were agreed as a true record and signed by Mr S Hill as chair.

- 7. **Matters arising:** The clerk confirmed the amount paid for the hedge laying. No other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.
- 8. **Reports from district and county councillors:** No district or county councillor present.
- 9. **Reports from councillors:** It was reported that there were to be ten new interpretation boards and that work was underway on their construction.
- 10. **Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field maintenance and licence completion:** Councillors noted that the Glebe Field rent has been paid. They also noted that the jubilee tree is being watered.

Reports of empty plastic bottles being left at the sports field Pavilion were noted. The clerk will inform the Committee chair. There was a report that oil had been fly tipped in Moorhouse. There was also discussion of fly tipping of trees, builders' sand and grass and the extent of NSDC's responsibility for removal of such items. The clerk will contact NSDC to enquire whether it is responsible for removing material fly tipped on common land and public footpaths. She asked that residents email photographs of any fly tipping as evidence. Fly tipping to be an agenda item for September 2022 meeting. Mr S Hill will also raise the problem at the next SNG meeting. **Planning matters:** 

#### 11. Planning matters:

- Applications: An application had been received after circulation of the agenda. Councillors considered application 22/01308/HOUSE Demolition of existing Conservatory. Installation of external door and window School House High Street Laxton and agreed that they had no objections.
- b. To note planning decisions by NSDC: 22/01005/HOUSE Garage and car port - School House, High Street, Laxton, NG22 0NX – Refusal noted.
- c. **Compliance:** No matters raised.
- 12. **Defibrillator inspection report:** Councillors noted that the new battery had finally arrived and been installed. Mr J Hill reported that the pads would expire in March 2023. Early ordering of replacements to be considered at the September 2022 meeting. The clerk will enquire of Mr Manning regarding the signs which had been ordered at the same time as the battery.
- 13. Village environment and appearance, including Bar Farmhouse: Work is being undertaken at Bar Farmhouse. No other matter raised. The clerk will title this item as "Parish environment..." going forward to ensure that Moorhouse is specifically included.

- 14. Financial matters:
  - a. **Financial position as at 30 June 2022:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 30 June 2022 (incorporating the 2022-23 budget figures). The chair verified the stated balances against bank statements.
  - b. Accounts for payment: Councillors unanimously approved six payments totalling £703.01 and formally noted their approval of seven cheques for jubilee event expenses totalling £1,579.32 without a specific agenda item given at the meeting on 21 June 2022.
  - c. Change of banking provider: Councillors agreed that the newly introduced bank charges were disappointing and that the clerk should look for an alternative provider. Previous difficulties in setting up signatories were discussed and frustration expressed.
- **15. Service faults:** To be raised with Mr Pringle as part of the parish walk. The clerk will enquire whether he would be able to attend in the evening to enable more councillors to attend.
- 16. Correspondence: Councillors noted that Mr Manning had expressed an interest in the NALC on line event on giving local councils more of a say on housing to take place on 27 July 2022.
- **17.** Agenda items for next meeting: See above and Christmas event planning. The clerk will ask Mr Manning to seek residents' ideas in the Open Field.
- **18. Date of next meeting**: Tuesday 27 September 2022 in the Visitor Centre.

# Community RePaint Scheme - Part 1



The Community Repaint Nottinghamshire scheme recently celebrated 10 years of operation. Since the scheme started in our area it has redistributed over 69,000 litres of paint to the local community - that's enough to repaint Trent Bridge seven times!

This has coloured the lives of over 110,000

people in the Nottinghamshire County Council area and equates to a saving of 186,000kg CO<sub>2</sub> - that's the same as a petrol car driving around the entire circumference of the Earth 27 times.

Four Recycling Centres in the county are part of the scheme, but only Newark is local to us, so if you want to dispose responsibly of your surplus paint, that is where you need to head.

We will be telling you what can be donated and how to get paint you might need in future editions.

Tins of liquid paint should never be put in your bin at home, unless they are empty or contain only solid dried-up paint residue. Tins of paint from a wheelie bin then crushed in the back of a rubbish truck, can spill onto the street and paint poured down sinks and may pollute our water courses.

Much better - donate unwanted paint to RePaint, to be found locally at the Newark Recycling Centre. The scheme collects reusable, leftover paint and gives it for free to individuals, community groups, charities and schools. Community groups may use the paint to refurbish rooms or buildings used by their members. It may be used by other groups for craft activities, for training or may even be used for stage sets by community theatre groups.
